**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO  
HOUSE BILL 5201**

1 In line 2 of the printed bill, after “administration;” delete the rest of the  
2 line and delete line 3 and insert “creating new provisions; amending section  
3 8, chapter 111, Oregon Laws 2022, sections 1, 2 and 11, chapter 596, Oregon  
4 Laws 2023, and sections 21, 33, 44 and 45, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023;  
5 repealing sections 24 and 32, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023; and declaring  
6 an emergency.”.

7 Delete lines 5 through 23 and insert:

8 **“SECTION 1.** Section 1, chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to  
9 read:

2 **“SECTION 3.** Section 8, chapter 111, Oregon Laws 2022, is amended to  
3 read:

4 **“Sec. 8.** (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2023, at the request of the  
5 Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department consults  
6 with the McKenzie River Discovery Center, the State Treasurer is authorized  
7 to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount  
8 that produces \$3 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in sub-  
9 section (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State  
10 Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

11 **“(2)** Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be  
12 transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic Develop-  
13 ment Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553 for distribution to  
14 the McKenzie River Discovery Center to [*construct a central exhibition*  
15 *structure*] **restore, renovate, remodel or rebuild several historic**  
16 **buildings to create exhibition space** and undertake site improvements at  
17 the site of the Historic Old Leaburg Fish Hatchery.

18 **“(3)** The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds  
19 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or  
20 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,  
21 and is authorized based on the finding that the [*central exhibition structure*]  
22 **new exhibition space** and site improvements will enhance the economic vi-  
23 ability of the region through increased tourism, job creation and improved  
24 quality of life for the community.

25 **“SECTION 4.** Section 33, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to  
26 read:

27 **“Sec. 33.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, at the request of  
28 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department  
29 consults with the Department of Transportation, the State Treasurer is au-  
30 thorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an

1 amount that produces \$20 million in net proceeds for the purposes described  
2 in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the  
3 State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

4 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be  
5 transferred to the Department of Transportation for deposit in the DOT  
6 Economic Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.557,  
7 for distribution to the [*Port of Hood River*] **Hood River-White Salmon**  
8 **Bridge Authority** to support the Hood River-White Salmon Interstate  
9 Bridge replacement project.

10 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds  
11 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or  
12 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,  
13 and is authorized based on the finding that a safe, efficient and reliable  
14 transportation infrastructure supports the long-term economic development  
15 and livability of this state.

16 **“SECTION 5.** Section 44, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to  
17 read:

18 **“Sec. 44.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, at the request of  
19 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department  
20 consults with the Oregon Business Development Department, the State  
21 Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to  
22 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$20 million in net proceeds for the  
23 purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional  
24 amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related  
25 costs.

26 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be  
27 transferred to the Oregon Business Development Department for deposit in  
28 the Coos Bay Channel Fund established by section 15, chapter 746, Oregon  
29 Laws 2007, for distribution to the Oregon International Port of Coos Bay to  
30 deepen and widen the Coos Bay Federal Navigation Channel **and for the**

1 **design, engineering, permitting and land acquisition efforts related to**  
2 **the Pacific Coast Intermodal Port project.**

3 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds  
4 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or  
5 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,  
6 and is authorized based on the finding that port facilities and related  
7 infrastructure are an integral part of the commercial and industrial  
8 infrastructure of this state, and promote economic development.

9 **“SECTION 6.** Section 45, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to  
10 read:

11 **“Sec. 45.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, at the request of  
12 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department  
13 consults with the Oregon Business Development Department, the State  
14 Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to  
15 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$20 million in net proceeds for the  
16 purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional  
17 amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related  
18 costs.

19 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be  
20 transferred to the Oregon Business Development Department for deposit in  
21 the Coos Bay Channel Fund established by section 15, chapter 746, Oregon  
22 Laws 2007, for distribution to the Oregon International Port of Coos Bay to  
23 deepen and widen the Coos Bay Federal Navigation Channel **and for the**  
24 **design, engineering, permitting and land acquisition efforts related to**  
25 **the Pacific Coast Intermodal Port project.**

26 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds  
27 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or  
28 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,  
29 and is authorized based on the finding that port facilities and related  
30 infrastructure are an integral part of the commercial and industrial

1 infrastructure of this state, and promote economic development.

2 **“SECTION 7.** Section 21, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to  
3 read:

4 **“Sec. 21.** (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2023, at the request of  
5 the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the department  
6 consults with the Oregon Business Development Department, the State  
7 Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to  
8 286A.585 in an amount that produces [*\$5 million*] **\$9 million** in net proceeds  
9 for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional  
10 amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related  
11 costs.

12 **“(2)** Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be  
13 transferred to the Oregon Business Development Department for deposit in  
14 the OBDD Economic Development Distributions Fund established under  
15 section 28, chapter 748, Oregon Laws 2017, for distribution to the City of  
16 Aumsville to build a [*mechanical processing wastewater treatment plant*]  
17 **wastewater treatment plant and increase the capacity of several seg-**  
18 **ments of the gravity collection sewer system.**

19 **“(3)** The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds  
20 will create jobs, further economic development, finance public education or  
21 restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife,  
22 and is authorized based on the finding that wastewater treatment systems  
23 **and related sewer infrastructure** are an integral part of the commercial  
24 and industrial infrastructure of this state, and improving wastewater treat-  
25 ment will promote economic development and watershed health.

26 **“SECTION 8.** Sections 24 and 32, chapter 599, Oregon Laws 2023, are  
27 **repealed.**

28 **“SECTION 9.** (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the re-  
29 **quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the**  
30 **department consults with Parrott Creek Child and Family Services,**

1 the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to  
2 ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$4 million in net  
3 proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section,  
4 plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be  
5 necessary to pay bond-related costs.

6 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must  
7 be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic  
8 Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553, for  
9 distribution to Parrott Creek Child and Family Services for con-  
10 struction of a youth residential treatment campus in Clackamas  
11 County.

12 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond  
13 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-  
14 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and  
15 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that  
16 individuals increase their potential for self-sufficiency, increase their  
17 economic productivity and use fewer public resources when they have  
18 access to treatment programs and services.

19 “SECTION 10. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the re-  
20 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the  
21 department consults with the Family YMCA of Marion and Polk  
22 Counties, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue lottery bonds  
23 pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$3  
24 million in net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of  
25 this section, plus an additional amount estimated by the State Treas-  
26 urer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

27 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must  
28 be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic  
29 Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553, for  
30 distribution to the Family YMCA of Marion and Polk Counties to de-

1 velop a centralized social service and resource center that includes  
2 affordable housing in downtown Salem.

3 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond  
4 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-  
5 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and  
6 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the following  
7 findings:

8 “(a) Having housing and social services for at-risk populations is  
9 essential to Oregon’s healthy economic growth; and

10 “(b) A severe shortage of affordable housing facilities and related  
11 social services exists in Oregon, and market indicators demonstrate a  
12 growing gap between the supply of and the demand for affordable  
13 housing.

14 “SECTION 11. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the re-  
15 quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the  
16 department consults with Lane County, the State Treasurer is au-  
17 thorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585  
18 in an amount that produces \$7.5 million in net proceeds for the pur-  
19 poses described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional  
20 amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay  
21 bond-related costs.

22 “(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must  
23 be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic  
24 Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553, for  
25 distribution to Lane County for construction of the Fairgrounds  
26 Multi-Use Facility.

27 “(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond  
28 proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-  
29 lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and  
30 native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that

1 **constructing the multi-use facility will enhance the economic viability**  
2 **of the region through increased tourism, job creation and improved**  
3 **quality of life for the community.**

4 **“(4) Issuance of bonds and distribution of net proceeds to Lane**  
5 **County is contingent upon all other financing for the project being**  
6 **secured.**

7 **“SECTION 12. (1) For the biennium ending June 30, 2025, at the re-**  
8 **quest of the Oregon Department of Administrative Services, after the**  
9 **department consults with the City of Hillsboro, the State Treasurer is**  
10 **authorized to issue lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585**  
11 **in an amount that produces \$15 million in net proceeds for the pur-**  
12 **poses described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional**  
13 **amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay**  
14 **bond-related costs.**

15 **“(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must**  
16 **be transferred to the department for deposit in the ODAS Economic**  
17 **Development Distributions Fund established under ORS 461.553, for**  
18 **distribution to the City of Hillsboro for construction of the Hillsboro**  
19 **Hops Ballpark.**

20 **“(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond**  
21 **proceeds will create jobs, further economic development, finance pub-**  
22 **lic education or restore and protect parks, beaches, watersheds and**  
23 **native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the finding that**  
24 **constructing the ballpark will enhance the economic viability of the**  
25 **region through increased tourism, job creation and improved quality**  
26 **of life for the community.**

27 **“(4) Issuance of bonds and distribution of net proceeds to the City**  
28 **of Hillsboro is contingent upon all other financing for the project being**  
29 **secured.**

30 **“SECTION 13. Section 11, chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023, is amended to**

2 “**Sec. 11.** (1) A public university that is carrying out a qualified project  
3 shall require each contractor in a contract with an estimated cost of \$200,000  
4 or greater to:

5 “(a) Employ apprentices to perform 15 percent of the work hours that  
6 workers in apprenticeable occupations perform under the contract, in a  
7 manner consistent with the apprentices’ respective apprenticeship training  
8 programs;

9 “(b) Establish and execute a plan for outreach, recruitment and retention  
10 of women, minority individuals and veterans to perform work under the  
11 contract, with the aspirational target of having at least 15 percent of total  
12 work hours performed by individuals in one or more of those groups;

13 “(c) Provide health insurance and retirement benefits to workers; and

14 “(d) Require any subcontractor engaged by the contractor to abide by the  
15 requirements set forth in paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) of this subsection, if the  
16 work to be performed under the subcontract has an estimated cost of \$200,000  
17 or greater.

18 “(2) On or before February 1 of each year, each public university that is  
19 carrying out a qualified project shall report to the Joint Committee on Ways  
20 and Means or Joint Interim Committee on Ways and Means, as part of the  
21 report required under ORS 350.379, on:

22 “(a) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by apprentices;

23 “(b) The amount of work performed on qualified projects by women, mi-  
24 nority individuals and veterans; and

25 “(c) The types and costs of health insurance and retirement benefits pro-  
26 vided to workers by contractors and subcontractors.

27 “(3) The requirements of this section are in addition to, and not in lieu  
28 of, the requirements imposed under ORS 350.379.

29 “(4) As used in this section:

30 “(a) ‘Apprentice’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 660.010.

1 “(b) ‘Apprenticeable occupation’ has the meaning given that term in ORS  
2 660.010.

3 “(c) ‘Apprenticeship training program’ means the total system of appren-  
4 ticeship that a particular local joint committee, as defined in ORS 660.010,  
5 operates, including the local joint committee’s registered standards and all  
6 other terms and conditions for qualifying, recruiting, selecting, employing  
7 and training apprentices in an apprenticeable occupation.

8 “(d) ‘Minority individual’ has the meaning given that term in ORS  
9 200.005.

10 “(e) ‘Qualified project’ means the following capital construction projects:

11 “(A) The University of Oregon Friendly Hall renovation referenced in  
12 section 1 (1)(L) [*of this 2023 Act*], **chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023**;

13 “(B) The Oregon State University Collaborative Innovation Complex ref-  
14 erenced in section 1 (1)(m) [*of this 2023 Act*], **chapter 596, Oregon Laws**  
15 **2023**;

16 “(C) The Portland State University Vernier Science Center and Gateway  
17 Art and Design project completions referenced in section 1 (1)(n) [*of this 2023*  
18 *Act*], **chapter 596, Oregon Laws 2023**; [*and*]

19 “(D) The Oregon Institute of Technology geothermal system emergency  
20 renovation referenced in section 1 (6)(i)(E) [*of this 2023 Act.*], **chapter 596,**  
21 **Oregon Laws 2023**; and

22 “(E) **The Southern Oregon University Central Hall Capital Im-**  
23 **provements (Phase II) referenced in section 1 (6)(i)(F), chapter 596,**  
24 **Oregon Laws 2023, as amended by section 1 of this 2024 Act.**

25 “(f) ‘Veteran’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 408.225.

26 “(g) ‘Woman’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 200.005.

27 **“SECTION 14. This 2024 Act being necessary for the immediate**  
28 **preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is**  
29 **declared to exist, and this 2024 Act takes effect on its passage.”.**

30
