Support HB 4156 Modernizing Oregon's Anti-Stalking Law

HB 4156 will update and modernize Oregon's current stalking statutes to provide better protection for survivors and greater accountability for perpetrators:

- Updates current law to ensure that cyberstalking, electronic and internet harassment, "revenge porn" and other forms of stalking through the mis-use of modern day technology are included as prohibited behaviors;
- Improves the "felony upgrade" statute to include cases in which the perpetrator has a prior conviction for stalking; when the perpetrator is subject to another protection order; or when the stalking includes behavior that is a felony or is revenge porn or stalking by GPS;
- Increases the felony upgrade from a Class C felony to a Class B felony.

Increased protection: Since passage of Oregon's original stalking statute, we have entered the digital age. Victims of cyberstalking are more vulnerable than ever to financial, physical, and psychological harm via the mis-use of technology by perpetrators. Inclusion of cyberstalking in the list of prohibited behaviors ensures that our statute better protects victims from abuse.

Increased accountability: Stalking abuse is a serious and growing crime: Data show that 1 in every 6 women and 1 out of 19 men in the United States have been stalked in their lifetime. Not only is stalking an indicator of other forms of violence, it has been linked to increased risk of femicide. Our youngest populations are at the most risk - people aged 18-24 have the highest rate of stalking victimization. Increasing the sanction for serious stalking behavior is commensurate with the harm inflicted by this behavior.
