I am very against ending Daylight Saving Time. Changing time was never a problem when I was a kid. The problem is that we are a society of wimps and we can't handle anything. It's two days a year, one really because no minds the fall change.

In the fall cross-country meets will have to start earlier, and some IA schools don't have lights on their football fields. We are already on Standard Time, during the winter, so it won't be daylight earlier for the kids going to school.

We have very nice weather in the fall in Oregon. Many of us like to do things in the evening like go for a walk or run, play golf or tennis or just sit outside at home and enjoy the evening. If you work until 4:30 or 5:00 like many people do if we stay on Standard Time we will have limited opportunity to do so, especially as we get into late September and October.
