The Portland Japanese Garden is considered the most authentic Japanese Garden outside of Japan. Located in Washington Park on the former site of the Oregon Zoo, the Garden opened to the public in 1967 and has become a top Oregon visitor destination. More than **500,000 people visit** the Garden every year.

In 2017, the Garden unveiled its **Cultural Crossing** expansion project, adding 3.4 acres, a Cultural Village and three new gardens, including a series of cascading ponds and a terraced stone pathway to welcome guests as they enter.

The Garden is now pursuing creation of **The Japan Institute** to establish, develop and host world-class programs. The Garden has acquired a 3.64-acre site in Northwest Portland with existing buildings designed by Portland architect A. E. Doyle to house the Institute. The Institute will provide teaching and program facilities, artist studio space, storage for art pieces, classrooms and outdoor areas for hands-on symposia, meetings and workshops.
