Seven Observables

- Observable 1: What we are doing in Oregon is working.
- Observable 2: The homeless numbers continue to grow.
- Observable 3: Observable 2 is not connected to Observable 1.
- Observable 4: New homeless wave is largely economically driven.
- Observable 5: Criminalization efforts will fail as they have before.
- Observable 6: Need full continuum of services to make the system viable; that is prevention impacts shelter; shelter impacts housing programs, all the way down stream to affordable housing.
- Observable 7: Problem was decades in the making; will take time to solve. Given public skepticism, outcomes must be transparent.

Prior to 2018

- Region had 130 permanent shelter beds
- 22 Permanent Supportive Housing beds
- Cold weather activation of 27 degrees (x3)
- MWVCAA had:
 - No shelter beds
 - Minimal housing programs
 - Limited Day Center
- Regional social services, affordable housing, were undercapitalized compared to comparable cities, in Oregon and elsewhere



Present Day

MWVCAA:

- 296 shelter beds
- 120 Extreme Weather beds
- 165 Supportive beds
- **581** Combined Emergency; exclusive of SS programs.

Full Region (Marion-Polk):

- 1,491 shelter and TX beds
- 913 housing beds
- 360 warming beds
- 2,404 TOTAL Beds in 2025
