Healthy Homes Grant Program

- Established by <u>House Bill 2842</u> in 2021, amended by <u>Senate Bill</u> <u>1536</u> in 2022.
- Provides grants to eligible entities that provide assistance and services to persons in low-income households to repair and rehabilitate their residences and to landlords to repair and rehabilitate dwelling units inhabited by low-income households.

Round 1 Funding

- 75 Applications received, requesting ~\$44M
- 34 grantees receiving a total of ~\$20 million
- Grant amounts range from \$180,000 to \$750,000, most at the high end
- Non-Competitive Grants: Nine Federally recognized Tribes in Oregon (\$3 Million)



Tribal Set Aside

- Set aside of \$3 million (10% of the Healthy Homes Fund)
- All nine federally-recognized Oregon Tribes are accepting funding and developed agreed-upon allocation
- Same base allocation to each Tribe with additional differential allocation based on Indian Health Service user population
- Three tribes requested that part of their allocation be redirected to the Native American Rehabilitation Association (Urban Indian Health Program)
- Agreements expected to be in place in Spring 2025


No applications from: Coordinated Care Organization, Indian health centers, manufactured dwelling park nonprofit cooperative, natural gas utility. One application from an electric utility.

Additional Federal Funding for HHGP

• EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Grant (CPRG), Oregon awarded \$197,000,000



- HHGP receiving \$2,227,175 (total) for weatherization of ~360 homes over 4 years, likely by increasing contracts with existing grantees
- Additional eligibility and tracking requirements tied to greenhouse gas reduction
