

Individuals Seeking Decision-Making Supports

- Families supporting individuals in crisis
- Transition-aged youth planning for independent living
- Older adults experiencing cognitive symptoms
- Individuals with mental health or substance abuse disorders
- Adults with intellectual / developmental disabilities (I/DD)
- Those with Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI)



Problems the Center for Decision-Making Supports Addresses

- Lack of uniform and centralized resources
- Navigating the tension between self-determination and guardianship
- Disrupting the "school-to-guardianship" pipeline
- Limited access for culturally-specific populations

It Does NOT Designate the Appointment of Guardians / Conservators

- No representation in court
- No legal advice
- No intervention directly in guardianship or conservatorship cases

Structuring the Center

The Office of the Long-Term Care Ombudsman is Where It Lives Best

- The Office of the LTCO currently includes <u>three</u> independent programs:
 - The Long-Term Care Ombudsman
 - Oregon Public Guardian
 - The Residential Facilities Ombuds
- The Center for Decision-Making would be a <u>fourth</u> independent program within the Office of the LTCO

 - Vocational Rehabilitation
 - OHA mental and behavioral health
