- Housing "PACKAGE":
- Testimony = Infrastructure costs = KEY FACTOR / Huge Obstacle
- We know that Infrastructure costs skyrocketing
- Agencies are backlogged
- Solution: Legislature wanted quicker allocations

(4) A city may not receive a disbursement of the grant until the city and the property owner of the identified housing development have entered into one or more agreements to 20 22 (a) The owner will construct a minimum specified number of housing units before the latter of 36 months after the completion of the infrastructure project or 60 months after the disbursement of the infrastructure grant. 25 (b) No less than 30 percent of the dwelling units within the housing development will be subject to an affordable housing covenant, as defined in ORS 456.270, under which: 26 27 (A) The city shall serve as or designate the covenant holder; and (B) The housing will be made affordable to workforce income households for a period of no less than 10 years. (c) In addition to any other remedies, the owner is liable to repay to the city the amount of the infrastructure grant under this section if the units are not developed or the affordability is not maintained as required in this subsection, except for delays outside of the owner's control. (d) The owner will assist the city in its reporting requirements under section 2 of this

Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
