OREGON STATE FIRE MARSHAL



1. LOCAL RESPONSE

Initial attack by AHJ or nearby agencies.

2. LOCAL MUTUAL AID

Local agency agreements used to bring in partners from neighboring jurisdictions.

3. EXPANDED MUTUAL AID

Local agency agreements which may be county wide or inter-county used to bolser capability.

4. STATEWIDE MUTUAL AID

Conflagration or other state-level response by resources mobilized by the State Fire Marshal.

5. INTERSTATE MUTUAL AID

State-level agreements allowing resources from other states to respond.

EMERGENCY RESPONSE OREGON STATE FIRE MARSHAL

Incident Management Teams

- Three highly-specialized and trained teams
- Staffed by the Oregon fire service
- All-risk, all-hazard
- Mobilized through the governor or local and interstate agreements

Emergency Management Compact Act (EMAC)

- Hurricane Helene Response North Carolina
 - 8 incident management team staff
- January California Wildfires
 - 21 task forces with 370 firefighters
 - 105 engines & water tenders

RESPONSE READY OREGON WILDFIRE SEASON STAFFING GRANT

2024: 192 local fire agencies & 1,596 firefighters funded **2023:** 185 local fire agencies & 1,641 firefighters funded \$6 million per year with significant return on investment



Our crews responded to a brush fire spreading in the I-5 median just north of Creswell, OR in the late afternoon. Temperatures and winds had the potential to spread this fire across I-5. South Lane Fire units responded with tender 202 attained through the **OSFM Engine Program**. This was the first deployment of the tactical tender on a live fire in the district. The pump and roll capability enhanced firefighter safety and helped us rapidly control this fire. The tactical tender was used instead of our type 3 engine, deployed to a conflagration at the time."

On July 22, as 30-mile-per-hour winds drove a wall of flames toward homes near Monument, Oregon, firefighters, local ranchers, the Oregon Department of Forestry, and contract crews joined forces in a high-stakes battle. Thanks to the proactive efforts of the community to become a certified Firewise Community, creating defensible space and hardening their homes, firefighters were able to defend these properties successfully.

While flames came within feet of several homes, only a barn wall suffered minor damage. This story shows how vital the firefighters from the **2024 Wildfire Season** Staffing Grant were. Read the full story here.

HAZARDOUS MATERIALS RESPONSE OREGON STATE FIRE MARSHAL

Regional Hazardous Materials Emergency Response Teams

- Highly-trained staff in statewide response program
 - 140 hours training minimum
- First-of-its-kind program in the U.S.
- 12 teams across Oregon
- Response, phone consults, training, & outreach
- Hazmat by rail trainer

Federal Emergency Planning & Community Right to Know Act (EPCRA):

State Emergency Response Commission (SERC)

- SERC Executive Committee reconvened in Nov. 2024 with 19 voting members
- Guide & assist the SERC and LEPCs to implement EPCRA

Local Emergency Planning Committees (LEPC)

- Arranged by county
- Create emergency response plans
- 22 local emergency planning committees covering 25 counties
- Emergency response plans written or in development

- 2024: 19 agencies participated & 629 alarms distributed
- 13 classes with 231 attendees

Fire & Fall Prevention for Older Adults Program

- Home escape planning materials and training
- NFPA "Steps to Safety" Train-the-Trainer Program

A multi-agency team that emphasizes community risk reduction, shares best practices, coordinates, develops and implements consistent statewide fire prevention and life safety education.

- Fire Adapted Oregon strengthens community resilience to wildfires across Oregon.

DEFENSIBLE SPACE OREGON STATE FIRE MARSHAL

Code Development

• Best practices

Defensible Space Program

- Free assessments give guidance to homeowners on best practices
 - 2,974 completed in 2024
 - 430 assessors
 - 97 agencies trained

OREGON DEFENSIBLE SPACE & BEST PRACTICES



Trees and vegetation should be 10 feet from powerlines.

Trees and vegetation should be 10 feet from buildings and chimneys.

For trees and vegetation more than 18 feet tall, remove branches six feet from the ground.

> For trees and vegetation less than 18 feet tall, remove branches up to 1/3 the height of the tree.

Trees and vegetation should be 10 feet from other trees.



Removing or trimming trees near powerlines is dangerous. Only use an experienced, licensed contractor to perform this work.

2025 LEGISLATIVE SESSION AGENCY BILLS

SB 860: Department of the State Fire Marshal authorities

Updates outdated ORS Chapter 476 language to align with the agency's current operations. • Restores authorities lost during separation from Oregon State Police.

SB 861: Mobilization Fund updates

Expands funding sources for mobilization costs. •

SB 862: 2522 task force recommendations

Implements minor updates from HB 2522's task force recommendations to improve ORS 478. •

SB 863: Mobilization cost recovery

Establishes cost recovery processes for fires caused by willful, malicious, or negligent actions. •

SB 5538: Department of the State Fire Marshal budget bill



AGENCY POLICY OPTION PACKAGES AGENCY PRIORITIES

POP 102

Self-Serve Gasoline

- Request resources to enforce revised statutes for Class 1 Flammable Liquids following House Bills 2426 and 3260, which expand self-serve fueling in Oregon
- \$0.3 million General Fund
- 1 position, 0.88 FTE

POP 103

Agencywide Support

- Request additional resources for agency operations, Community Risk Reduction program, and modernizing fire service mutual aid resource and reimbursement processes.
- \$0.6 million General Fund
- \$4.1 million Other Funds
- 2 positions, 1.76 FTE

Package 090

Analyst Adjustments

- Fund shifted Program Analyst 3 position
- \$15 million for wildfire season
- \$10 million for upstaffing grants
- \$3 million for prepositioning and mobilization

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PROJECTS 2025-2027



Mutual Aid Reimbursement System – modernizing the process of manually tracking local fire agency deployments and reimbursement processes. This project will improve fire agency experience, expedite fire reimbursements, and improve business efficiency and data collection.



Learning Management System – collaborative project with DPSST, OEM, and OSP to improve training delivery and certification tracking for internal staff and external customers, partners, and stakeholders.



Business Process Mapping/Modernization – mapping our business processes to continue creating efficiency and modernizing old legacy systems and paper processes.
