Multistate Problem Solving with Interstate Compacts



The Policy Problem



Disparate, complex, and time intensive process for licensure



Duplicative and burdensome requirements to maintain multiple licenses



Information sharing across states may be limited by infrastructure and processes



Barriers to licensure can restrict supply of services



Who is most affected



Highly mobile populations (students, military families, travel practitioners, etc.)



Users and providers of telehealth services



Patients and practitioners living along borders



Patients living in areas with health care provider shortages

Licensure Compact Basics

- Compact legislation is developed through a stakeholder driven, consensus based process
- The compact legislation "pre-negotiates" the recognition of an out-of-state license through a compact authorization to practice
- A state joins the compact by enacting the model legislation
- The model legislation includes:
 - What a state must do in order to be a participating member
 - How a practitioner can qualify to use the compact
 - How the compact will be governed



Status of Occupational Licensure Compacts



Currently 18 interstate compacts for occupational licensing



48 states, 3 territories & DC have adopted at least 1 compact.




Over 370 pieces of occupational licensure compact legislation have been enacted since January 2016.



Oregon is a member of 2 licensing compacts (Physical Therapy (2016) and Teaching (2023))



Licensure Compact Participation by State



Reduced Barriers for Practitioners

- Uniform and centralized qualification and application process
- Expediency of process
- Renewal cycles will match the home state license
- Does not require continuing education in every state



Increases availability and flexibility of health care workforce for employers



Telehealth service opportunities



Temporary staffing



Bidirectional mobility of practitioners across state lines

Improved Access to Care



Increases access to health care services



Improves continuity of care



Increases access to specialists

Preservation of State Autonomy



Preserves control of scope of practice



Preserves control of initial licensure process

Improved information sharing and state coordination



Facilitates the exchange of licensure and disciplinary information



Improves cooperation in regulating the profession



Compact Research

 A <u>2023 study</u> found a 5% increase in out-of-state practices for physicians whose primary state participates in the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact. This resulted in an additional 600 practice locations per state on average. (Deyo et al., 2023)

A study in 2022 on the Nurse Licensure Compact found an 11% increase in the mobility of nurses within compact member states (Shakya et al., 2022)



Compact Usage Numbers and Survey Data

- Since 2017, the Interstate Medical Licensure Compact has reported over 100,000 physician licenses being granted through the compact.
- The Physical Therapy Compact issued 8,372 compact privileges in 2023 (31 jurisdictions)
- IMLC found in a 2022-2024 survey that nearly 95% of survey respondents found the compact process beneficial.
 - The same survey found that 40% of survey respondents are using the compact to provide telehealth services.
