Church at the Park (C@P), serves the unsheltered in Marion & Polk Counties. C@P was formed in 2007 to interact in a relational way with people who experience homelessness. C@P has **4** functioning priorities:

**Collaborative Outreach, Emergency Sheltering,
Workforce Development & Supportive Housing.**

National Trends

- 2023 unhoused Population: 770,000
(18% increase from previous survey)
- Oregon unhoused Population: 13% increase in 2023,
30% increase since 2017
- Oregon has 2nd highest rates of adult
homelessness, **1st highest in family homelessness**

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1: Outreach & Diversion

C@P will connect vulnerable adults who are unhoused throughout the Marion Polk region to support services and start planning for long term housing, health, and income stability. Key partners include: **CAA, NWHS, Bridgeway, Marion County Health and Human Services, Northwest Senior and Disability Services.**

Adult Street Outreach Outcomes

(1/1/24 - 11/30/24)

- Connected with **921** individual people
- Supported **194** people to move from the street to more stable living situations
- **47** of those people moved from the street to permanent housing

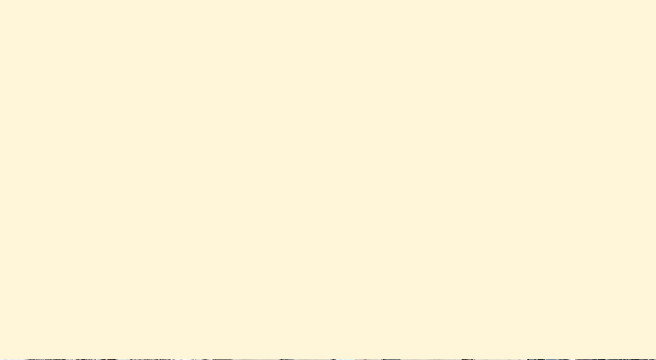
2: Housing focused Shelter

C@P will partner with all local shelter providers as well as continue to operate a 112 emergency shelter beds for vulnerable adults. The shelter will provide a safe, sanitary, and supported environment for guests to move from homelessness to stability.

Village of Hope Outcomes

(1/1/24 - 11/30/24)

- Sheltered **201** individual people
- Supported **56** people to move from the shelter to more stable living situations
- **41** of those people moved from the shelter to permanent housing

3: Stability

Vulnerable Adults will be able to stay in the shelter while they access the resources they need to stabilize and thrive in permanent housing. Through consistent C@P case management and on-site community partner connections, guests work towards stable housing, income, health, and behavioral health.

4: Launch

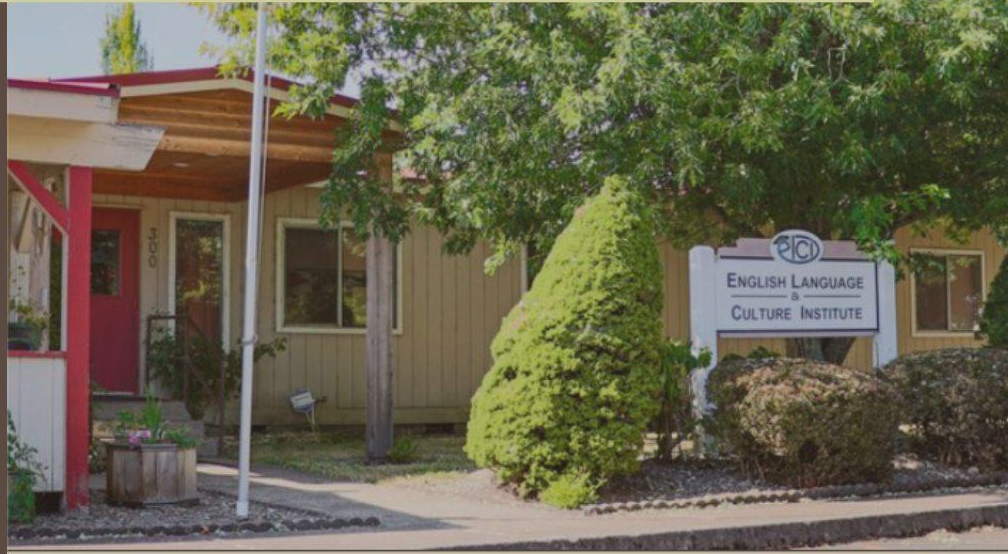
