Fentanyl Initiative Strategies

- Increasing and reallocating staff to drug enforcement teams, including local and regional teams
- Hosting interagency saturation patrols emphasizing fentanyl interdiction
 - Drug detection K-9s, drug enforcement detectives, and patrol
- Partnering with the Oregon Department of Justice on interdiction training
- Utilizing the HVEU unit to identify drug and alcohol-impaired drivers

2024 Total Fentanyl Seized

- 32% increase from 2023
- 398% increase since 2021

High Visibility Enforcement Unit (HVEU)

Reduce fatal and serious injury crashes by emphasizing the Fatal-5 enforcement priorities of Speed, Occupant Safety, Lane Usage, Impaired Driving, and Distracted Driving.

The Public Safety Services Bureau provides numerous services to communities throughout Oregon that improve the livability of our great state.

Programs and functions:

- SafeOregon school safety tipline
- Fingerprint-based background checks that agencies use to ensure vulnerable persons and communities are safe from persons with disqualifying offenses
- Critical information technology systems and infrastructure to support the OSP mission which also benefit the broader public safety community and individuals
- Public records and other records-based services



Central Records Division

Central Records processes an average of 1,294 requests each month for public records, subpoenas, discovery, and media inquiries.

Operational Efficiencies and Successes

- Records Management System Upgraded in 2024
- Laserfiche System Upgrade Upgrade summer of 2025
- SafeOregon School Safety Tip-Line:
 - 16,225 tips received
 - 2024-2025 school year forecast = 3,893
 - 1,312 schools enrolled (more than 90% public schools)
 - Top incident categories
 - Bullying or harassment/cyberbullying
 - Alcohol and other drug concerns
 - Suicidal ideation, depression, selfharm

- CAD application full replacement project underway; anticipated completion June 2025

The CJIS Division is Oregon's sole source repository for statewide criminal offender information and the exchange of law enforcement/criminal justice records nationally.

Operational Efficiencies and Successes

LEDS 20/20

- Ongoing modernization of programs and systems within CJIS
- Phase 4.1 Gun Check modernized in 2022
- Phase 6.1 Sex Offender Registry will replace legacy SOR unit systems in June 2025
- Additional functionality for Rapback:
 - Fingerprint retention program to reduce the frequency of employment background checks by an individual
 - Allows ongoing notifications to agencies for individuals with subsequent criminal activity that could impact vulnerable persons
