# WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

The measure appropriates \$2.5 million from the General Fund to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services to contract with the Oregon Association of Water Utilities to provide technical assistance, develop a water utility training center, and hire three staff to support small and very small community water systems in Oregon.

#### **Detailed Analysis**

I. <u>Provisions</u>

Requires the Oregon Department of Administrative Services (DAS) to enter into a contract with the Oregon Association of Water Utilities (the Association) to carry out the following:

- **Provide technical assistance** to small and very small community water systems, either directly or through a third-party provider, to address their specific needs and vulnerabilities.
- Develop or acquire equipment for a water utility training center that offers technical, financial, and managerial support tailored to small and very small community water systems.
- **Employ three staff members** who will provide support and resources to address the needs and vulnerabilities of small and very small community water systems in Oregon.
- II. Appropriations
- Allocates \$2.5 million in General Fund money to DAS, and requires DAS distribute these funds to the Association for implementation.
- III. Operative Date and Sunset
- Declares an emergency, effective on passage.
- Sunsets the program January 2, 2027.

#### **ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

# **EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:**

-1 The amendment removes the requirement for the Oregon Department of Administrative Services (DAS) to enter into a contract with the Oregon Association of Water Utilities and instead requires DAS to distribute the allocated moneys to the Oregon Association of Water Utilities to implement the provisions.

# BACKGROUND:

The Safe Drinking Water Act defines small systems as public water systems that serve 10,000 or fewer people.Very small water systems are defined by rule(<u>OAR 333-061-0020(91)</u>) and serve between four and 14 service connections. These systems are exempt from certain rule requirements and make up 24 percent of

Oregon's public water systems.
