### National Trends: Housing & Older Adults

- More Adults Live in Multifamily Buildings as They Age: As they age, older households are more likely to move to multifamily buildings; 21% of renters between the ages of 65 and 79 live in buildings with at least fifty units, compared to 39% adults aged 80+ or older.
- The Older Adult Population Is Increasing Across All Geographies: The share of older people is growing across all geographies; smaller metros and rural communities have higher concentrations of older adults.
- Incomes of Older Adults Decline and Converge Over Time: Regardless of housing tenure (rent vs own) and race/ethnicity, incomes decline with age and become more similar.

### Housing Precarity & Homelessness for Older Adults

- Older adults are the fastest growing segment of the homeless population (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, 2023)
- Demand from renters for federal housing support dramatically exceeds supply, especially for older renters at or below 50% AMI; housing assistance through public housing, Housing Choice Vouchers, project-based Section 8 vouchers, and Section 202 Supportive Housing for the Elderly on serves 36.5% of eligible households (JCHS, 2023).

#### **Accessible Housing**

- Oregon Housing Needs Analysis (OHNA): OHNA-related needs assessments were not able to estimate the available accessible housing stock, which hampers our ability to develop adequate production strategies.
- Accessible Housing is a Factor in Homelessness: In a CA-based research study on older adults experiencing homelessness (Oregon's best comparable study), 32% of survey respondents reported that they were not able to find housing that met their needs due to a physical disability and housing characteristics such as the presence of stairs, doors that don't accommodate the width of a wheelchair, lack of handrails in showers, etc. (UCSF, 2024)
