

## SB 1030 STAFF MEASURE SUMMARY

### Senate Committee On Health Care

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**Meeting Dates:** 3/11

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#### **WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:**

The measure requires community-based care facilities to host at least one on-site vaccine clinic between October 1 and March 1 of each year.

#### Detailed Summary:

Directs community-based care facilities to make available vaccines for, at minimum, influenza, COVID-19, and pneumonia. Does not require resident participation.

#### **ISSUES DISCUSSED:**

#### **EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:**

No amendment.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Community-based care facilities include assisted living facilities (ALFs) and residential care facilities (RCFs), and memory care communities. These facilities offer individualized services in home-like settings to older adults, people with disabilities and individuals with dementia or Alzheimer's disease. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that all adults over the age of 65 receive an annual influenza vaccine, at least two doses of the most updated COVID-19 vaccine, and one or two pneumococcal pneumonia vaccines ([CDC Recommended Vaccines for Adults](#), 2025).

The most recent data from the CDC show that 41% of nursing home residents in Oregon have received an updated COVID-19 vaccine and 43% of nursing home residents in Oregon have received an updated influenza vaccine ([CDC Nursing Home Data Dashboard](#), 2025).

Senate Bill 1030 requires community-based care facilities to host at least one on-site vaccine clinic annually where the influenza, COVID-19, and pneumonia vaccines are administered.
