Enhance Prevention & Early Detection Efforts

Watercraft & Vessel Inspections

Early Detection Monitoring

Create new & expand existing, mandatory inspection capacity

Expand early detection monitoring efforts

Update and expand waterbody risk assessment maps

HB2981 appropriates \$175,000 to DEQ for vessel inspections, \$800,000 to PSU to expand early detection monitoring and \$200,000 to ODFW to update Oregon's waterbody vulnerability assessment. HB2170 and HB2982 address inspection stations, partnerships and capacity. Ensure Rapid Response Preparedness

Clarify and document roles, responsibilities and decisionmaking authorities

Develop a process for declaring an invasive mussel state of emergency

Capacity, Resources and Clear Roles for Rapid Response

Hold regular response exercises, training workshops and drills

HB2981 appropriates \$150,000 to the OISC for facilitating interagency rapid response exercises and \$20,000 leading an interagency group in the collaborative development of a framework for emergency declarations, and clarification of roles and responsibilities.
