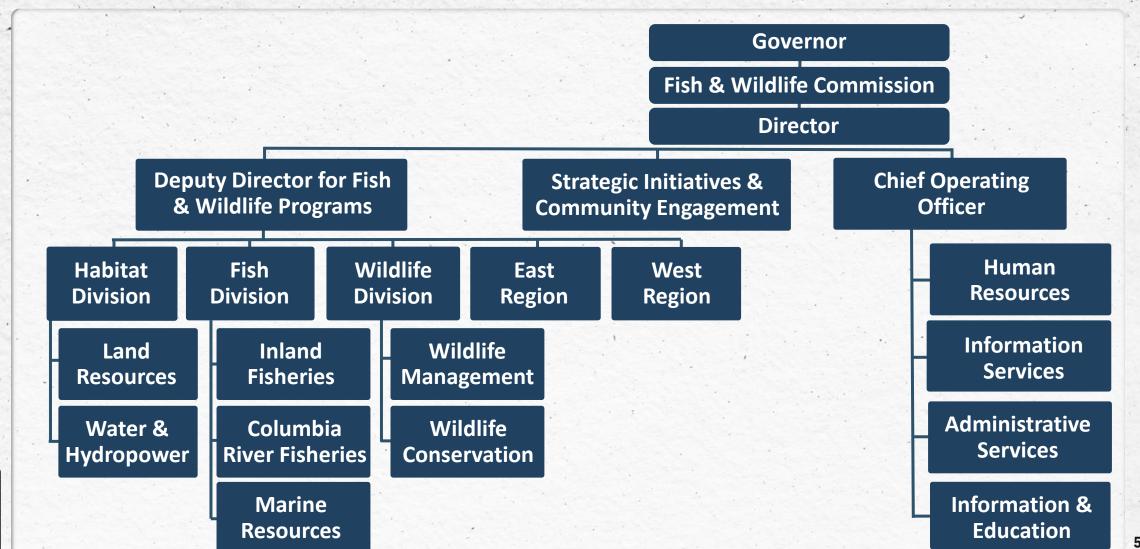
ODFW is a recognized steward of Oregon's fish and wildlife resources with diversified funding that supports our mission.

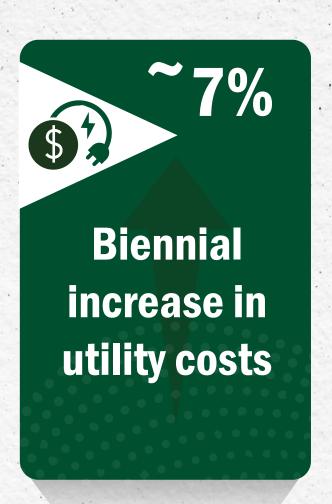

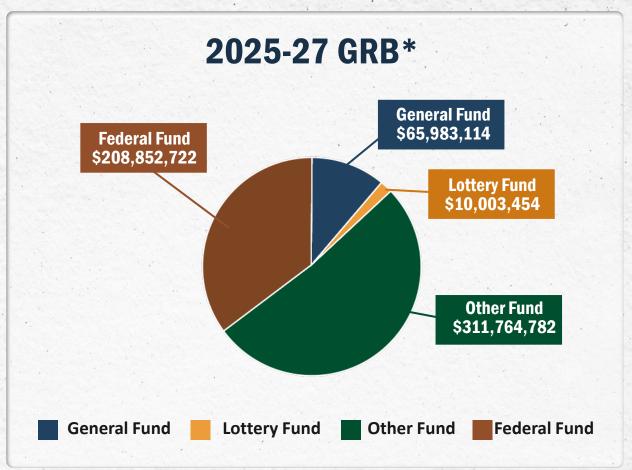
Public Response:

- Cost to be incremental over time

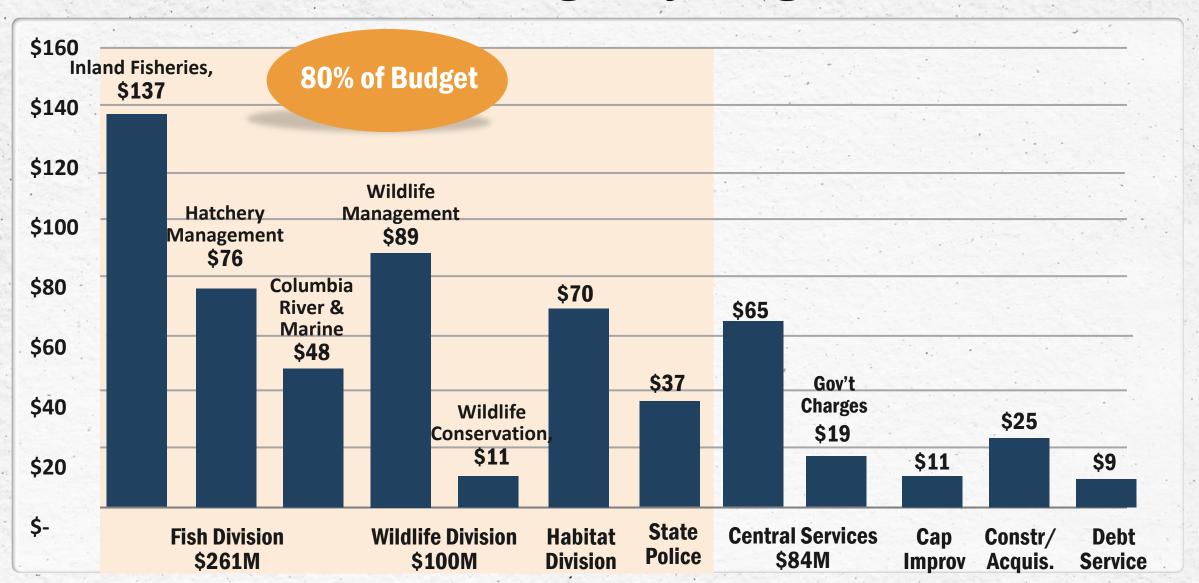
- Fund Chronic Wasting Disease work with increased revenue

Hunting and fishing related revenues account for 40% of ODFW's total budget.

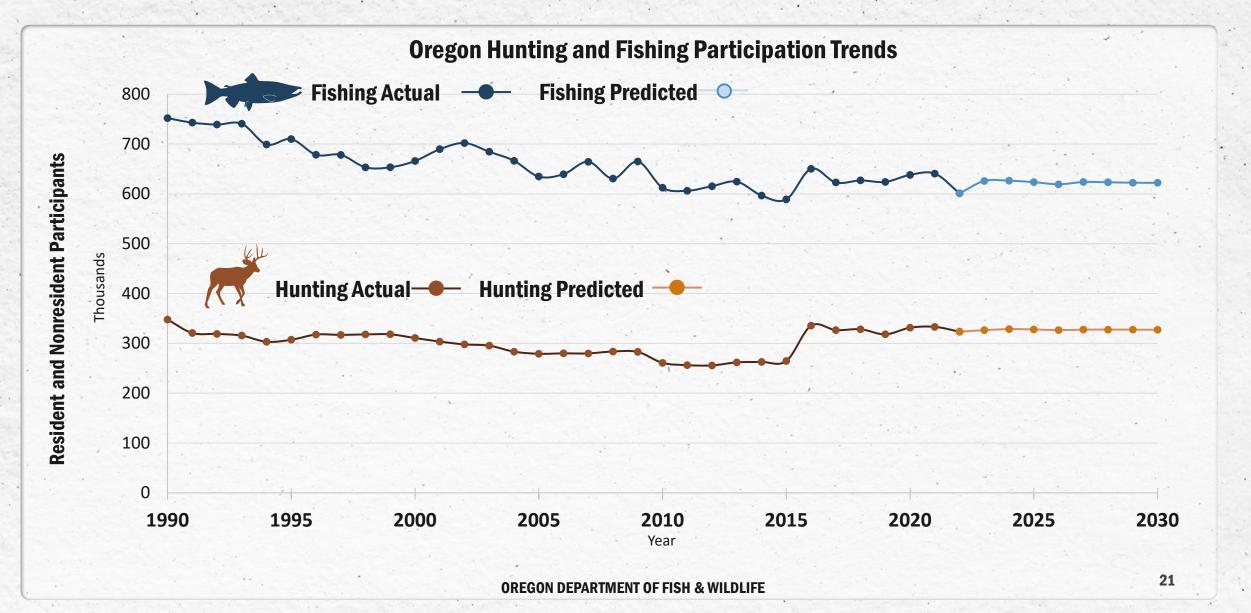

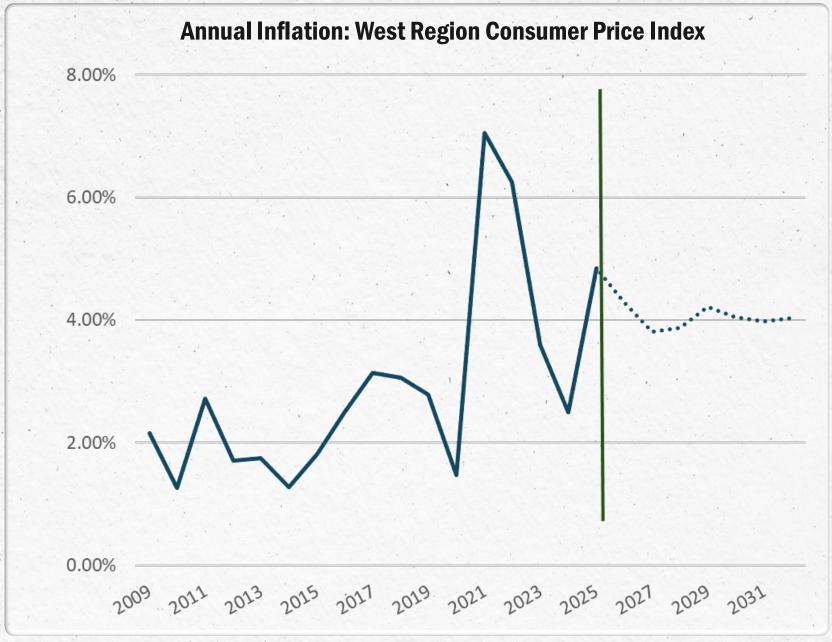


Stable Participation in Hunting and Fishing

Predicted cumulative inflation from 2020 through 2025 is 25%

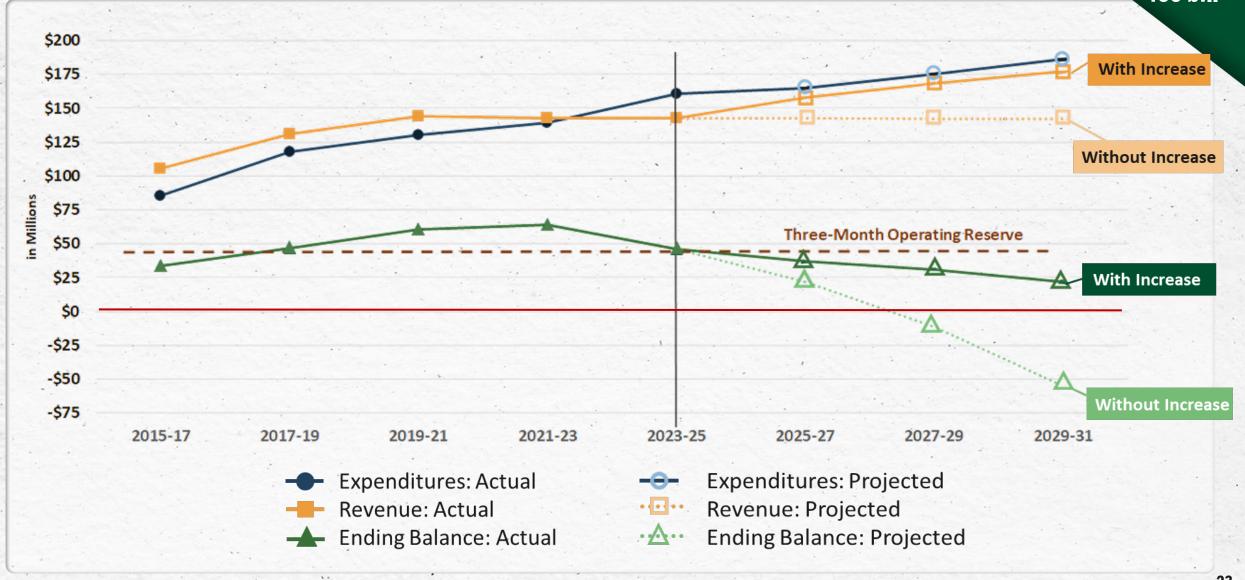

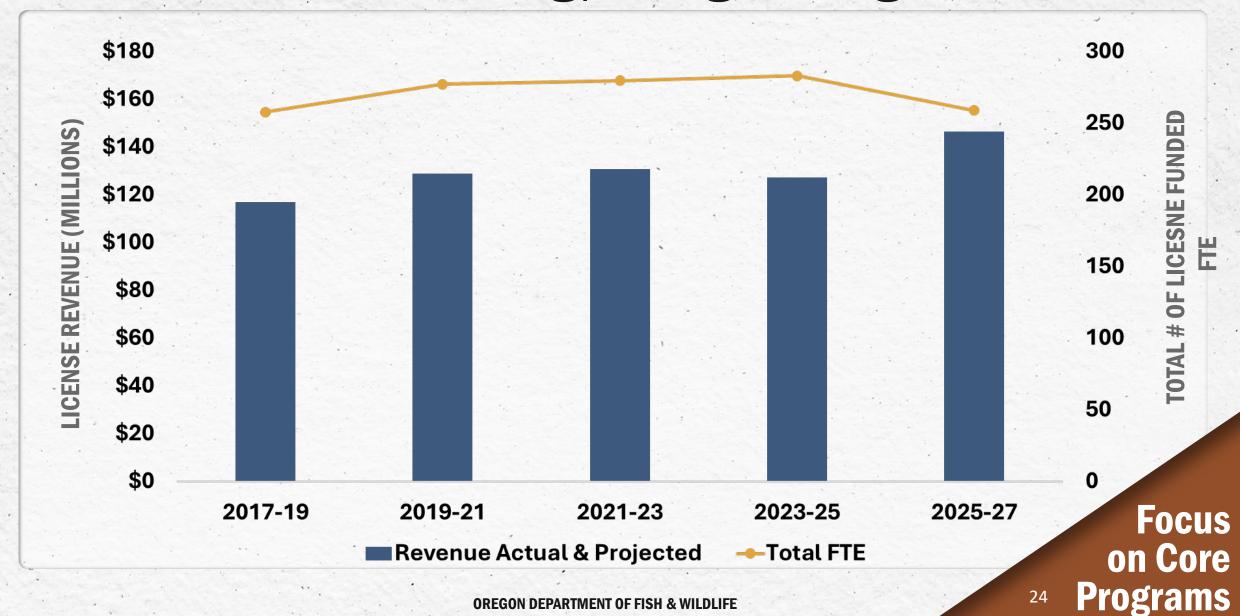
