

What is the Legislative Commission on Indian Services (LCIS)?



• LCIS serves as a permanent point of contact and on-going forum for consideration of tribal-state issues

2001 – SB 770, Oregon became the first state in the nation to pass a state-tribal government-to-government relations law (ORS 182.162 - .168)

Both LCIS and Oregon's ORS 182.162-.168 have established Oregon's national reputation of cooperation with tribal governments, conflict avoidance/resolution, and consequent reduction in litigation.

Primary Role of LCIS



Foster communication between:

- State and Tribal Governments
- Other Government and Tribal Governments
- Between Tribes

Between State entities, regarding Tribal matters
Enhance efforts to maximize understanding between parties
Build relationships & partnerships where feasible
Serve as a forum to address shared areas of concern







Statutory Responsibilities



- Monitor state agency actions and make recommendations for improvement or necessary contact with Tribes
- Consulted in the selection of Tribal representation for certain statutory Boards, Commissions, and Task Forces
- Collaborate with DAS to develop the Annual State Training on state-tribal relations
- Receive and review the Annual State Agency reports that document state agency interactions with individual Tribes
- Act as legislative liaison between the State and local agencies and tribal governments

Statutory Responsibilities cont.



Review archaeological permit applications and designate the appropriate Tribes that must be consulted

 Be notified in the event of the inadvertent discovery of human remains and to indicate which Tribes must be made aware of the discovery and included in the plans for reburial and related issues

Be consulted for certain other state permits





FY 21 – 23: Legislature approved position and funding for additional staff at LCIS (first additional FTE position since inception)

Lengthy process of creating position description, recruiting, and hiring led to Dr. Bullion starting September 2022





- Tribes: nine federally recognized Tribes of Oregon (including Tribal Police), Nez Perce Tribe (ID), Native Village of Kotzebue (AK), Fort Bidwell Indian Community (CA)
- State agencies: OSP, Oregon State Medical Examiner's Office, OPRD, ODF, Oregon DOJ, ODOT
- Federal Agencies: DOJ, USFS, US BLM
- Universities: U of O, OSU, PSU, Blue Mountain Community College, SOU
- Washington State Physical Anthropologists (Department of Archaeology and Historical Preservation)



Tribal Consultation

- Per statute, provided recommendations for Tribal consultation on archaeological permit applications, providing comments and conditions for acceptance related to fieldwork methodology and inadvertent discovery procedures
- Provided recommendations for Tribal consultation and coordination to local governments, utilities companies, private organizations, and independent contracting firms





- Worked closely with U of O and nine federally recognized Tribes of Oregon for repatriation of collection of ancestral remains that had been in the university's catalogue for decades
- Identified and coordinated the establishment of remote facilities for temporary storage of ancestral remains until final disposition





Procedural Document Development

- Standard Operating Procedure Documents
 - "Standard Operating Procedure for Notification and Involvement of the State Physical Anthropologist in Discoveries of Human Remains Cases"
 - "Standard Operating Procedure for Notification of Tribes in the Event of Human Remains Discoveries"
- Inadvertent Discovery Plans (IDPs) outline required procedures in the event of an unanticipated discovery of archaeological materials or human remains
 - IDP for Archaeologists and Cultural Resource Specialists
 - IDP for landowners and contractors (non-archaeologists)




- Training Presented & Training/Educational Materials Developed




- Ongoing Maintenance of Microsoft Teams database and portal, accessible by involved state agencies and Tribes
