



Requested State Investments in Student Aid and Scholarships

Oregon Opportunity Grant (OOG) - \$458 million

Oregon's largest need -based financial aid program for postsecondary students, helping them afford tuition, books, and other essential expenses while pursuing their degrees.

Oregon Tribal Student Grant - \$28.5 million

State financial aid program serving all eligible members of Oregon's nine federally recognized tribes.

Sports Lottery - \$19.7 million (LF)

Supports academic and athletic scholarships (particularly for non

-revenue generating sports and women's athletic s)

Requested State Investments in Student Success Programs

Strong Start (SB 604) - \$8.6 million

Strong Start funding supports programs at Oregon's seven public universities that help first -year students transition successfully into college and stay on track to graduate.

Continued Support for Benefits Navigators

State funding ensures every public university and community college campus has a dedicated Benefits Navigator to help students overcome financial barriers and focus on their education.


Basic Needs and Workforce Stabilization

A basic needs package to support students in overcoming barriers like food insecurity, housing instability, and textbook costs.

(HB 3182/3183) - \$22 million

Fee Remissions

Institutional funds set aside by universities to assist students in the payment of their tuition and educational fees






Comparison of Resident Student Aid at Oregon's Public Universities 2022-23


Washington's State Grant Lowers Net Cost for Residents (Family income <u>under \$30,000</u>)


Washington's State Grant Lowers Net Cost for Residents (Family income <u>\$30,000 to \$48,000</u>)

Washington's State Grant Lowers Net Cost for Residents (Family income <u>\$48,000 to \$75,000</u>)





Oregon Opportunity Grant (OOG)

The OOG is Oregon's largest need -based financial aid program for postsecondary students, helping them afford tuition, books, and other essential expenses while pursuing their degrees.

Funding the OOG at \$458 million will:



Increase award amounts to address rising costs of tuition and living expenses allowing institutional aid to reach further.



Expand eligibility by including students up to a higher income threshold (up to 10,000 on the Student Aid Index, from 8,000), putting college in reach for more Oregon students.



Help more students graduate by reducing financial barriers, encouraging enrollment, improving retention, and reducing student debt.

Support Oregon students with \$458 million in the Oregon Opportunity Grant

Support Oregon students with the full 1% lottery allocation for Sports Lottery Funding

- Supports scholarships for student athletes (particularly non -revenue generating sports and women's athletics)
- Supports academic scholarships for graduate students



Support Oregon students with continued funding for Benefits Navigators

Benefits Navigators:

- Help students understand eligibility and apply for benefits
- Provide warm referrals to federal, state, or local resources
- Establish student feedback channels
- Collect data and share best practices through the statewide consortium
