Emergency Homelessness Response Update

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Changing lives through the Emergency Response

- When Ash, a veteran, was laid off before receiving a sudden \$400 rent increase, he and his partner entered homelessness.
- They connected with LiFEBoat, a low-barrier shelter in Astoria, and quickly became involved in the organization as clients and contributors.
- After six months, Ash secured a full-time job there. Ash shared, “This was the first job that we found where you actually care about humans, where you’re taking care of people who don’t have anywhere else to go.”
- Through LiFEBoat, Ash and Kai have found employment, stability, and a sense of community.
- Ash’s message is simple: “It could be you tomorrow. Homeless people are people first — just like you and me. What we need is compassion, community, and kindness. That’s what saved us, and it’s what will save others.”

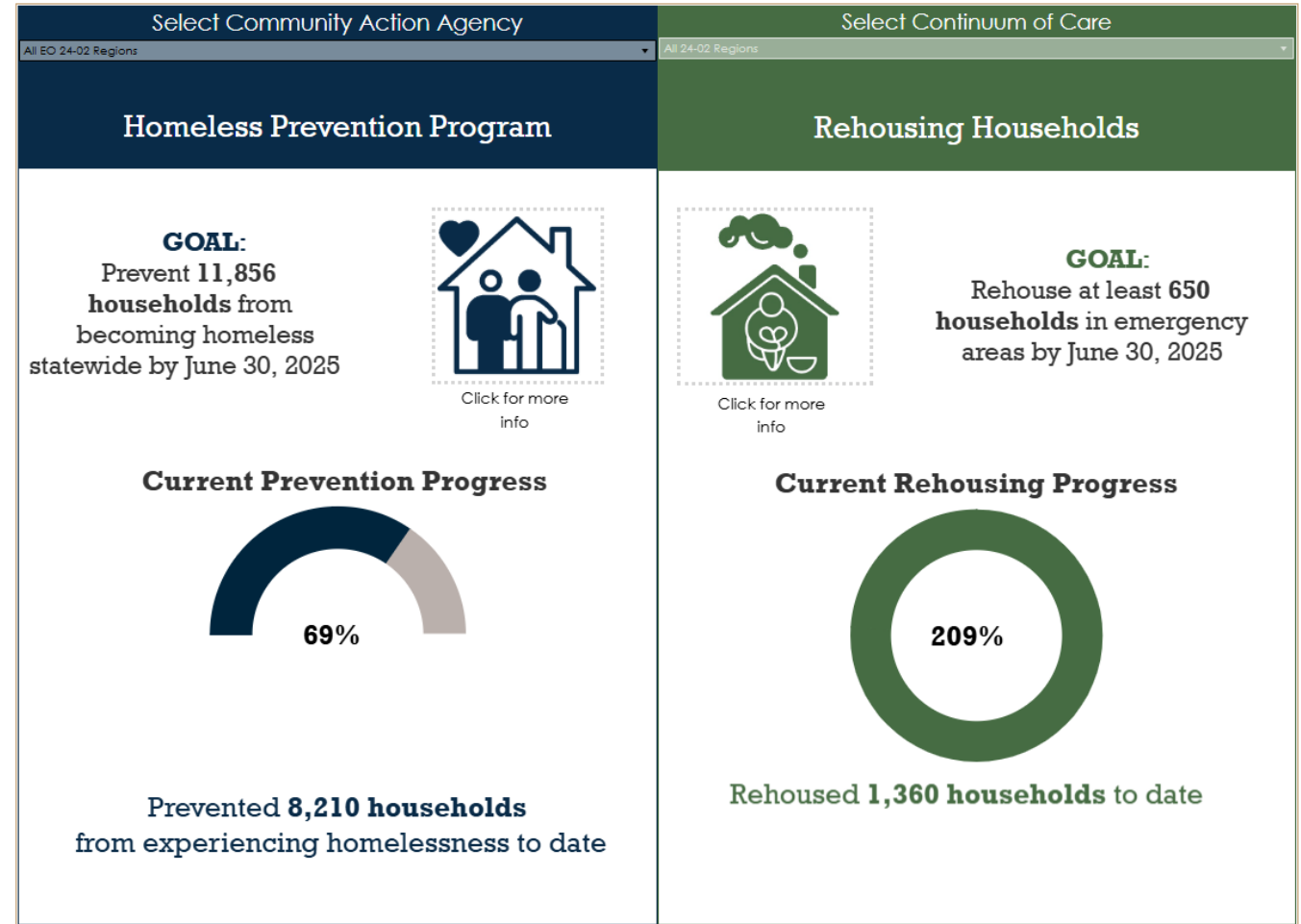
Yamhill Community Action Partnership (YCAP) reaches Functional Zero for unsheltered families

- Achieved through strategic collaboration and targeted resources
- House Bill 5019 and ORI funding provided essential support:
 - Covered deposits and initial rent for families
 - Enabled smooth transition to permanent housing
- Project Turnkey Program Implementation created a structured path from shelters to permanent housing
 - Addressed gap between shelters and stable living arrangements
- Focused on long-term stability through income support (employment/resources)



Building On What Works – EO 24-02

- Dashboard updated April 2025; reflects regions' progress on rehousing and eviction prevention goals through Feb. 28, 2025.
- EO 24-02 regions surpassed collective rehousing goal - on track to achieve prevention goals by end of biennium.

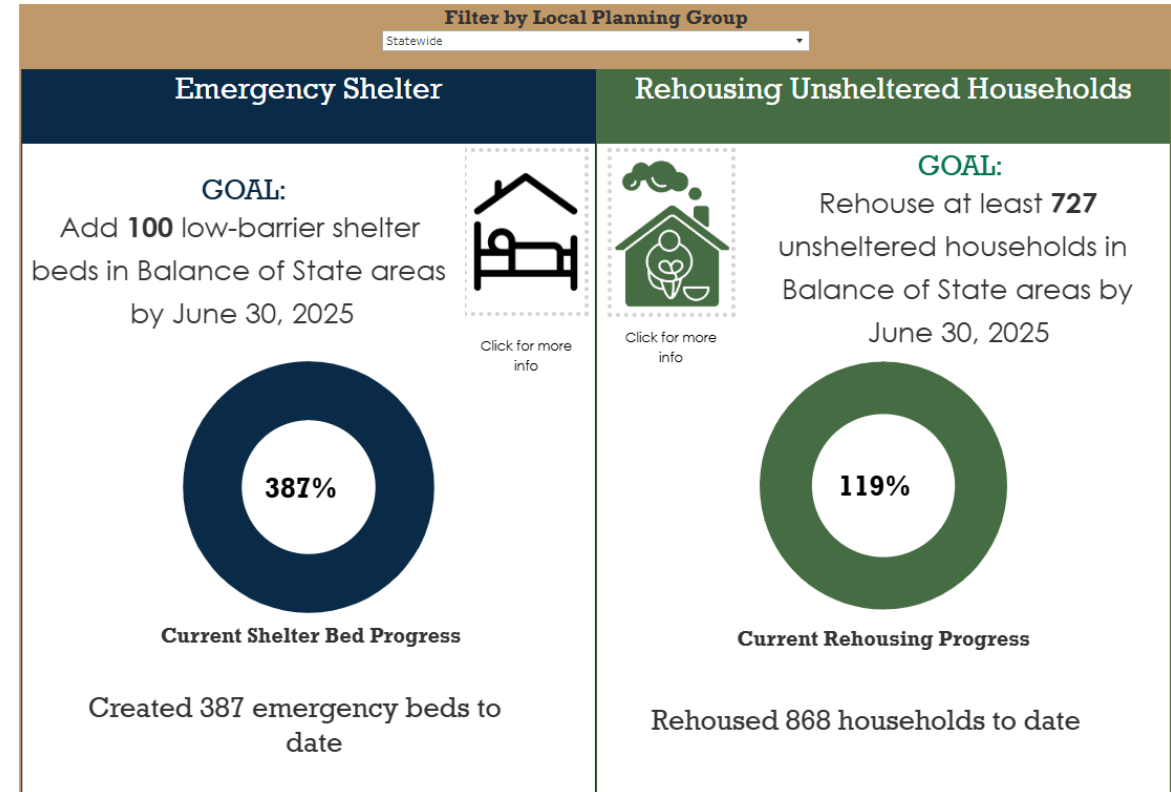
