BACKGROUND:

Leonard Warren Krug was born in 1957 in Ashland, Oregon. He graduated from Ashland High School in 1976 and attended Southern Oregon State College for two years. He began working with Pacific Power in a temporary summer position and remained with the company until his retirement, steadily rising through the ranks. He was also a proud member of Local 659 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

Leonard had a legendary sense of humor, and he always had a joke or two up his sleeve to lighten any occasion. His passion was hunting and fishing, and he worked tirelessly as a volunteer to share his passion with others. He was a board member of Oregon South Coast Fishermen and a founding member and president of the Oregon Anglers Alliance. He believed strongly in the need to protect fishing opportunities for future generations and was instrumental in the fight to keep Oregon's fisheries and hatcheries open. He brought the recreational and commercial fishing communities together with legislators, local and state officials, environmentalists, and tribal agencies to maintain and enhance sustainable fishing resources for all Oregonians.

Leonard was a humble man who was always willing to roll up his sleeves and do the hard work himself, behind the scenes, day after day. He devoted his life to his family, to his community, and to preserving nature's bounty for all Oregonians. He was a powerful force for positivity in the lives of others, and he was always available to listen and provide advice, sympathy, or his own experiences.

Leonard Krug passed away on October 6, 2024, doing what he most enjoyed: fishing and spending time with loved ones. He was survived by his beloved wife, Anna; his children, Chris, Andrew, Christa, and Jeff; and seven grandchildren. He will be forever remembered as a legendary angler and a tireless volunteer who touched countless lives and made the State of Oregon a better place.
