IMPACT OF CANNABIS ON Oregon Youth



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RISK AND PROTECTIVE FACTORS

Individual Risk

High impulsivity, emotional regulation impairment, psychiatric disorders, previous e-cigarette exposure, low perceived risk, high perceived drug accessibility

Individual Protective

Traits of optimism, having strong beliefs against substance use, high parental awareness of substance use disorder

Family Risk

Prenatal maternal smoking, low parental education, negligence, **poor supervision**, uncontrolled pocket money, and the presence of substance-using family members

Family Protective

Parents with good information and awareness about drug use, parental support and advice, evidence of strong parental disapproval

Community risk

Having peers who use drugs, access to unstructured activities.

Lack of regulation in advertising/promoting cannabis

Community Protective

School connectedness and adult support, structured activities (Recovery High Schools)

Policies to prohibit marketing to minors
