
For the 2025-27 biennium, efforts are being made to:

- 1. Support grantees with new reporting protocols, ensuring a secure participant data system.
- 2. Aligning with ODE's *Reimagined Accountability Framework* and creating data systems with agency partners to **match existing state data collections with grantee reported data**.
- 3. Coordinating with agency partners to track progress on state investments in educator workforce over time.

Oregon's K-12 Public School Staff, 2023-24




Across 197 public school districts and 1,273 public schools are **547,424 students** from kindergarten through grade 12.

Retention in Oregon's Educator Workforce

- Teachers have the lowest turnover rates compared to other staff; administrators, paraprofessionals, and support staff experience high turnover.
- Teacher turnover rates are highest among those entering the profession with zero years of experience; teachers with 16-20 years of experience have the lowest turnover rates.
- The proportion of **first-year teachers of color has more than doubled** in the last decade.
- Before COVID-19, turnover rates were relatively stable, however record high turnover rates for all educators in 2021-2022 and 2022-2023.


Regional Educator Networks

Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$42.7 Million

10 Grantees



Established in 2019, the Regional Educator Networks coordinates funding to programs and projects **open to all Oregon educators** through **professional development, mentoring, and career advancement opportunities**.





The Southern Oregon REN Coordinator leads a site visit in Medford.


- Grants to 10 RENs, sponsored by education service districts
- RENs serve educators in all 197 school districts, 19 education service districts, and 9 federally recognized Tribes in Oregon
- REN grants are formula based and range between \$1.8 and \$8.5 million for the 2023-25 biennium





Grants support local and regional partnerships that **recruit, advance, and retain educator candidates** including high school students, classified staff, and community members.

GYOs focus on **meeting high-need workforce areas** including bilingual/ multilingual educators, rural educators, culturally diverse educators, and Special Education educators.





Grants to help **recruit, retain, and sustain Tribal educators** and **improve student learning** in Oregon.

Objective 1: Develop and grow staff and educators to support American Indian/Alaska Native student success

Objective 2: Increase the number of AI/ AN identified teachers, paraprofessionals, and administrators employed in early learning, school districts, and post-secondary institutions at a rate comparable to that of Oregon's AI/ AN student population.


Tribal Grow Your Own Grants

Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$3.2 Million

All 9 Federally Recognized Tribes are Grantees



Grant awards up to \$375,000 to Tribes to develop GYO programs based on community needs.



Tribal Grow Your Own programs support 61 participants in the 2023-25 biennium.

Tribal Grow Your Own Grants Program Highlight

The Coquille Indian Tribe is developing a Tribal Language Educator GYO Program. The goal of the program is to increase language use across the Tribal community, increase capacity for Tribal language programs and to create language learning materials for the Tribe. In the next biennium, the long term goals are to recruit and incentivize Tribal language speakers, expand the program to include a second traditional language, and to provide opportunities for year one participants to be employed in the Tribal language department.

SB 283 Novice Educator Mentoring One-time grants to mentoring programs that provide novice teachers and administrators with a **formally assigned mentor** who will support their professiona development and improve the likelihood of their retention.

Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$8 Million

33 Grantees



- 33 grants awarded, including 9 Regional Educator Networks and 24 school districts.
- Technical assistance provided through statewide and regional communities of practice support program improvement.
- State evaluation initiative conducting surveys, interviews, and focus groups to measure effectiveness and inform future grant programs.

Oregon Public Educator Preparation Program Equity Grants

> 2023-25 Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$1.1 Million



Six Oregon public universities receive \$150,000 grants for implementation of Legislatively required Educator Equity Plans, supporting the recruitment, retention, and graduation of diverse educators. Technical assistance is provided through a Community of Practice for university faculty and staff.





Three Oregon public educator preparation programs are actively engaged in targeted strategies to *recruit candidates in rural communities* by:

- Improving access to education in rural communities
- Building partnerships with Tribal education departments
- Understanding attrition for education majors in the "middle years" who choose not to pursue an education degree

All Oregon public educator preparation programs are participating in a Community of Practice to *increase the retention of educator candidates through partnerships with regional K-12 school districts, ESDs and Tribes* by focusing on:

Oregon Teacher Scholars Program

2023-25 Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$5 Million




Provides funding for students who are culturally or linguistically diverse that are pursuing preliminary licensure for teaching, school counseling, social work, and psychology.

About the award:

- Maximum award amount is up to \$12,000 per academic year
- Renewable for up to two years of full-time enrollment

- In 2023, increased from \$10,000 to \$12,000 annual award
- In 2023, eligibility was expanded to include school counseling, social work, and psychology candidates
- Flexible award timeframe for part-time enrollment supports non-traditional students.
- Administrative costs for the biennium are \$671,452, including staffing.


Among university students, those with the OTSP Grant are **more often from underrepresented groups**: older, low-income, students of color, first-generation college students, compared to students overall.

Students with the OTSP Grant are **slightly more likely to graduate** than students overall: 87% compared to 85% (2018 through 2021 cohorts combined). Total OTSP Grant Students Enrolled at Public Universities per Year (New and Returning)



2023-25 Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$3.2 Million




Provides funding for students who are culturally or linguistically diverse that are enrolled in an approved administrator licensure program.

About the award:

- Maximum award amount is up to \$12,000 per academic year
- Renewable for up to two years of full-time enrollment





Oregon Licensure Expense Reimbursement Program

2023-25 Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$320,000



The Oregon Licensure Expense Reimbursement Program mitigates financial costs related to obtaining and renewing teacher, administrator, and personnel services licenses.

Career Pathways & Advancement in Careers

Program investments provide *critical financial supports* to educators by mitigating costs associated with *licensure fees*, which average approximately \$700 for new teachers.



Number of Licensed Educators Served, 2023-2024

This is the number of educators that have received reimbursement for licensure costs in the first year of the biennium.

This is the average reimbursement paid to participants through the program.

Multiple Measures Assessment **Options**

2023-25 Grant-in-Aid Budget: \$740,000




The Multiple Measures (MM) program enables teacher candidates to demonstrate content knowledge and teaching competencies through alternative assessments, such as portfolios and coursework evaluations, rather than relying solely on standardized tests.



Programmatic supports help *streamline pathways* for educator candidates by providing assessments, such as portfolios and coursework evaluations to demonstrate content knowledge or performance readiness.
