
What are OPDP and ArrayRx?

OPDP is the statutorily charged (*ORS 414.312*) program in **Oregon** instructed to:

- Be able to serve PEBB/OEBB, PERS, direct or indirect pharmacy purchasing state agencies, local governments, special governments, residents of Oregon, labor unions, and even private entities.
- Cooperate with other states or regional consortia.
- Maintain statewide program access Critical Access Pharmacies.

ArrayRx is the name used by the multi-state cooperative procurement group providing pharmacy benefit solutions for public sector entities nationwide.

Member States participating in ArrayRx each have their own state statutory authority to participate.





Oregon Footprint & Savings



OPDP currently serves over **300K** people via ArrayRx.

\$ 5,728,957 saved via passthrough pricing

\$ 115,362,000 invoiced via passthrough rebates

Savings and Rebates between 2022-2024

Value of ArrayRx

- ArrayRx, across all states, has delivered:
 - \$35 million in additional savings over contracted pricing by eliminating "spread pricing". True pricing pass-through in action! (2022-2024)
 - \$790 million in rebates to be passed through to our participants. True rebate pass-through in action! (2022-2024)

Critical Access Pharmacy (CAP)

Problem: Last year, Oregon was recognized as having the **second** worst level of pharmacy access in the nation.

Solution: In 2009, OPDP created CAP designation in Oregon Administrative Rule 431-121-2000. In 2023, OPDP revised CAP rules to focus on frontier, rural and urban settings with specific focus on high-poverty US census tracts versus the old rule that was solely geographic. CAPs are afforded improved reimbursement.

Oregon currently has 82 pharmacies with the CAP designation.

Closing Remarks
