- Our takeaway message: in order for Oregon to successfully build 36,000 new homes every year for ten years, we need sustained, statewide financial and legislative investments in our residential construction workforce.









The State of Our • A residential construction workforce pipeline issue **Residential Construction** Workforce Today



 All construction trades (framers, electricians, plumbers, HVAC, energy efficiency, etc.) are impacted by a labor shortage

• Aging workforce, Great Recession, COVD-19 all contribute to industry-wide labor shortage

 Under-funded and under-promoted/under-valued construction CTE programs in high schools and community colleges

 According to the American Immigration Council, 14% of Oregon's construction workforce are immigrants and 7% of the industry's workforce are undocumented immigrants





Primary Barriers to Construction Workforce Development



 Lack of access to hands-on training and on-site skillbuilding for students 18 and under

 Oregon's Rural and Frontier counties lack sufficient journeymen and so cannot meet the required 1:1 apprenticeship ratio nor prevailing wage grant requirements

 High school: lack of CTE programs, large class sizes, short class periods, and inability to travel to active job sites

 Inconsistent funding/program design/curriculum across the state's school districts and community colleges

Current administration's immigration policies





How Do We Effectively and Equitably Study Our Industry – and Then Take Action?

- Several years of legislative presentations on this topic, including May 2023 to House Committee on Housing and Homelessness
- February 2024: Governor Kotek's Housing Production Advisory Council's (HPAC) recommendations included those from the Workforce Shortages Work Group
- February 2025: Higher Education Coordinating Commission (HECC) Oregon Housing Production Workforce Assessment
 - Gaps in the study's data collection and industry respondent outreach methods
 - Designing & funding studies to meet the population we are trying to understand and serve







Potential Solutions

- Amend Oregon workforce labor law to allow safetycertified 16-year-olds to work on active job sites and use power tools
- HPAC: Consistent, sustained funding for high school, community college, and adjudicated programs
- HPAC: Work with DOE and HECC to adopt standard **BOLI**-approved curriculums statewide
- HPAC: Collaborating with Labor to expand licensed residential construction trade apprentice ratios to 2:1 for Rural and Frontier counties
- HPAC: Leverage existing state resources and workforce development infrastructure: state's 9 local Workforce Development Boards to serve as recruitment and training hubs
