## Oregon's small business owners have a lot to say about SB 426B:

"I have been a general contractor in the state of Oregon since 1999. Please don't complicate my job more than it already is and vote NO on this bill." – Jackson County business owner

"Every business owner would need to add a layer to the cost of doing business for potential unpaid wages down the chain of contractors' subcontractors and on. It will only serve to add to the cost of every project. In the end the consumer would foot the bill." **– Lane County business owner**

This will cause undo harm to my business by forcing me to be a labor regulator for other businesses. I am not BOLI, my job is not to handle disputes between laborers and their employers, and I absolutely should not be held responsible for another business' payroll!" – Clackamas County business owner

*"If you pass this law, you will make it very unappealing to do business with small independently owned businesses because the risk will be too high." – Washington County business owner* 

"This bill will add another layer of burden for property owners and developers, who already face substantial barriers throughout the process of getting approved and completing builds and may choose to not move forward with future project plans. BOLI, the CCB and Revenue departments all have authority in their purview to enforce the laws that already exist on the books.
