Subject: Please vote No on SB 916

Dear Representative Ed Diehl:

Thank you for your support of our schools, educators, and students this legislative session. I know it has been even more difficult this year with declining state revenues and federal budget uncertainties.

We are writing today to urge you to oppose SB 916. While our districts are grateful for the prioritization of K-12 funding by the Legislature, passage of this bill will likely create serious financial strain and add a confusing administrative burden for school districts all across Oregon. **We must ensure that every dollar that our district receives improves outcomes and directly benefits our students.**

Just like the Legislature, we have had to make hard budget choices with the resources available to us.

In all three of our districts we have had to reduce budgets, freeze or reduce hiring of employees that directly support students, and try to prepare for the added uncertainty of an economic downturn in the economy. At Santiam Canyon School District, loss of enrollment due to wildfires causes a lot of strain on our budget. At North Santiam School District, reducing our budget over \$800,000 for the next school year causes strain on maintaining quality programs for all students. At Cascade School District, reducing our budget by over \$2,000,000 to cover the P.E.R.S. retirement costs for the next school year causes strain on continuing important direct instruction to every student.

There is also the added uncertainty about cuts to federal education funding and their impact on our most vulnerable students. We cannot risk additional budget uncertainty or divert limited state resources away from our classrooms.

Before casting your vote on SB 916, we respectfully ask you to consider the following:

- **SB 916 will create new financial pressures on districts:** School districts pay unemployment benefits on a dollar for dollar basis. While we appreciate the efforts to make the bill “cost neutral” for districts, the byzantine rules of unemployment insurance raise serious implementation concerns and it may be months, or longer, before districts recover financially. In the meantime, those dollars can no longer be used for their original intent - providing educational services and supports to our students.
- **SB 916 will raise the stakes and create imbalance during collective bargaining:** While a few other states have passed similar legislation, their public employees are not legally allowed to strike. SB 916 introduces additional uncertainty into challenging contract negotiations and the threat of a strike will force districts to agree to contracts they can't afford to avoid the negative impacts on students.

- **Oregon has experienced record-long teacher strikes without SB 916 – more are likely if it passes:** Our teachers and educators deserve to be fairly compensated for the work they do supporting our students. But with rising costs and looming federal cuts, school districts are facing challenging budget realities. SB 916 lessens the urgency to sit together at the bargaining table and do the hard work to reach a compromise that centers the needs of our students.

At a time when districts across Oregon are facing difficult budget environments, the last thing we need is more fiscal uncertainty in our collective bargaining and budget processes. We all believe passage of SB 916 would seriously impact our ability to serve our students and maximize the Legislature's investment in schools.

Please vote "No" on SB 916 and preserve our ability to focus on serving students.
