WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

The measure establishes the Animal Welfare Trust to provide grants to entities that provide veterinary support services in low-income households or underserved communities.

Detailed Summary

- Establishes the Animal Welfare Trust (Trust) to pursue public and private grants, raise funds from private sources, and to provide grants to the following entities that provide veterinary support services related to animals in low-income households or underserved communities:
- o Agencies
- Animal rescue entities
- o Community service providers
- o Veterinary clinics
- Establishes membership, quorum, voting, meeting, and staffing requirements, appointment timelines, and reimbursement procedures.
- Establishes the Animal Welfare Fund in the State Treasury consisting of grants, donations, contributions or gifts, legislatively appropriated moneys, interest, and other moneys deposited in the fund from any source.
- Authorizes reimbursement to the Oregon Department of Agriculture and other agencies for administration costs, not to exceed five percent of total moneys deposited in Fund per biennium.
- Requires the Trust to submit a progress report to the Legislative Assembly by March 31 of even-numbered years and specifies the first report to be submitted by March 31, 2028.

ISSUES DISCUSSED:

- Need for the program to be a state sanctioned trust instead of a non-profit organization
- Process of developing a state license plate program
- Fiscal impact of the measure

EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:

The amendment removes the Trust's authorization to reimburse the State Treasurer for administrative costs.

BACKGROUND:

Veterinary support services can encompass a range of essential care, including spaying and neutering, vaccinations, and emergency veterinary treatments. Oregon does not have a state-administered program dedicated to assisting low-income households with access to these services.
