# WHAT THE MEASURE DOES:

The measure directs the Secretary of State to accept a Commercial Mail Receiving Agency (CMRA) as a business entity's principal office if the physical street address of the business entity's principal executive offices is the same as that of the CMRA. The measure directs the Secretary of State to protect such addresses from public disclosure if requested. Declares an emergency and is effective on passage.

# **EFFECT OF AMENDMENT:**

No amendment.

# **BACKGROUND:**

Current law requires businesses to include a physical street address when they register with the Secretary of State. It specifies that the physical address may not be a Commercial Mail Receiving Agency (CMRA), mail forwarding service, or virtual office. House Bill 2191 (2017) enacted these changes, aiming to prevent shell companies from conducting illegal activities in Oregon. In 2023, the United States Postal Service (USPS) updated its regulations to broaden the definition of CMRAs, classifying many legitimate office spaces as CMRAs, including co-working spaces and law office suites. Due to this change, an increasing number of businesses have been unable to register at their office location because they receive mail through a shared system. Some business owners are using their home addresses, which raises privacy concerns.
