SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act adds private higher learning schools to the direct admissions program created by HECC. (Flesch Readability Score: 61.8).

Includes [*independent institutions*] certain private post-secondary institutions in the direct admissions program established by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission.

2 Relating to direct admissions; amending ORS 350.075.

3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

4 **SECTION 1.** ORS 350.075, as amended by section 11, chapter 95, Oregon Laws 2024, is amended 5 to read:

6 350.075. (1) As used in this section, "student access programs" means scholarship, loan, grant 7 and access programs described in ORS chapter 348.

8 (2) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall be guided by the legislative findings

9 in ORS 341.009, 350.001 and 350.005 and the goals and mission of post-secondary education set forth
10 in ORS 350.009 and 350.014.

11 (3) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall:

(a) Develop state goals for the state post-secondary education system, including community col leges and public universities listed in ORS 352.002, and for student access programs.

(b) Determine strategic investments in the state's community colleges, public universities and
student access programs necessary to achieve state post-secondary education goals.

(c) Coordinate the post-secondary elements of data collection and structure, with the advice and
recommendation of the state's independent institutions, community colleges and public universities,
as appropriate, in order to construct a state longitudinal data system.

(d) Adopt a strategic plan for achieving state post-secondary education goals, taking into consideration the contributions of this state's independent institutions, philanthropic organizations and other organizations dedicated to helping Oregonians reach state goals. State post-secondary education goals as described in this section should include, but need not be limited to:

23 (A) Increasing the educational attainment of the population;

(B) Increasing this state's global economic competitiveness and the quality of life of its resi-dents;

26 (C) Ensuring affordable access for qualified Oregon students at each college or public university;

(D) Removing barriers to on-time completion; and 1 2 (E) Tracking progress toward meeting the state's post-secondary education goals established in the strategic plan described in this paragraph. 3 (e)(A) Each biennium, after receiving funding requests from the state's community colleges and 4 public universities as authorized by law, recommend to the Governor a consolidated higher educa-5 tion agency request budget aligned with the strategic plan described in paragraph (d) of this sub-6 7 section, including appropriations for: (i) Student access programs; 8 9 (ii) Public universities listed in ORS 352.002, including but not limited to education and general 10 operations, statewide public services and state-funded debt service; (iii) Community colleges, including but not limited to education and general operations and 11 12 state-funded debt service; 13 (iv) New facilities or programs; (v) Capital improvements and deferred maintenance; 14 15 (vi) Special initiatives and investments; and 16 (vii) Any other program, duty or function a public university listed in ORS 352.002 is authorized 17 to undertake. 18 (B) In the development of the consolidated higher education agency request budget: (i) Determine the costs necessary to provide quality post-secondary education; 19 (ii) Solicit input from educators, education policy experts, appropriate legislative committees, 20students and other persons interested in the development of the funding model; and 2122(iii) Solicit public input regarding educational priorities. 23(f) Adopt rules governing the distribution of appropriations from the Legislative Assembly to community colleges, public universities listed in ORS 352.002 and student access programs. These 24 rules must be based on allocation formulas developed in consultation with the state's community 25colleges and public universities, as appropriate. 2627(g) Approve or disapprove any significant change to the academic program of a community college or a public university listed in ORS 352.002. In reaching a decision under this paragraph, the 28commission shall consider the recommendation from the community college or public university 2930 seeking to make the change to an academic program that is issued pursuant to the obligation of the 31 governing board of a community college or public university to review and approve academic pro-32grams. The commission shall ensure that approved programs: (A) Are consistent with the mission statement of the community college or public university; 33 34 (B) Do not unnecessarily duplicate academic programs offered by Oregon's other community 35 colleges or public universities; (C) Are not located in a geographic area that will cause undue hardship to Oregon's other 36 37 community colleges or public universities; and 38 (D) Are allocated among Oregon's community colleges and public universities to maximize the achievement of statewide needs and requirements. 39 40 (h) For public universities listed in ORS 352.002: (A) Approve the mission statement adopted by a governing board of a public university. 41 (B) Review and determine whether a proposed annual increase of resident undergraduate en-42 rollment fees of greater than five percent is appropriate. 43

44 (C) Advise the Governor and the Legislative Assembly on issues of university governance.

45 (D) Approve and authorize degrees.

(E) Perform the evaluation and certification required by ORS 350.095. 1

2 (i) Authorize degrees to be offered by independent post-secondary institutions in this state under 3 ORS 348.594 to 348.615.

(j) Oversee the licensing of career schools under ORS 345.010 to 345.340.

(k) Have the authority to enter into and administer interstate agreements regarding the pro-5 vision of post-secondary distance education. The participation by an educational institution that is 6 7 not based in this state in distance learning courses or programs that are part of an interstate agreement entered into and administered under this paragraph does not constitute operating in this 8 9 state for purposes of ORS 348.594 to 348.615. The commission, by rule, may impose a fee on any 10 educational institution that seeks to operate under or participate in such interstate agreements. The fee amount shall be established to recover designated expenses incurred by the commission in par-11 12 ticipating in such agreements.

13 (L) Administer a statewide longitudinal data system.

(m) In coordination with the Department of Education, the Employment Department and other 14 15 state agencies, conduct statewide longitudinal studies and reporting of early learning, kindergarten through grade 12 education, higher education and workforce programs. For the purposes of this 16 17 paragraph:

18 (A) The commission shall enter into written interagency agreements with the Department of 19 Education, the Employment Department and any other state agencies necessary for conducting 20statewide longitudinal studies and reporting.

(B) The commission may share data from the statewide longitudinal data system with persons 2122or public bodies. For purposes of this subparagraph, the commission shall adopt rules to establish 23procedures for requesting or sharing data and may enter into written agreements for sharing data.

(C) The commission is considered an authorized representative of state educational agencies 24 under applicable state and federal law for purposes of accessing, compiling and storing student data 25for research, audit and evaluation purposes. 26

27(n) Establish a direct admissions program for community colleges in this state and public universities listed in ORS 352.002. The program may include, upon the consent of the institution, 28any private post-secondary institution that meets the criteria set forth in ORS 348.597 (2)(a). 2930 The commission shall adopt rules to:

31 (A) Establish a method for the collection of student data necessary to implement the program, 32which may include collaborating with the Department of Education to the extent necessary to collect the student data; and 33

34 (B) Maximize opportunities for underserved students and first generation college students to 35 participate in the program.

(4)(a) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall implement a process to review and 36 37 appropriately act on student complaints regarding any school operating in this state. As part of the 38 process implemented under this subsection, the commission may:

(A) Receive student complaints from students regarding a school;

(B) Specify the type of information that must be included in a student complaint; 40

(C) Investigate and resolve student complaints that relate to state financial aid; 41

(D) Refer a student complaint to another entity for investigation and resolution as provided in 42 paragraph (b) of this subsection; 43

(E) Adopt rules to implement the provisions of this subsection; and 44

(F) Enter into agreements to implement the provisions of this subsection. 45

(b) The commission may refer the investigation and resolution of a student complaint to: 1 2 (A) An appropriate state agency if the complaint alleges that a school has violated a state law concerning consumer protection, civil rights, employment rights or environmental quality; 3 (B) A school's accrediting association if the complaint relates to the school's authorization to 4 offer academic degree programs or to the quality of the school's academic degree programs; or 5 (C) The school at which the student is enrolled if the commission determines that the complaint 6 should be resolved through the school's internal review process. 7 (c) As used in this subsection: 8 9 (A)(i) "School" means an independent institution of higher education that meets the requirements of ORS 348.597 (2)(a). 10 (ii) "School" does not mean a school that is exempt from ORS 348.594 to 348.615 under ORS 11 12 348.597 (2)(b) or (c). 13 (B) "Student" means a person who is enrolled at a school for the purpose of obtaining a degree, certificate or other recognized educational credential offered by that school. 14 15 (5) A student complaint that is received by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, including but not limited to a student complaint filed under subsection (4) of this section, is not sub-16 ject to disclosure under ORS 192.311 to 192.478. 17 18 (6) In addition to the duties described in subsections (2) to (4) of this section, the Higher Edu-19 cation Coordinating Commission shall advise the Legislative Assembly, the Governor, community 20colleges, public universities and other state boards and commissions on policies in order to: (a) Ensure or improve access to higher education by diverse and underserved populations. 2122(b) Encourage student success and completion initiatives. (c) Improve the coordination of the provision of educational services, including: 23(A) Transfers and coenrollment throughout the higher education system; 24 (B) Accelerated college credit programs for high school students; 25(C) Applied baccalaureate and other transfer degrees; 2627(D) Programs and grants that span multiple institutions; and (E) Reciprocity agreements with other states. 28(d) In coordination with the State Board of Education, enhance the use and quality of dual 2930 credit, career and technical pathways and efforts to create a culture of college attendance in this 31 state. (e) In coordination with the State Workforce and Talent Development Board, local workforce 32development boards, the Oregon Health and Science University and independent institutions, ensure 33 34 that the state's colleges and universities offer programs in high-demand occupations that meet 35 Oregon's workforce needs. (f) Improve economies of scale by encouraging and facilitating the use of the shared services 36 37 among post-secondary institutions in this state. 38 (7) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission, in a manner consistent with ORS chapter 39 183, may adopt administrative rules. 40 (8) With the exception of the rulemaking authority granted in subsection (7) of this section, the Higher Education Coordinating Commission may delegate any of its powers, duties or functions to 41 a committee of the commission or to the executive director of the commission. 42(9) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may, subject to the Public Contracting Code, 43 enter into contracts and agreements, including grant agreements, with public and private entities 44

for those higher education and workforce development activities that are consistent with ORS

1 350.001 and 350.005, with the policies set forth in ORS chapters 341 and 348 and with statutory 2 policies related to career schools and public universities.

3 (10)(a) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may exercise only powers, duties and 4 functions expressly granted by the Legislative Assembly. Except as otherwise expressly provided by 5 law, all other authorities reside at the institutional level with the respective boards of the post-6 secondary institutions.

7 (b) The commission has implied and direct authority to implement the powers, duties and func-8 tions expressly granted to the commission by the Legislative Assembly.

9 (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b) of this subsection, the commission may not exercise any au-10 thority, express or implied, statutorily provided to a governing board of a public university listed in 11 ORS 352.002 or a community college operated under ORS chapter 341.

12
