House Bill 2573

Sponsored by Representatives GRAYBER, SMITH G, Senator SMITH DB; Senator CAMPOS (Presession filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act would make changes to law related to medical services for people living in long term care settings. (Flesch Readability Score: 62.8).

Modifies the requirements for the Senior Emergency Medical Services Innovation Program.

Extends sunsets for the program and the prohibition on local government regulation of long term care facilities and residential care facilities.

Takes effect on the 91st day following adjournment sine die.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

2 Relating to emergency medical services for residents in long term care settings; amending sections

1, 5 and 6, chapter 616, Oregon Laws 2021, and section 45, chapter 32, Oregon Laws 2024; and
 prescribing an effective date.

5 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

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6 **SECTION 1.** Sections 1, chapter 616, Oregon Laws 2021, is amended to read:

7 Sec. 1. (1) As used in this section:

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8 (a) "Long term care facility" has the meaning given that term in ORS 442.015.

9 (b) "Residential care facility" has the meaning given that term in ORS 443.400.

(c) "Senior emergency medical services" means services provided by an emergency medical ser vices provider, as defined in ORS 682.025, to residents of a long term care facility or residential care
 facility.

(2)[(a)] The Senior Emergency Medical Services Innovation Program is established in the De partment of Human Services. The purpose of the program is to [select,] provide funding to and
 monitor local public sector pilot projects that:

16 [(A)] (a) Provide innovative strategies for addressing the emergency medical services needs of 17 this state's increasing number of aging residents who receive care and services in residential care 18 facilities and long term care facilities;

19 [(B)] (b) Encourage the efficient and appropriate use of senior emergency medical services;

20 [(C)] (c) Reduce the overall costs of senior emergency medical services while promoting quality 21 emergency medical services; and

[(D)] (d) Encourage unique community-based responses to challenges faced by local communities
 in meeting their residents' needs for senior emergency medical services.

[(b) The department shall provide funding to a pilot project described in this subsection from moneys deposited in the Quality Care Fund established under ORS 443.001.]

- (3) The Senior Emergency Medical Services [Advisory] Council is established consisting of the
 following 10 members appointed by the Governor:
- 28 (a) One member representing long term care facilities;

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(b) One member representing residential care facilities; 1 2 (c) One member who is a nurse or clinician in a long term care facility or a residential care facility: 3 (d) One member representing an urban or suburban fire department or a city fire department 4 that provides emergency medical services; 5 (e) One member representing a rural fire protection district organized under ORS chapter 478; 6 (f) One member who enters into agreements with a public sector entity to provide emergency 7 medical services; 8 9 (g) One member who is a physician licensed under ORS chapter 677 or other health care prac-10 titioner with expertise in emergency medical services; (h) One member representing the Oregon Health Authority who has expertise in emergency 11 12 medical services and trauma response; 13 (i) One member representing private emergency medical services providers; and (j) One member who is a: 14 (A) Family member of a resident of a long term care facility or residential care facility; 15 (B) Caregiver in a long term care facility or residential care facility; or 16 (C) Member or representative of a group that advocates for seniors residing in long term care 17 facilities or residential care facilities. 18 (4) The council shall: 19 (a) Evaluate, deliberate on and vote to approve, reject or request resubmission of pilot 20project proposals that the council determines satisfy the requirements of subsection (2) of 2122this section. (D) The availability of funds in the Quality Care Fund established under ORS 443.001. 28(b) Advise and make recommendations to the Department of Human Services on: 2930 [(a)] (A) Minimum standards and data reporting requirements for pilot projects funded through 31 the program; and 32[(b) The application process and timelines for the consideration of applications for funding of pilot projects;] 33 34 [(c) The criteria for the selection of pilot projects to participate in the program; and] 35 [(d)] (**B**) Other factors identified by the council as likely to facilitate successful pilot projects. (c) Submit to the department requests for funding of pilot projects approved by the 36 37 council in an amount not to exceed \$1 million per project. (5) A majority of the members of the council constitutes a quorum for the transaction of busi-3839 ness. 40 (6) Official action by the council requires the approval of a majority of the members of the council. 41 (7) The council shall elect one of its members to serve as chairperson. 42 (8) If there is a vacancy for any cause, the Governor shall make an appointment to become im-43 mediately effective. 44 (9) The council shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or of a 45

majority of the members of the council. 1 2 (10) The council may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the council. (15) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, are directed to assist the 13 council in the performance of the duties of the council and, to the extent permitted by laws relating 14 15 to confidentiality, to furnish information and advice the members of the council consider necessary 16 to perform their duties.
