A-Engrossed House Bill 2858

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act creates new systems and structures to plan and improve emergency response in the state. (Flesch Readability Score: 68.9).

Creates statewide preparedness offices in the Oregon Department of Administrative Services and the Oregon Department of Public Safety Standards and Training. Imposes duties on the offices relating to statewide coordination of emergency management.

[Creates the Commission on Statewide Intergovernmental Emergency Response Training Facilities and Programming. Directs the commission to develop and carry out a strategic plan for investments to *improve statewide emergency preparedness.*] **Authorizes issuance of lottery bonds to make grants for public safety projects.** Creates the Statewide Regional Training Office within the Department of Public Safety Stan-

dards and Training. Directs the office to manage and operate facilities for emergency response training.

[Creates the Task Force on Twenty-first Century Emergency Management Local Governance. Directs the task force to evaluate models for conducting local and regional emergency management operations.]

Requires all state agencies to designate employees to act as liaisons for emergency management operations or for preparing continuity of governance plans. Requires each county to submit biennial reports on the state of the county's emergency

preparedness.

Delays the date on which responsibility for management of the emergency notification system is transferred to the Oregon Department of Emergency Management.

A BILL FOR AN ACT

Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

Relating to emergency management; creating new provisions; amending ORS 401.913 and section
155b, chapter 539, Oregon Laws 2021; and declaring an emergency.
Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. (1) The Oregon Statewide Preparedness Authority for Response Training and
Intergovernmental Continuity of Imperative Services is established as an office within the
Oregon Department of Administrative Services. The office is to be known as and may be
cited as SPARTICIS.
(2) The office is under the supervision and control of the State Resilience Officer, who
is responsible for the performance of the duties, functions and powers of the office.
(3) For purposes of administration, the State Resilience Officer may organize and reor-
ganize the office and appoint administrative personnel as the State Resilience Officer con-

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(4) The State Resilience Officer may divide the functions of the office into administrative 1 2 divisions. Each individual appointed under this 4 subsection must be well qualified by technical training and experience in the functions to be 5 performed by the individual. 6 (5) The office shall: 7 (a) Provide administrative and operational support for the development of strategic im-8 9 provements in facilities and programming; (b) Provide oversight for prioritization of funding associated with emergency-related 10 equipment and functions implemented throughout the state; 11 12(c) Provide standardization across state agencies for continuity of governance planning, 13 exercises and preparedness; (d) Serve as a platform for development, implementation and assessment of policies 14 15 adopted by the State Resilience Officer and provide administrative and operational support 16as directed by the State Resilience Officer; (e) Carry out the duties imposed by sections 2 to 11 of this 2025 Act; and 1718 (f) Perform such other duties as may be assigned to the office. 19 (6) The office shall periodically report to the Legislative Assembly on the office's activities, priorities and project outcomes. 20(7) The office may adopt rules as necessary to carry out its duties. 2122SECTION 2. (1) SPARTICIS shall oversee state strategy relating to regional facilities and capacity related to emergency preparedness. 23(2) The office shall identify, prioritize and assist in obtaining funding for projects to 2425construct or improve regional facilities. (3) The office shall ensure that the state has a combination of fixed, mobile and trans-2627portable supplies that is appropriate for emergency management purposes. (4) The office shall make expenditures, including grants to local governments, as defined 28in ORS 174.116, and private entities, that are consistent with the goal of enhancing regional 2930 facilities related to emergency management. The office may condition grants on matching 31 contributions or other contributions from recipients. (5) The office shall monitor the progress of all projects overseen by the office under this 32section and publish quarterly reports on such progress. 33 34 (6) The office shall provide administrative support as necessary to other interagency or 35 intergovernmental bodies related to emergency management. SECTION 3. The Regional Facilities Account is established in the State Treasury, sepa-36 37 rate and distinct from the General Fund. The account consists of moneys appropriated, al-38 located, deposited or transferred to the account by the Legislative Assembly or otherwise. Moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Department of Admin-39 istrative Services for SPARTICIS to carry out the provisions of section 2 of this 2025 Act. 40 SECTION 4. (1) SPARTICIS shall oversee collaboration, cooperation and coordination 41 42between the state and: (a) Organizations involved in the development, implementation and sustainment of the 43 emergency supplies and equipment stockpile plan described in ORS 401.111; 44 (b) Organizations involved in the development, implementation and sustainment of the 45

1 emergency preparedness equipment grant program described in ORS 401.551; and

2 (c) Organizations involved in other stockpile or resilience grant programs carried out by 3 state agencies.

4 (2) The office may take actions as necessary to ensure that supplies, equipment and other 5 materials are appropriately staged in preparation for emergencies.

6 (3) The office shall monitor the progress of all projects overseen by the office under this 7 section and publish quarterly reports on such progress.

8 <u>SECTION 5.</u> The Regional Stockpile Support Account is established in the State Treasury, 9 separate and distinct from the General Fund. The account consists of moneys appropriated, 10 allocated, deposited or transferred to the account by the Legislative Assembly or otherwise. 11 Moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Department of Admin-12 istrative Services for SPARTICIS to carry out the provisions of section 4 of this 2025 Act.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> (1) SPARTICIS shall enhance the emergency preparedness of this state
 through education and training as described in this section.

(2) The office shall collaborate, cooperate and coordinate with appropriate private and public entities with responsibility for the emergency support functions identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency to develop regionally specific public safety education, live exercises and training with the goal of improving statewide emergency preparedness.

(3) The office shall develop, or support the development of, multidisciplinary, all-hazards
 emergency response training and exercises.

(4) The office shall monitor the progress of all projects overseen by the office under this
 section and publish quarterly reports on such progress.

SECTION 7. The Regional Training Account is established in the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. The account consists of moneys appropriated, allocated, deposited or transferred to the account by the Legislative Assembly or otherwise. Moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Department of Administrative Services for SPARTICIS to carry out the provisions of section 6 of this 2025 Act.

29 <u>SECTION 8.</u> (1) SPARTICIS shall collaborate, cooperate and coordinate with state agen-30 cies and local governments to develop and standardize measures for continuity of governance 31 during and after an emergency that affects normal government operations.

(2) The office shall develop training for state agencies and local governments related to
 continuity of governance. The office may perform evaluations of continuity of governance
 measures adopted by state agencies and local governments.

(3) The office shall monitor development of continuity of governance measures by state
 agencies and local governments and publish quarterly reports on such development until the
 office determines that sufficient measures are in place statewide.

(4) The office may provide administrative and operational support for policies, programs
 and initiatives of the State Resilience Officer related to continuity of governance.

40 <u>SECTION 9.</u> The Statewide Continuity of Governance Account is established in the State 41 Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. The account consists of moneys ap-42 propriated, allocated, deposited or transferred to the account by the Legislative Assembly 43 or otherwise. Moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Depart-44 ment of Administrative Services for SPARTICIS to carry out the provisions of section 8 of 45 this 2025 Act.

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SECTION 10. (1) SPARTICIS shall collaborate, cooperate and coordinate with public and 1 2 private entities with responsibility for the emergency support functions identified by the Federal Emergency Management Agency to identify and implement strategic investments to 3 enhance the emergency resilience of the state. 4 (2) The office may issue grants to support strategic investments described in subsection 5 (1) of this section. 6 (3) The office shall monitor the progress of projects funded under this section and shall 7 evaluate, using objective measurements, the improvements to statewide emergency 8 9 preparedness attributable to such projects. The office shall publish quarterly reports on such 10 progress and improvements. SECTION 11. The Strategic Partnership Account is established in the State Treasury, 11 12 separate and distinct from the General Fund. The account consists of moneys appropriated, 13 allocated, deposited or transferred to the account by the Legislative Assembly or otherwise. Moneys in the account are continuously appropriated to the Oregon Department of Admin-14 15 istrative Services for SPARTICIS to carry out the provisions of section 10 of this 2025 Act. 16 SPARC 17 18 19 SECTION 12. (1) SPARC shall develop and maintain a database to be known as the All-43 Hazards Statewide Responder Database. The database is to be a centralized and comprehen-44 sive repository of information regarding individuals and entities with skills or responsibilities 45

relevant to emergency management. 1 2 (2) The office shall negotiate any data sharing agreements with public and private entities necessary to develop or maintain the database. 3 (3) The office shall collaborate, cooperate and coordinate with all appropriate private and 4 public entities with responsibility for the emergency support functions identified by the 5 Federal Emergency Management Agency to develop and maintain the database. 6 (4) In developing the database, the office shall prioritize the inclusion of formalized 7 emergency response exercise, experience and training information derived from the Emer-8 9 gency Management Institute of the Federal Emergency Management Agency, the emergency health care provider registry established under ORS 401.651 to 401.670 and the Department 10 of Public Safety Standards and Training. 11 12(5) The office shall identify, implement and support an appropriate learning management 13 system to be used in conjunction with the database. (6) The office shall prepare and publish an annual report on the development, mainte-14 15 nance and use of the database. The report must include assessments and recommendations for improvement relating to the operation and security of the database. 16

(7) All agencies of state government, as defined in ORS 174.111, shall assist the office in carrying out the provisions of this section and, to the extent permitted by laws relating to confidentiality, shall furnish information and advice the office considers necessary to carry out those provisions.

21 <u>SECTION 14.</u> (1) The All-Hazards Statewide Responder Database Oversight Authority is 22 created within the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training. The authority con-23 sists of:

(a) The SPARC facilitator;

(b) One member appointed by the Director of the Oregon Department of Emergency
 Management to represent the Oregon Department of Emergency Management;

(c) One member appointed by the Director of the Department of Public Safety Standards
 and Training to represent the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training;

(d) One member appointed by the Director of the Oregon Department of Administrative
 Services to represent the Oregon Department of Administrative Services; and

(e) One member appointed by the Director of the Oregon Health Authority to represent
 the Oregon Health Authority.

(2) The authority shall oversee the development and maintenance of the database de scribed in section 13 of this 2025 Act.

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FUNDING PROVIDED BY SPARC

38 <u>SECTION 15.</u> (1) SPARC shall distribute moneys, by grant, to develop and operate public
 39 safety projects as described in this section.

(2) Before distributing moneys under this section, SPARC shall, in collaboration with the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training and the advisory board convened under section 19 of this 2025 Act, develop construction standards for projects, which may include, without limitation, seismic standards, durability standards and standards for portions of newly constructed buildings that may be used as emergency evacuation facilities. A recipient of grant funding under this section must agree to construct the project in accordance with 1 applicable standards developed by SPARC.

2 (3) On or before July 1, 2027, SPARC shall make the following grants, subject to sub-3 section (2) of this section:

4 (a) \$20,000,000 to the Department of Public Safety Standards and Training for a facility 5 in Salem.

6 (b) \$20,000,000 to the Central Oregon Intergovernmental Council to be used for the 7 CORE3 center in Deschutes County.

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(c) \$20,000,000 to the Rogue Siskiyou Regional Training Center.

9 (4) In the biennium beginning July 1, 2027, SPARC shall make additional grants for the 10 projects specified in subsection (3) of this section to fund operational costs of the projects. 11 SPARC shall determine the amount of the grants based on the need demonstrated by the 12 projects and legislative budgetary authorization.

(5) On or before July 1, 2030, SPARC shall make two grants of up to \$20,000,000 each to recipients determined through a competitive process. SPARC shall adopt rules governing the competitive process and shall select recipients so as to maximize the emergency readiness of the state, taking into consideration the severity and types of hazards that may affect various regions of the state. SPARC may not make grants under this subsection for projects that received grants under subsection (3) of this section.

(6) On or before July 1, 2032, SPARC shall make two grants of up to \$20,000,000 each to
 recipients determined through a competitive process as described in subsection (5) of this
 section. SPARC may not make grants under this subsection for projects that received grants
 under subsections (3) or (5) of this section.

23 <u>SECTION 16.</u> (1) For the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, at the request of the Depart-24 ment of Public Safety Standards and Training, the State Treasurer is authorized to issue 25 lottery bonds pursuant to ORS 286A.560 to 286A.585 in an amount that produces \$60,000,000 26 in net proceeds for the purposes described in subsection (2) of this section, plus an additional 27 amount estimated by the State Treasurer to be necessary to pay bond-related costs.

(2) Net proceeds of lottery bonds issued under this section must be transferred to the
 department to be used by SPARC to issue grants under section 15 of this 2025 Act.

(3) The Legislative Assembly finds that the use of lottery bond proceeds will create jobs,
 further economic development, finance public education or restore and protect parks,
 beaches, watersheds and native fish and wildlife, and is authorized based on the following
 findings:

(a) Developing public safety projects in Oregon will create employment opportunities in
 construction and public safety professions;

(b) Public safety projects will help to protect natural resources in Oregon, including na tive fish and wildlife, against natural and man-made disasters; and

(c) Enhancing Oregon's ability to prepare for and recover from emergencies will increase
 investment, business activity and economic development in the state.

40 (4) The Legislative Assembly declares its current intention to authorize bonding neces41 sary to fund the grants described in section 15 (5) and (6) of this 2025 Act, including any
42 bond-related costs.
