

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3029

By COMMITTEE ON HIGHER EDUCATION AND WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 7 through 21 and delete pages 2 through 23 and insert:

### **“WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT**

**“SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2025 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 660.300 to 660.420.**

**“SECTION 2. (1) As used in this section:**

**“(a) ‘Local industry sector partnership’ means a collaboration between local businesses and regional workforce partners that is reflective of local key industries facing critical workforce shortages or increased strategic workforce opportunities.**

**“(b) ‘Regional workforce partners’ includes community-based organizations, educational institutions, labor organizations, economic development agencies, local governments, trade organizations and other workforce service providers.**

**“(2) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission shall, in consultation with the State Workforce and Talent Development Board, develop a program to award grants to local workforce development boards to convene local industry sector partnerships to assist in carrying out the activities described under this section.**

**“(3) Program grant proceeds may be used solely to:**

**“(a) Align workforce development activities that aim to increase participation in workforce programs by individuals from priority populations in a manner that is consistent with and responsive to critical workforce shortages and strategic workforce opportunities;**

**“(b) Develop structured processes to address mutual workforce development goals and promote consensus in decision-making;**

**“(c) Identify industry-specific workforce needs in local workforce development areas, including the need for high-value credentials, to inform the development and implementation of culturally and linguistically diverse workforce education and training curricula;**

**“(d) Develop targeted recruitment strategies to increase equitable participation by individuals from priority populations in local workforce programs; and**

**“(e) Promote workforce development programs and activities in targeted industry sectors.**

**“(4) Grant proceeds shall be distributed according to a formula determined by the commission by rule.**

**“(5) In convening local industry sector partnerships under this section, local workforce development boards shall:**

**“(a) Consider alignment of workforce development programs among statewide targeted**

1 key industries to address critical workforce shortages and strategic workforce opportunities.

2 “(b) Ensure that each partnership represents a single targeted industry sector.

3 “(c) Demonstrate how the local industry sector partnership complements the workforce  
4 development goals of local workforce partners and is consistent with a local plan described  
5 in ORS 660.327.

6 “(6) The commission may adopt any rules necessary to carry out the provisions of this  
7 section.

8 “SECTION 3. ORS 660.300 is amended to read:

9 “660.300. As used in ORS 660.300 to 660.420:

10 “(1) ‘Chief elected official’ means a county commissioner, a county judge or the mayor of the  
11 City of Portland.

12 “(2) ‘Critical workforce shortage’ means a current or projected shortage of workers  
13 within an occupation or industry considered to be critical to the well-being of the communi-  
14 ties and economy of Oregon.

15 “[2)] (3) ‘Federal Act’ or ‘federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act’ means the federal  
16 Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (29 U.S.C. 3101 et seq.).

17 “[3)] (4) ‘Local workforce development area’ means the City of Portland or a county when the  
18 city or county has been designated as a local workforce development area under ORS 660.324. ‘Local  
19 workforce development area’ may include two or more counties that have joined together to form  
20 a local workforce development area and that have been designated as a local workforce development  
21 area under ORS 660.324.

22 “[4)] (5) ‘Local workforce development board’ means a board established pursuant to section  
23 3122 of the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.

24 “[5)] (6) ‘Maritime sector’ includes but is not limited to:

25 “(a) Enterprises engaged in the design, construction, manufacture, acquisition, operation, supply,  
26 repair or maintenance of marine vessels or component parts of marine vessels;

27 “(b) Enterprises engaged in managing or operating shipping lines;

28 “(c) Customs brokerage services, shipyards, shipping and freight forwarding services, dry docks,  
29 marine railways and marine repair shops;

30 “(d) Enterprises engaged in commercial or recreational fishing;

31 “(e) Enterprises and academic institutions engaged in scientific research of ocean processes,  
32 marine life or other ocean resources; and

33 “(f) Enterprises engaged in marine tours or travel, water sports or other marine leisure activ-  
34 ities.

35 “[6)] (7) ‘Participant’ means a person receiving services under the federal Workforce Innovation  
36 and Opportunity Act (29 U.S.C. 3101 et seq.).

37 “[7)] (8) ‘Participant records’ means records relating to matters such as grades, conduct, per-  
38 sonal and academic evaluations, results of psychometric testing, counseling, disciplinary actions, if  
39 any, and other personal matters.

40 “[8)] (9) ‘Priority populations’ means:

41 “(a) Communities of color;

42 “(b) Women;

43 “(c) Low-income communities;

44 “(d) Rural and frontier communities;

45 “(e) Veterans;

1 “(f) Persons with disabilities;  
2 “(g) Incarcerated and formerly incarcerated individuals;  
3 “(h) Members of Oregon’s nine federally recognized Indian tribes;  
4 “(i) Individuals who disproportionately experience discrimination in employment on the basis of  
5 age; [and]  
6 “(j) Individuals who identify as members of the LGBTQ+ community[.]; **and**  
7 **“(k) Individuals who are from immigrant and refugee communities.**  
8 “[9] (10) ‘State workforce agencies’ means state agencies that administer workforce programs.  
9 **“(11) ‘Strategic workforce opportunity’ means an opportunity to:**  
10 **“(a) Grow, strengthen and diversify workforce participation in a particular industry;**  
11 **“(b) Advance the overall economic mobility and well-being of Oregonians; and**  
12 **“(c) Respond to a workforce development investment or initiative undertaken for the**  
13 **purpose of achieving significant economic and community gains in Oregon.**  
14 “[10] (12) ‘Workforce development’ means services designed to help individuals attain employ-  
15 ment and progress along career pathways and to help businesses better achieve business goals by  
16 more easily finding skilled employees. ‘Workforce development’ includes:  
17 “(a) Education and training services;  
18 “(b) Apprenticeship and preapprenticeship training programs registered with the State Appren-  
19 ticeship and Training Council;  
20 “(c) Labor market analysis;  
21 “(d) Employment and reemployment services;  
22 “(e) Employee recruitment and retention services; and  
23 “(f) Convening, coordinating, oversight and evaluation services for business and state workforce  
24 agencies.  
25 “[11] (13) ‘Workforce programs’ means programs that have a primary mission of helping indi-  
26 viduals become employed, retain employment, increase wages and progress along career pathways  
27 and that are responsible for outcomes related to the primary mission.  
28 **“SECTION 4. ORS 660.324 is amended to read:**  
29 **“660.324. (1) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall identify:**  
30 **“(a) Key industries in this state and the workforce skills needed for key industries to grow and**  
31 **thrive;**  
32 **“(b) In collaboration with workforce representatives, needs for education, training, work expe-**  
33 **rience, and job preparation to ensure Oregonians access to stable high-wage jobs and employment**  
34 **advancement; [and]**  
35 **“(c) Opportunities for partnerships with key industry sectors to coordinate workforce develop-**  
36 **ment, economic development and education in response to industry and workforce needs[.]; and**  
37 **“(d) Critical workforce shortages and strategic workforce opportunities based on criteria**  
38 **established by the board.**  
39 **“(2) The board shall assist the Governor in:**  
40 **“(a) Developing Oregon’s workforce development system;**  
41 **“(b) Ensuring timely consultation and collaboration with chief elected officials, local workforce**  
42 **development boards and other workforce stakeholders, including but not limited to business and la-**  
43 **bor organizations and organizations working with persons with disabilities, persons living at or be-**  
44 **low 100 percent of the federal poverty guidelines and the chronically unemployed and**  
45 **underemployed;**

1 “(c) Reviewing and approving local workforce plans;

2 “(d) Developing, as required by the federal Act, allocation formulas for the distribution of funds  
3 to local workforce development areas for adult employment and training activities and for youth  
4 activities that are developed by the local workforce development boards;

5 “(e) Working with local workforce development boards to increase efficiencies and align  
6 workforce programs and services with local needs;

7 “(f) Recommending the duties and responsibilities of state agencies to implement the federal Act,  
8 to avoid conflicts of interest and to capitalize on the experience developed by workforce partners  
9 that are efficient and effective at meeting the requirements of the federal Act;

10 “(g) Participating in the development of a coordinated statewide system of activities and ser-  
11 vices that includes both mandatory and optional partners of the one-stop delivery system, as pro-  
12 vided in the federal Act;

13 “(h) Providing for the development, accountability and continuous improvement of comprehen-  
14 sive workforce performance measures to assess the effectiveness of the workforce development ac-  
15 tivities in this state;

16 “(i) Developing a statewide employment statistics system, as described in section 15(e) of the  
17 Wagner-Peyser Act (29 U.S.C. 49L-2(e)); and

18 “(j) Preparing an annual report and submitting it to the United States Department of Labor.

19 “(3) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board, in partnership with the Governor,  
20 shall establish criteria for use by chief elected officials in appointing members to local workforce  
21 development boards in accordance with the requirements of section 3122 of the federal Workforce  
22 Innovation and Opportunity Act. The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall establish  
23 the following requirements:

24 “(a) To transact business at a meeting of a local workforce development board, a quorum of  
25 members must participate. A quorum shall consist of a majority of the members. At least 25 percent  
26 of the members participating must be representatives of business.

27 “(b) When appropriate and upon a request from the chief elected official of a county or the City  
28 of Portland, the State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall consider the county or the  
29 City of Portland to be a candidate for designation as a local workforce development area. The board  
30 shall consult with the county or the City of Portland before designating the county or the City of  
31 Portland as a local workforce development area. After considering the criteria in section 3121 of the  
32 federal Act for designating local workforce development areas, chief elected officials may submit a  
33 request to the board to combine their units of government into a local workforce development area.  
34 The board shall make recommendations to the Governor about the designation of local workforce  
35 development areas. Only the Governor may designate local workforce development areas. The Gov-  
36 ernor must show just cause for not designating a requested local workforce development area. A  
37 county or the City of Portland may submit an appeal to the board, as provided in section 3121 of  
38 the federal Act, if the Governor does not grant the county’s or the city’s request to designate a local  
39 workforce development area.

40 “(4) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall provide guidance and direction  
41 to local workforce development boards in the development of local workforce plans. The State  
42 Workforce and Talent Development Board shall adopt policies that:

43 “(a) Require each local workforce development board, in partnership with its chief elected offi-  
44 cials and in accordance with section 3123 of the federal Act, to develop and submit to the Governor  
45 and the State Workforce and Talent Development Board a strategic local workforce plan that in-

cludes, but is not limited to, performance goals; and

“(b) Permit each local workforce development board, in consultation with its chief elected officials:

“(A) To determine, consistent with the requirements of the federal Act, the appropriate level of services based on the workforce needs in the local workforce development area; and

“(B) To designate or certify one-stop operators and to terminate for cause the eligibility of such operators.

“(5) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board may charter and enter into performance compacts with local workforce development boards.

“(6) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall:

“(a) Function as the primary advisory committee to the Employment Department in conjunction with the Employment Department Advisory Council established under ORS 657.695;

“(b) Collaborate with other advisory bodies also tasked with workforce development, including but not limited to the Oregon State Rehabilitation Council, the Commission for the Blind, the State Apprenticeship and Training Council and the Higher Education Coordinating Commission;

“(c) Work with the Oregon Business Development Commission to identify areas of common interest to efficiently align resources, recommend common strategies and provide accountability for reaching statewide goals; *[and]*

“(d) Hold state workforce agencies and local workforce development boards accountable for meeting performance goals and system outcomes[.]; **and**

**“(e) Collaborate with the Oregon Business Development Department, the Employment Department, local workforce development boards and other partners from training or workforce development entities in this state to establish criteria for identifying critical workforce shortages and strategic workforce opportunities.**

“(7) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall convene, engage and coordinate with senior executives of identified key industries in this state, the Oregon Business Development Commission, the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, the Department of Education, the Bureau of Labor and Industries, the STEM Investment Council, local workforce development boards, the Employment Department, the Department of Human Services, the Commission for the Blind, the Youth Development Council and any other partners from training or workforce development entities in this state to:

“(a) Determine needs across identified key industries in this state, including challenges and opportunities in developing and growing relevant talent pipelines;

“(b) Ensure that the talent pipeline development infrastructure includes:

“(A) A listening process to collect workforce needs of employers from identified key industries in this state;

“(B) Curriculum alignment for high-demand occupation skill needs;

“(C) Prediction and monitoring of national trends relating to high-demand industries and occupations;

“(D) Occupation-aligned education and training options with a clearly articulated progression;

“(E) Skills assessments; and

“(F) Academic career counseling;

“(c) Utilize sector partnerships to:

“(A) Advise the development of career pathway programs for critical occupations in identified key industries in this state; and

1 “(B) Ensure the coordination of education, economic development, business and workforce initi-  
2 atives between key partners to develop a strong talent pipeline;

3 “(d) Leverage and optimize existing measures and data systems to improve systems alignment  
4 and interagency communication; and

5 “(e) Ensure state alignment and coordination between industry sector partnerships and initi-  
6 atives in the local workforce development areas.

7 “(8) **The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall, in consultation with local**  
8 **workforce development boards and relevant state agencies, establish a definition for the term**  
9 **‘public workforce system.’**

10 “[8)(a)] (9)(a) Every biennium, the State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall coor-  
11 dinate and collaborate with entities listed under subsection (7) of this section to create a single,  
12 unified state Workforce and Talent Development Plan.

13 “(b) The Workforce and Talent Development Plan must include:

14 “(A) A strategy, with quantitative goals, for the statewide workforce development system for the  
15 State of Oregon in accordance with section 3111 of the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportu-  
16 nity Act;

17 “(B) Quantifiable goals designed to promote Oregonians’ self-sufficiency and that will empower  
18 Oregonians to gain independence from public assistance and move up the socioeconomic ladder;

19 “(C) Expectations for performance and the priorities for delivery of services to local workforce  
20 development boards and state workforce agencies;

21 “(D) Industry-based information and data from the Employment Department and other agencies  
22 and entities listed in subsection (7) of this section related to talent needs and gaps;

23 “(E) Analysis of data regarding the skills required for identified key industry jobs;

24 “(F) Information regarding the status of career pathway programs targeted at identified key in-  
25 dustries in this state;

26 “(G) Recommendations related to advancing talent pipeline and career pathways development  
27 based on the identified talent issues and trends;

28 “(H) Recommendations regarding the alignment and consistency of data nomenclature, collection  
29 practices and data sharing;

30 “(I) Utilization and, as appropriate, expansion of existing data-sharing agreements between  
31 agencies and partners;

32 “(J) Identification of talent issues and trends related to identified key industries in this state  
33 that are in strategic alignment with state and local workforce and economic priorities;

34 “(K) Identification and prioritization of the urgent talent gaps of identified key industries in this  
35 state;

36 “(L) A response to immediate talent needs through the creation of additional opportunities for  
37 Oregonians to pursue education and training in disciplines critical to the advancement of identified  
38 key industries in this state;

39 “(M) Ways to strengthen efforts to enhance student work experience and job preparedness in  
40 high-demand and critical occupations;

41 “(N) New means of delivering workforce training and proficiency-based education to enhance  
42 program efficiency, upgrading and sharing resources and facilities and improving student outcomes  
43 and access to typically underrepresented populations while meeting talent needs of traded sector  
44 and high growth industries; and

45 “(O) Ways to increase the skills of the existing professional and technical workforce, including

1 the issuance of certifications, badges and industry-based credentials.

2 “(c) The State Workforce and Talent Development Board shall:

3 “(A) Update the plan every biennium; and

4 “(B) Submit a report about the plan every year to:

5 “(i) The Governor; and

6 “(ii) The Legislative Assembly in the manner provided by ORS 192.245.

7 “**SECTION 5.** ORS 660.327 is amended to read:

8 “660.327. In accordance with section 3122 of the federal Act, each local workforce development  
9 board shall:

10 “(1) Consistent with section 3123 of the federal Act, in partnership with the chief elected official  
11 for the local area involved, develop and submit a local plan to the Governor. The local plan must:

12 “(a) Be developed by the local workforce development board with local workforce partners;

13 “**(b) Identify critical workforce shortages and strategic workforce opportunities in local**  
14 **key industries, based on criteria established by the State Workforce and Talent Development**  
15 **Board;**

16 “[b)] (c) Identify strategies and outcomes that the local workforce development board will im-  
17 plement in the local workforce development area **that are consistent with and responsive to**  
18 **critical workforce shortages and strategic workforce opportunities as identified by the local**  
19 **workforce development board under this section and the State Workforce and Talent Devel-**  
20 **opment Board under ORS 660.324;**

21 “(d) **Address how the local plan aligns with the goals of youth workforce development**  
22 **programs, including:**

23 “(A) **Projects selected under ORS 418.650 to 418.663.**

24 “(B) **Programs administered by the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, including**  
25 **but not limited to:**

26 “(i) **The Oregon Youth Employment Program created under ORS 660.353; and**

27 “(ii) **The Oregon Conservation Corps Program established under ORS 476.694.**

28 “[c)] (e) Make all parties to the local plan accountable for carrying out the strategies and  
29 achieving the outcomes identified in the local plan; and

30 “[d)] (f) Be submitted to and approved by the State Workforce and Talent Development Board.

31 “(2) Consistent with section 3151(d) of the federal Act, with the agreement of the chief elected  
32 official, designate or certify one-stop operators as described in section 3151(d)(2)(A) of the federal  
33 Act and may terminate for cause the eligibility of such operators.

34 “(3) Consistent with section 3153 of the federal Act, identify eligible providers of youth activities  
35 in the local area and award grants or contracts on a competitive basis to those providers, based on  
36 recommendations of a youth council.

37 “(4) Consistent with section 3152 of the federal Act, identify eligible providers of training ser-  
38 vices described in section 3174(d)(4) of the federal Act.

39 “(5) Subject to the approval of the chief elected official, develop a budget for the purpose of  
40 carrying out the duties of the local workforce development board under section 3122 of the federal  
41 Act.

42 “(6) In partnership with the chief elected official, provide oversight of local programs of youth  
43 activities authorized under section 3164 of the federal Act, local employment and training activities  
44 authorized under section 3174 of the federal Act and the one-stop delivery system in the local area.

45 “(7) With the chief elected official and the Governor, negotiate and reach agreement on local

1 performance measures as described in section 3141(c) of the federal Act.

2 “(8) Coordinate the workforce development activities authorized under the federal Act and car-  
3 ried out in the local area with economic development strategies and develop other employer linkages  
4 with such activities.

5 “(9) Promote the participation of private sector employers in the statewide workforce develop-  
6 ment system and ensure the effective provision, through the system, of connecting, brokering and  
7 coaching activities, through intermediaries such as the one-stop operator in the local area or  
8 through other organizations, to assist such employers in meeting hiring needs.

9 “**SECTION 6.** ORS 660.380 is amended to read:

10 “660.380. (1) The Prosperity [10,000] Program is established in the Higher Education Coordinat-  
11 ing Commission. **From funds appropriated to the commission for the program, the commission**  
12 **shall award grants to local workforce development boards to administer the program** for the  
13 following purposes:

14 “(a) To provide career coaching, occupational training and job placement services;

15 “(b) To provide wraparound supports and services that are necessary to facilitate reengagement  
16 in the workforce, including, but not limited to, transportation, child care and rental assistance;

17 “(c) To provide paid work experiences, including stipends and wages and other income supports  
18 for individuals from priority populations; and

19 “(d) To support targeted recruitment and engagement efforts.

20 “(2) The goals of the Prosperity [10,000] Program are to:

21 “[*(a)* Include at least 10,000 total individuals who participate in the program;]

22 “[*(b)*] (a) Improve the capacity and responsiveness of the public workforce system in this state  
23 by providing assistance for workforce development program navigation, expanding access to  
24 community-based career counseling and wraparound supports and services, and providing opportu-  
25 nities to earn industry-recognized certificates, credentials and degrees through work-based learning  
26 experiences;

27 “[*(c)*] (b) Ensure that services and benefits available through workforce programs are provided  
28 to individuals from priority populations;

29 “[*(d)*] (c) Provide increased access for priority populations to services and benefits available  
30 through workforce programs;

31 “[*(e)*] (d) Ensure that at least 50 percent of the individuals who participate in the program are  
32 women;

33 “[*(f)*] (e) Ensure that at least 80 percent of the individuals who participate successfully complete  
34 the program;

35 “[*(g)*] (f) Ensure that at least 75 percent of the individuals who participate in the program suc-  
36 cessfully obtain employment; and

37 “[*(h)*] (g) Ensure that at least 75 percent of the individuals who participate in the program earn  
38 at least \$17 per hour.

39 “(3)(a) [*The Prosperity 10,000 Program shall be administered by local workforce development*  
40 *boards.*] **In administering the Prosperity Program**, the local workforce development boards shall:

41 “(A) Distribute resources and available funds to nonprofit community-based organizations, edu-  
42 cational institutions, labor organizations and other workforce service providers to facilitate the  
43 provision of workforce development services and wraparound supports to individuals who participate  
44 in the program;

45 “(B) Coordinate with state workforce agencies and other workforce partners to expand regional



community-based partnerships that work to support and sustain workforce development services and wraparound supports; [and]

“(C) Connect with businesses and organizations in targeted industry sectors to identify training needs and ensure that business needs relating to a skilled workforce are met[.]; and

“(D) Pursue and advance local workforce development strategies that are consistent with and responsive to critical workforce shortages and strategic workforce opportunities as identified by local workforce development boards under ORS 660.327.

“(b) In distributing funds and resources to the entities described under paragraph (a)(A) of this subsection, local workforce development boards shall consider:

“(A) How the entity intends to engage with employers in targeted industry sectors to provide workforce development opportunities to individuals from priority populations;

“(B) The entity’s experience serving individuals from priority populations;

“(C) How the entity intends to collaborate with one or more of the following to increase accessibility for priority populations to workforce programs and opportunities:

“(i) Workforce service providers, as defined in ORS 660.400;

“(ii) Community-based organizations, as defined in ORS 660.390;

“(iii) Kindergarten through grade 12 schools;

“(iv) Community colleges;

“(v) Education and training partners;

“(vi) Local workforce development boards;

“(vii) Economic development organizations;

“(viii) Industry associations;

“(ix) Universities, as defined in ORS 660.350; and

“(x) Private post-secondary institutions that meet the criteria set forth in ORS 348.597 (2)(a).

“(D) How an entity described under subparagraph (C) of this paragraph with which the entity intends to partner possesses specific qualifications, including the organizational and technical capacity necessary to carry out the purposes described under subsection (1) of this section; and

“(E) Prioritize opportunities to leverage the use of other funding sources, including federal funds and private sector contributions, toward workforce programs and opportunities.

“[(b)] (c) An entity that collaborates with a local workforce development board to accomplish the workforce development activities described under this subsection shall, in accordance with ORS 660.327, participate with local workforce development boards in developing a proposed local plan.

“(4)(a) If an entity receives funds distributed from a local workforce development board under this section and provides paid work experience to individuals who participate in the program established under this section, the entity shall:

“(A) Notwithstanding ORS 653.025 and subsection [(2)(h)] (2)(g) of this section, pay wages to individuals participating in the program at a rate that is:

“(i) Equivalent to an entry-level training wage as determined by the entity pursuant to paragraph (b) of this subsection; and

“(ii) In alignment with the wage progression schedule established by the entity under subparagraph (B) of this paragraph;

“(B) Establish a wage progression schedule that includes the step progression requirements and the rate calculation formula upon which the entity shall make determinations about a participating

1 individual's eligibility to increase the individual's wage rate from an entry-level training wage to a  
2 wage rate that is equivalent to the average area wage standard for an hour's work in the same trade  
3 or occupation in the locality where the labor is performed;

4 "(C) Develop a training plan for individuals participating in the program that includes, at a  
5 minimum:

6 "(i) The entry-level training wage that will be paid to the individual;

7 "(ii) A statement that the individual shall be paid according to the wage progression schedule  
8 established by the entity, along with a description of the requirements that the individual must meet  
9 in order to progress to a higher wage rate under the wage progression schedule;

10 "(iii) A statement that the entry-level training wage paid to the individual may not be less than  
11 the federal minimum wage rate or the applicable state minimum wage rate, whichever is greater;  
12 and

13 "(iv) A statement explaining that the entry-level training wage paid to the individual is a mini-

“[(2)] *In consultation with the Oregon Youth Works Advisory Board created under ORS 660.320 and the executive director of the Higher Education Coordinating Commission, or the designee of the executive director, the program director of the Oregon Youth Corps shall ensure that projects selected under ORS 418.650 to 418.663 shall be consistent with all other provisions of applicable state and federal law relating to the management, oversight and administration of affected public lands.]*

“**SECTION 15.** ORS 660.318 is amended to read:

“660.318. (1) To implement and oversee state implementation of the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act, the Higher Education Coordinating Commission may:

“(a) Receive federal youth activities funds allotted to this state by the Secretary of Labor pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act and allocate those funds that are

1 not reserved according to an allocation formula recommended by the State Workforce and Talent  
2 Development Board and approved by the Governor.

3 “(b) Receive federal adult employment and training activities funds allotted to this state by the  
4 Secretary of Labor pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act and allocate  
5 those funds that are not reserved according to an allocation formula recommended by the State  
6 Workforce and Talent Development Board and approved by the Governor.

7 “(c) Receive federal dislocated worker funds allotted to this state by the Secretary of Labor  
8 pursuant to the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act and allocate those funds that are  
9 not reserved according to an allocation formula recommended by the State Workforce and Talent  
10 Development Board and approved by the Governor.

11 “(d) Establish a procedure for use by local workforce development boards to identify eligible  
12 providers of training services according to section 3174 of the federal Act and to maintain the list  
13 of providers identified as eligible by the boards in all local workforce development areas in this  
14 state.

15 “(e) Receive the comprehensive strategic plan developed and implemented by each local  
16 workforce development board and review the plan, with input from representatives of state and local  
17 workforce programs, to determine if the plan meets the requirements of section 3123 of the federal  
18 Act and state policy.

19 “(f) Approve the plans, after review by the State Workforce and Talent Development Board, that  
20 are found to meet the requirements of the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act and  
21 review and approve any amendments to the plans.

22 “(g) Carry out the required and allowable activities described in section 3174 of the federal Act  
23 with the advice of the Education and Workforce Policy Advisor.

24 “(h) Pursuant to ORS 660.339, establish procedures to maintain the confidentiality of the names  
25 and records of participants in workforce programs for which the commission is responsible, includ-  
26 ing circumstances under which the names and records may be disclosed.

27 “(i) Establish a method to set performance standards for the Secretary of Labor as required  
28 under section 3141 of the federal Act.

29 “(j) Perform planning functions related to programs and performance reporting under the federal  
30 Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act.

31 “(2)(a) Subject to the availability of funds from the federal Workforce Innovation and Opportu-  
32 nity Act, the commission shall create and operate a summer youth employment program that rees-  
33 tablishes meaningful summer work experience for persons between the ages of 14 and 24 and that  
34 meets the requirements for funding under the federal Act.

35 “(b) Programs funded under this subsection:

36 “(A) Must include representatives of the business community in the planning, implementation  
37 and evaluation of the program.

38 “(B) May provide for private and public sector employment opportunities.

39 “(C) Shall be managed by local workforce development boards in a manner that coordinates re-  
40 gional state-sponsored youth work experience programs.

41 “(c) Local workforce development boards responsible for managing programs created under this  
42 subsection shall provide training for business, labor and education leaders in use of best practices  
43 that ensure positive summer work experiences for participants.

44 “(3) The commission shall collaborate with the State Workforce and Talent Development Board  
45 and local workforce development boards to collect data on summer work experience programs that

1 identify successful summer work experiences and allow for the identification and dissemination of  
2 promising practices.

3 “(4) The commission, in consultation with the [*State Workforce and Talent Development Board*]  
4 **Oregon Youth Works Advisory Board created under ORS 660.320**, may adopt rules pursuant to  
5 ORS chapter 183 to implement this section.

6 “**SECTION 16.** ORS 418.663 is amended to read:

7 “418.663. (1) [*Projects selected under ORS 418.650 to 418.663 shall:*] **The following projects and**  
8 **programs must meet the requirements under subsection (2) of this section:**

9 “(a) **Projects selected under ORS 418.650 to 418.663.**

10 “(b) **Youth workforce development programs for which the Higher Education Coordinat-**  
11 **ing Commission is responsible, including but not limited to:**

12 “(A) **The Oregon Youth Employment Program created under ORS 660.353; and**

13 “(B) **The Oregon Conservation Corps Program established under ORS 476.694.**

14 “(2) **A project or program described in subsection (1) of this section shall:**

15 “(a) Result in an increase in employment opportunities for [*disadvantaged and at-risk*] youth **and**  
16 **young adults** over those opportunities which would otherwise be available;

17 “(b) Not result in the displacement of currently employed workers, including partial displace-  
18 ment such as reduction in the hours of nonovertime work or wages or employment benefits;

19 “(c) Not impair existing contracts for services or result in the substitution of state for other  
20 funds in connection with work that would otherwise be performed;

21 “(d) Not substitute jobs assisted under [*ORS 418.650 to 418.663*] **the project or program** for  
22 existing federally assisted jobs;

23 “(e) Not employ any person when any other person is on layoff by an employer from the same  
24 or any substantially equivalent job in the same area; [*and*]

25 “(f) Not be used to employ any person to fill a job opening created by the act of an employer  
26 in laying off or terminating employment of any regular employee, otherwise reducing the regular  
27 workforce not supported under [*ORS 418.650 to 418.663*] **the project or program**, in anticipation  
28 of filling the vacancy so created by hiring a person to be supported under [*ORS 418.650 to 418.663*]  
29 **the project or program**[.]; and

30 “(g) **Ensure that a grant made under the project or program is consistent with the local**  
31 **plan described in ORS 660.327 for the region the grant intends to serve.**

32 “[2)] (3) Where a labor organization represents employees who are engaged in similar work or  
33 a workers’ cooperative is engaged in work in the same area to that proposed to be performed under  
34 the **project or program** for which an application is being developed, the organization or cooperative  
35 shall be notified and shall be afforded a reasonable period of time prior to the submission of the  
36 application in which to make comments to the applicant and to the [*program director of the Oregon*  
37 *Youth Corps*] **commission.**

38 “**SECTION 17.** ORS 476.694 is amended to read:

39 “476.694. (1) The Oregon Conservation Corps Program is established for the purposes of:

40 “(a) Reducing the risk wildfire poses to communities and critical infrastructure.

41 “(b) Helping to create fire-adapted communities.

42 “(c) Engaging youth and young adults in workforce training.

43 “(2) Youth and young adults between 16 years of age and 26 years of age [*who have been qual-*  
44 *ified by a youth development organization*] may participate in projects undertaken by the corps.

45 “(3) Notwithstanding any contrary provision of law, participants in projects undertaken by the

1 corps:

2 “(a) Are not employees of the corps.

3 “(b) Are exempt from prevailing wage laws.

4 “(c) Must receive compensation for their participation of at least minimum wage or an allow-  
5 ance or stipend that, when combined with other sources of payment the participant is eligible to  
6 receive, including academic credit or an AmeriCorps education award, is equivalent to the value of  
7 minimum wage.

8 “(4) The Oregon Youth Works Advisory Board created under ORS 660.320 may, in col-  
9 laboration with a qualified nonprofit foundation, actively seek and source private donations  
10 to support the Oregon Conservation Corps Program.

11 “(5) The Higher Education Coordinating Commission may direct the expenditure of mon-  
12 eys from the Oregon Conservation Corps Fund established under ORS 476.698 for implemen-  
13 tation of a grant process that:

14 “(a) Provides funding to support the work conducted by the Oregon Conservation Corps  
15 Program.

16 “(b) Defines and uses an equity lens in awarding grants by identifying and supporting  
17 populations with greater vulnerability, including communities of color, indigenous communi-  
18 ties, communities with members who have limited proficiency in English and communities  
19 with lower-income members.

20 “(c) Awards grants to eligible organizations.

21 “(d) Ensures that grant awards support activities described in this section.

22 “(e) Establishes guidelines for prioritizing grant-supported projects to reduce community  
23 fire risks, promote youth and young adult workforce development and educational experi-  
24 ences and reduce hazardous fuels.

25 “(6) The commission shall consult with the State Forestry Department and the Depart-  
26 ment of the State Fire Marshal to ensure that the grant process awards funds to proposals  
27 that:

28 “(a) Protect at-risk communities and infrastructure within the wildland-urban interface,  
29 as described in ORS 477.503.

30 “(b) Meet standards for fuel treatment established by the State Forestry Department and  
31 the Department of the State Fire Marshal.

32 “(7) The commission shall biennially submit a report, on the timeline described in ORS  
33 293.640, to an appropriate committee or interim committee of the Legislative Assembly, as  
34 described in ORS 192.245, and to the State Wildfire Programs Director and Wildfire Programs  
35 Advisory Council, regarding the expenditure of moneys deposited in the Oregon Conservation  
36 Corps Fund.

37 “(8) As used in this section, ‘eligible organization’ includes Oregon-based nonprofit youth  
38 development organizations, federally recognized Indian tribes in this state, nonprofit associ-  
39 ations engaged in workforce development and public entities that provide programs of job  
40 training, skill development and forest-related or rangeland-related career path training.

41 “SECTION 18. ORS 660.320 is amended to read:

42 “660.320. (1) There is created in the Higher Education Coordinating Commission the Oregon  
43 Youth Works Advisory Board. The purpose of the advisory board is to provide advice on and over-  
44 sight of the implementation and alignment of youth workforce development programs for which the  
45 commission is responsible, including but not limited to:

1 “(a) The Oregon Youth Corps created under ORS 418.653;

2 “(b) The Oregon Conservation Corps Program established under ORS 476.694; and

3 “(c) The Oregon Youth Employment Program created under ORS 660.353.

4 “(2) The Governor, in consultation with the commission, shall determine the number of members  
5 on the advisory board. In determining the number of members on the advisory board, the Governor  
6 shall ensure that membership consists of at least seven but not more than 12 members.

7 “(3) The Governor shall appoint the members of the advisory board. The members must be res-  
8 idents of this state who reflect the geographic, racial, ethnic and gender diversity of this state and  
9 who have necessary experience that will enable the advisory board to meaningfully advise the  
10 commission on topics including, but not limited to:

11 “(a) Career-connected learning that provides learners with career awareness, exploration, prep-  
12 aration and training in connection with professional and industry-based expectations;

13 “(b) Development of career pathways;

14 “(c) Youth education programs;

15 “(d) Workforce development programs;

16 “(e) Rural workforce needs; and

17 “(f) Workforce issues affecting underrepresented communities.

18 “(4) The advisory board must include representation from:

19 “(a) The forestry or wildfire sector;

20 “(b) The natural resources sector;

21 “(c) Workforce sectors that are experiencing workforce demands;

22 “(d) Communities in which the wildland-urban interface faces a high risk of wildfire exposure;

23 “(e) Underrepresented communities, including communities of color, rural communities and  
24 communities that have faced generational poverty or other communities that have been historically  
25 underrepresented in youth employment as determined by the commission by rule;

26 “(f) Tribal communities; and

27 “(g) Local workforce development boards.

28 “(5)(a) **Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, to accomplish staggered**  
29 **expiration dates of the terms to be filled,** members of the advisory board serve for a term of ei-  
30 **ther three or** four years at the pleasure of the Governor. **To the extent practicable, the Gover-**  
31 **nor shall specify that one-half of the membership appointments must be fixed at a term of**  
32 **three years and all other remaining position appointments must be fixed at a term of four**  
33 **years.**

34 “(b) **Upon the expiration of a term, the Governor shall appoint a successor to assume the**  
35 **membership position. The term of the successor’s appointment shall be four years.**

36 “(6) Members may not receive compensation for service on the advisory board, but, subject to  
37 any applicable laws regulating travel and other expenses of state officers and employees, may be  
38 reimbursed for actual and necessary travel and other expenses incurred in the performance of offi-  
39 cial duties, as provided in ORS 292.495, with moneys available to the advisory board for the purpose  
40 of reimbursing members.

41 “(7) The commission shall provide the advisory board with necessary staff support.

42 “**SECTION 19. ORS 418.658 and 476.696 are repealed.**

43 “**SECTION 20. The amendments to ORS 660.320 by section 18 of this 2025 Act apply to**  
44 **advisory board appointments made on or after the effective date of this 2025 Act.**

45 “**SECTION 21. The unit captions used in this 2025 Act are provided only for the conven-**

1 ience of the reader and do not become part of the statutory law of this state or express any  
2 legislative intent in the enactment of this 2025 Act.”.
