SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced.** The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act would make changes to PECBA. The Act would prohibit public employees from engaging in strikes to resolve labor disputes. (Flesch Readability Score: 63.2).

Prohibits strikes by public employees. Requires that labor issues in dispute be submitted to final and binding arbitration.

6 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

7 **SECTION 1.** ORS 243.650, as amended by section 1, chapter 84, Oregon Laws 2024, is amended 8 to read:

9 243.650. As used in ORS 243.650 to 243.809, unless the context requires otherwise:

(1) "Appropriate bargaining unit" means the unit designated by the Employment Relations Board or voluntarily recognized by the public employer to be appropriate for collective bargaining. However, an appropriate bargaining unit may not include both academically licensed and unlicensed or nonacademically licensed school employees. Academically licensed units may include but are not limited to teachers, nurses, counselors, therapists, psychologists, child development specialists and similar positions. This limitation does not apply to any bargaining unit certified or recognized prior to June 6, 1995, or to any school district with fewer than 50 employees.

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(2) "Board" means the Employment Relations Board.

(3) "Certification" means official recognition by the board that a labor organization is the ex-clusive representative for all of the employees in the appropriate bargaining unit.

(4) "Collective bargaining" means the performance of the mutual obligation of a public employer 2021and the representative of its employees to meet at reasonable times and confer in good faith with 22respect to employment relations for the purpose of negotiations concerning mandatory subjects of 23bargaining, to meet and confer in good faith in accordance with law with respect to any dispute concerning the interpretation or application of a collective bargaining agreement, and to execute 24 25written contracts incorporating agreements that have been reached on behalf of the public employer 26and the employees in the bargaining unit covered by such negotiations. The obligation to meet and 27negotiate does not compel either party to agree to a proposal or require the making of a concession. 28 This subsection may not be construed to prohibit a public employer and a certified or recognized

1 representative of its employees from discussing or executing written agreements regarding matters 2 other than mandatory subjects of bargaining that are not prohibited by law as long as there is mu-

3 tual agreement of the parties to discuss these matters, which are permissive subjects of bargaining.

4 (5) "Compulsory arbitration" means the procedure whereby parties involved in a labor dispute 5 are required by law to submit their differences to a third party for a final and binding decision.

6 (6) "Confidential employee" means one who assists and acts in a confidential capacity to a per-7 son who formulates, determines and effectuates management policies in the area of collective bar-8 gaining.

9 (7)(a) "Employment relations" includes, but is not limited to, matters concerning direct or indi-10 rect monetary benefits, hours, vacations, sick leave, labor organization access to and communication 11 with represented employees, grievance procedures and other conditions of employment.

12 (b) "Employment relations" does not include subjects determined to be permissive, nonmanda-13 tory subjects of bargaining by the Employment Relations Board prior to June 6, 1995.

(c) After June 6, 1995, "employment relations" does not include subjects that the Employment
Relations Board determines to have a greater impact on management's prerogative than on employee
wages, hours, or other terms and conditions of employment.

(d) "Employment relations" does not include subjects that have an insubstantial or de minimis
 effect on public employee wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment.

19 (e) For school district bargaining:

(A) "Employment relations" includes class size and caseload limits in schools that qualify for
 assistance under Title I of the federal Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

(B) "Employment relations" excludes the school or educational calendar, standards of performance or criteria for evaluation of teachers, the school curriculum, reasonable dress, grooming and at-work personal conduct requirements respecting smoking, gum chewing and similar matters of personal conduct, the standards and procedures for student discipline, the time between student classes, the selection, agendas and decisions of 21st Century Schools Councils established under ORS 329.704, requirements for expressing milk under ORS 653.077, and any other subject proposed that is permissive under paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this subsection.

(f) For employee bargaining involving employees [covered by ORS 243.736 and employees] of the Department of Corrections who have direct contact with adults in custody, "employment relations" includes safety issues that have an impact on the on-the-job safety of the employees or staffing levels that have a significant impact on the on-the-job safety of the employees.

(g) For all other employee bargaining except school district bargaining and except as provided 33 34 in paragraph (f) of this subsection, "employment relations" excludes staffing levels and safety issues 35 (except those staffing levels and safety issues that have a direct and substantial effect on the onthe-job safety of public employees), scheduling of services provided to the public, determination of 36 37 the minimum qualifications necessary for any position, criteria for evaluation or performance ap-38 praisal, assignment of duties, workload when the effect on duties is insubstantial, reasonable dress, grooming, and at-work personal conduct requirements respecting smoking, gum chewing, and similar 39 40 matters of personal conduct at work, and any other subject proposed that is permissive under paragraphs (b), (c) and (d) of this subsection. 41

(8) "Exclusive representative" means the labor organization that, as a result of certification by
the board or recognition by the employer, has the right to be the collective bargaining agent of all
employees in an appropriate bargaining unit.

45 (9) "Fact-finding" means identification of the major issues in a particular labor dispute by one

1 or more impartial individuals who review the positions of the parties, resolve factual differences and 2 make recommendations for settlement of the dispute.

3 (10) "Fair-share agreement" means an agreement between the public employer and the recognized or certified bargaining representative of public employees whereby employees who are not 4 members of the employee organization are required to make an in-lieu-of-dues payment to an em- $\mathbf{5}$ ployee organization except as provided in ORS 243.666. Upon the filing with the board of a petition 6 by 30 percent or more of the employees in an appropriate bargaining unit covered by such union 7 security agreement declaring they desire that the agreement be rescinded, the board shall take a 8 9 secret ballot of the employees in the unit and certify the results thereof to the recognized or certified bargaining representative and to the public employer. Unless a majority of the votes cast in an 10 election favor the union security agreement, the board shall certify deauthorization of the agree-11 12 ment. A petition for deauthorization of a union security agreement must be filed not more than 90 13 calendar days after the collective bargaining agreement is executed. Only one such election may be conducted in any appropriate bargaining unit during the term of a collective bargaining agreement 14 15 between a public employer and the recognized or certified bargaining representative.

(11) "Final offer" means the proposed contract language and cost summary submitted to the
 mediator within seven days of the declaration of impasse.

(12) "Labor dispute" means any controversy concerning employment relations or concerning the association or representation of persons in negotiating, fixing, maintaining, changing, or seeking to arrange terms or conditions of employment relations, regardless of whether the disputants stand in the proximate relation of employee.

(13) "Labor organization" means any organization that has as one of its purposes representing
 employees in their employment relations with public employers.

(14) "Last best offer package" means the offer exchanged by parties not less than 14 days prior
to the date scheduled for an interest arbitration hearing.

(15) "Legislative body" means the Legislative Assembly, the city council, the county commission
 and any other board or commission empowered to levy taxes.

(16) "Managerial employee" means an employee of the State of Oregon or a public university 28listed in ORS 352.002 who possesses authority to formulate and carry out management decisions or 2930 who represents management's interest by taking or effectively recommending discretionary actions 31 that control or implement employer policy, and who has discretion in the performance of these management responsibilities beyond the routine discharge of duties. A "managerial employee" need 32not act in a supervisory capacity in relation to other employees. Notwithstanding this subsection, 33 34 "managerial employee" does not include faculty members at a community college, college or uni-35 versity.

(17) "Mediation" means assistance by an impartial third party in reconciling a labor dispute
 between the public employer and the exclusive representative regarding employment relations.

38 (18) "Payment-in-lieu-of-dues" means an assessment to defray the cost for services by the exclusive representative in negotiations and contract administration of all persons in an appropriate 39 40 bargaining unit who are not members of the organization serving as exclusive representative of the employees. The payment must be equivalent to regular union dues and assessments, if any, or must 41 42be an amount agreed upon by the public employer and the exclusive representative of the employees. (19) "Public employee" means an employee of a public employer but does not include elected 43 officials, persons appointed to serve on boards or commissions, incarcerated persons working under 44 Article I, section 41, of the Oregon Constitution, or persons who are confidential employees, super-45

1 visory employees or managerial employees.

2 (20) "Public employer" means the State of Oregon, and the following political subdivisions: 3 Cities, counties, community colleges, school districts, special districts, mass transit districts, metro-4 politan service districts, public service corporations or municipal corporations and public and 5 quasi-public corporations.

6 (21) "Public employer representative" includes any individual or individuals specifically desig-7 nated by the public employer to act in its interests in all matters dealing with employee represen-8 tation, collective bargaining and related issues.

9 (22) "Strike" means a public employee's refusal in concerted action with others to report for 10 duty, or his or her willful absence from his or her position, or his or her stoppage of work, or his 11 or her absence in whole or in part from the full, faithful or proper performance of his or her duties 12 of employment, for the purpose of inducing, influencing or coercing a change in the conditions, 13 compensation, rights, privileges or obligations of public employment; however, nothing shall limit 14 or impair the right of any public employee to lawfully express or communicate a complaint or 15 opinion on any matter related to the conditions of employment.

16 (23)(a) "Supervisory employee" means any individual having authority in the interest of the employer to hire, transfer, suspend, lay off, recall, promote, discharge, assign, reward or discipline 17 18 other employees, or responsibly to direct them, or to adjust their grievances, or effectively to re-19 commend such action, if in connection therewith, the exercise of the authority is not of a merely 20routine or clerical nature but requires the use of independent judgment. Failure to assert supervisory status in any Employment Relations Board proceeding or in negotiations for any collective 2122bargaining agreement does not thereafter prevent assertion of supervisory status in any subsequent 23board proceeding or contract negotiation.

24 (b) "Supervisory employee" includes:

(A) A faculty member of a public university listed in ORS 352.002 or the Oregon Health and
 Science University who:

(i) Is employed as a president, vice president, provost, vice provost, dean, associate dean, as sistant dean, head or equivalent position; or

(ii) Is employed in an administrative position without a reasonable expectation of teaching, re search or other scholarly accomplishments.

(B) A guard at a correctional institution or mental hospital or a police officer who serves in the
rank of lieutenant or higher except for those lieutenant guards or police officers who were included
in an appropriate bargaining unit for purposes of collective bargaining on or before April 4, 2024.

34 (C) An employee of the Criminal Justice Division of the Department of Justice who manages35 police officers of the division.

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(c) "Supervisory employee" does not include:

(A) A nurse, charge nurse or nurse holding a similar position if that position has not tradi tionally been classified as supervisory;

(B) A firefighter or an emergency communications worker [prohibited from striking by ORS
243.736] who assigns, transfers or directs the work of other employees but does not have the authority to hire, discharge or impose economic discipline on those employees;

42 (C) A guard at a correctional institution or mental hospital or a police officer who:

43 (i) Serves in a rank equivalent to or below the rank of sergeant; and

44 [(ii) Is prohibited from striking by ORS 243.736; and]

45 [(iii)] (ii) Assigns, transfers or directs the work of other employees but does not have the au-

thority to hire, discharge or impose economic discipline on those employees; 1 2 (D) A faculty member of a public university listed in ORS 352.002 or the Oregon Health and Science University who is not a faculty member described in paragraph (b) of this subsection; or 3 (E) An employee of the Oregon State Police who: 4 5 (i) Serves in a rank equivalent to or below the rank of sergeant; and [(ii) Is prohibited from striking by ORS 243.736; and] 6 [(*iii*)] (ii) Assigns, transfers or directs the work of other employees but does not hire, discharge 7 or impose economic discipline on those employees. 8 9 (24) "Unfair labor practice" means the commission of an act designated an unfair labor practice in ORS 243.672. 10 (25) "Voluntary arbitration" means the procedure whereby parties involved in a labor dispute 11 12mutually agree to submit their differences to a third party for a final and binding decision. SECTION 2. ORS 243.672 is amended to read: 13 243.672. (1) It is an unfair labor practice for a public employer or its designated representative 14 15 to do any of the following: 16(a) Interfere with, restrain or coerce employees in or because of the exercise of rights guaranteed in ORS 243.662. 17 18 (b) Dominate, interfere with or assist in the formation, existence or administration of any em-19 ployee organization. (c) Discriminate in regard to hiring, tenure or any terms or condition of employment for the 20purpose of encouraging or discouraging membership in an employee organization. Nothing in this 2122section is intended to prohibit the entering into of a fair-share agreement between a public employer 23and the exclusive bargaining representative of its employees. If a "fair-share" agreement has been agreed to by the public employer and exclusive representative, nothing prohibits the deduction of 2425the payment-in-lieu-of-dues from the salaries or wages of the employees. (d) Discharge or otherwise discriminate against an employee because the employee has signed 2627or filed an affidavit, petition or complaint or has given information or testimony under ORS 243.650 to 243.809. 28(e) Refuse to bargain collectively in good faith with the exclusive representative. 2930 (f) Refuse or fail to comply with any provision of ORS 243.650 to 243.809. 31 (g) Violate the provisions of any written contract with respect to employment relations including 32an agreement to arbitrate or to accept the terms of an arbitration award, where previously the parties have agreed to accept arbitration awards as final and binding upon them. 33 34 (h) Refuse to reduce an agreement, reached as a result of collective bargaining, to writing and 35 sign the resulting contract. (i) Violate ORS 243.670 (2). 36 37 (j) Attempt to influence an employee to resign from or decline to obtain membership in a labor 38 organization. (k) Encourage an employee to revoke an authorization for the deductions described under ORS 39 40 243.806. (2) Subject to the limitations set forth in this subsection, it is an unfair labor practice for a 41 public employee or for a labor organization or its designated representative to do any of the fol-4243 lowing: (a) Interfere with, restrain or coerce any employee in or because of the exercise of any right 44 guaranteed under ORS 243.650 to 243.809. 45

(b) Refuse to bargain collectively in good faith with the public employer if the labor organization 1 2 is an exclusive representative.

(c) Refuse or fail to comply with any provision of ORS 243.650 to 243.809.

(d) Violate the provisions of any written contract with respect to employment relations, includ-4 ing an agreement to arbitrate or to accept the terms of an arbitration award, where previously the 5 parties have agreed to accept arbitration awards as final and binding upon them. 6

(e) Refuse to reduce an agreement, reached as a result of collective bargaining, to writing and 7 sign the resulting contract. 8

9 (3) It is an unfair labor practice for any labor organization to engage in [unconventional] strike activity [not protected for private sector employees under the National Labor Relations Act on June 10 6, 1995. This provision applies], including but not limited to sitdown, slowdown, rolling, intermit-11

12 tent or on-and-off again strikes.

13 (4) It is an unfair labor practice for a labor organization or its agents to picket or cause, induce, or encourage to be picketed, or threaten to engage in such activity, at the residence or business 14 15 premises of any individual who is a member of the governing body of a public employer, with respect 16to a dispute over a collective bargaining agreement or negotiations over employment relations, if 17 an objective or effect of such picketing is to induce another person to cease doing business with the 18 governing body member's business or to cease handling, transporting or dealing in goods or services produced at the governing body's business. For purposes of this subsection, a member of the Legis-19 20lative Assembly is a member of the governing body of a public employer when the collective bargaining negotiation or dispute is between the State of Oregon and a labor organization. The 2122Governor and other statewide elected officials are not considered members of a governing body for 23purposes of this subsection. Nothing in this subsection may be interpreted or applied in a manner that violates the right of free speech and assembly as protected by the Constitution of the United 24 25States or the Constitution of the State of Oregon.

(5) It is not an unfair labor practice or a violation of subsection (2)(a) of this section for the 2627exclusive representative of an appropriate bargaining unit to charge the following employees in the unit reasonable fees and costs for representation that are unrelated to the negotiation of a collective 28bargaining agreement, provided that the employees are not members of the labor organization that 2930 is the exclusive representative and have not voluntarily entered into a fair-share agreement:

31 (a) A police officer of a city or municipal police department;

(b) A sheriff or deputy sheriff; 32

(c) A police officer commissioned by a university under ORS 352.121 or 353.125; 33

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(d) An employee of the Department of Corrections or of Oregon Corrections Enterprises; or 35 (e) A parole or probation officer who supervises adult offenders.

(6) An injured party may file a written complaint with the Employment Relations Board not 36 37 later than 180 days following the occurrence of an unfair labor practice. For each unfair labor 38 practice complaint filed, a fee of \$300 is imposed. For each answer to an unfair labor practice complaint filed with the board, a fee of \$300 is imposed. The board may allow any other person to 39 intervene in the proceeding and to present testimony. A person allowed to intervene shall pay a fee 40 of \$300 to the board. The board may, in its discretion, order fee reimbursement to the prevailing 41 party in any case in which the complaint or answer is found to have been frivolous or filed in bad 42faith. The board shall deposit fees received under this section to the credit of the Employment Re-43 lations Board Administrative Account. 44

SECTION 3. ORS 243.712 is amended to read: 45

243.712. (1) If after a 150-calendar-day period of good faith negotiations over the terms of an 1 2 agreement or 150 days after certification or recognition of an exclusive representative no agreement has been signed, either or both of the parties may notify the Employment Relations Board of the 3 status of negotiations and the need for assignment of a mediator. Any period of time in which the 4 public employer or labor organization has been found by the Employment Relations Board to have $\mathbf{5}$ failed to bargain in good faith shall not be counted as part of the 150-day period. This provision 6 cannot be invoked by the party found to have failed to bargain in good faith. The parties may agree 7 to request a mediator before the end of the 150-day period. Upon receipt of such notification or re-8 9 quest, the board shall appoint a mediator and shall notify the parties of the appointment. The 150-day period shall begin when the parties meet for the first bargaining session and each party has 10 received the other party's initial proposal or on an alternative date to which the parties agree in 11 12 writing.

(2) The board, upon receipt of a notification or request under subsection (1) of this section, shall
 render assistance to resolve the labor dispute according to the following schedule:

(a) Mediation shall be provided by the State Conciliation Service as provided by ORS 662.405
to 662.455. Any time after 15 days of mediation, either party may declare an impasse. The mediator
may declare an impasse at any time during the mediation process. Notification of an impasse shall
be filed in writing with the board, and copies of the notification shall be submitted to the parties
on the same day the notification is filed with the board.

(b) Within seven days of the declaration of impasse, each party shall submit to the mediator in writing the final offer of the party, including a cost summary of the offer. Upon receipt of the final offers, the mediator shall make public the final offers, including any proposed contract language and each party's cost summary dealing with those issues, on which the parties have failed to reach agreement. Each party's proposed contract language shall be titled "Final Offer."

(c) Within 30 days after the mediator makes public the parties' final offers, the parties may
jointly petition the Employment Relations Board to appoint a fact finder. If the parties jointly petition for fact-finding, a fact finder shall be appointed and the hearing conducted as provided in ORS
243.722.

(d) If an agreement has not been reached 30 days after the mediator makes public the final of-2930 fers, or if the parties participated in fact-finding, 30 days after the receipt of the fact finder's report, 31 the public employer [may implement all or part of its final offer, and the public employees have the right to strike] shall submit the issues in dispute to final and binding arbitration, which shall 32be scheduled and conducted in accordance with ORS 243.746. After a collective bargaining 33 34 agreement has expired, and prior to agreement on a successor contract, the status quo with respect 35 to employment relations shall be preserved until completion of impasse procedures except that no public employer shall be required to increase contributions for insurance premiums unless the ex-36 37 piring collective bargaining agreement provides otherwise. Merit step and longevity step pay in-38 creases shall be part of the status quo unless the expiring collective bargaining agreement expressly provides otherwise. 39

(3) Nothing in subsection (1) or (2) of this section shall be construed to prohibit the parties at
any time from voluntarily agreeing to submit any or all of the issues in dispute to final and binding
arbitration. The arbitration shall be scheduled and conducted in accordance with ORS 243.746. The
arbitration shall supersede the dispute resolution procedures set forth in ORS [243.726 and] 243.746.
SECTION 4. ORS 243.726 is amended to read:

45 243.726. (1) Participation in a strike shall be unlawful for any public employee [who is not in-

cluded in an appropriate bargaining unit for which an exclusive representative has been certified by
 the Employment Relations Board or recognized by the employer; or is included in an appropriate bar-

3 gaining unit that provides for resolution of a labor dispute by petition to final and binding arbitration;

4 or when the strike is not made lawful under ORS 240.060, 240.065, 240.080, 240.123, 243.650 to 243.809
5 and 341.290].

6 [(2) It shall be lawful for a public employee who is not prohibited from striking under subsection 7 (1) of this section and who is in the appropriate bargaining unit involved in a labor dispute to partic-8 ipate in a strike over mandatory subjects of bargaining provided:]

9 [(a) The requirements of ORS 243.712 and 243.722 relating to the resolution of labor disputes have 10 been complied with in good faith;]

11 [(b) Thirty days have elapsed since the board has made public the fact finder's findings of fact and 12 recommendations or the mediator has made public the parties' final offers;]

13 [(c) The exclusive representative has given 10 days' notice by certified mail of its intent to strike 14 and stating the reasons for its intent to strike to the board and the public employer;]

[(d) The collective bargaining agreement has expired, or the labor dispute arises pursuant to a re opener provision in a collective bargaining agreement or renegotiation under ORS 243.702 (1) or rene gotiation under ORS 243.698; and]

[(e) The union's strike does not include unconventional strike activity not protected under the National Labor Relations Act on June 6, 1995, and does not constitute an unfair labor practice under
ORS 243.672 (3).]

[(3)(a) Where the strike occurring or is about to occur creates a clear and present danger or threat to the health, safety or welfare of the public, the public employer concerned may petition the circuit court of the county in which the strike has taken place or is to take place for equitable relief including but not limited to appropriate injunctive relief.]

[(b) If the strike is a strike of state employees the petition shall be filed in the Circuit Court of
 Marion County.]

[(c) If, after hearing, the court finds that the strike creates a clear and present danger or threat to the health, safety or welfare of the public, it shall grant appropriate relief. Such relief shall include an order that the labor dispute be submitted to final and binding arbitration within 10 days of the court's order pursuant to procedures in ORS 243.746.]

[(4)(a)] (2) A labor organization may not declare or authorize a strike of public employees [that is or would be] in violation of this section. [When it is alleged in good faith by the public employer that a labor organization has declared or authorized a strike of public employees that is or would be in violation of this section, the employer may petition the board for a declaration that the strike is or would be unlawful. The board, after conducting an investigation and hearing, may make such declaration if it finds that such declaration or authorization of a strike is or would be unlawful.]

[(b) When a labor organization or individual disobeys an order of the appropriate circuit court
issued pursuant to enforcing an order of the board involving this section and ORS 243.736 or 243.738,
they shall be punished according to the provisions of ORS 33.015 to 33.155, except that the amount of
the fine shall be at the discretion of the court.]

[(5)] (3) An unfair labor practice by a public employer shall not be a defense to a prohibited strike. The **Employment Relations** Board upon the filing of an unfair labor charge alleging that a public employer has committed an unfair labor practice during or arising out of the collective bargaining procedures set forth in ORS 243.712 and 243.722, shall take immediate action on such charge and if required, petition the court of competent jurisdiction for appropriate relief or a restraining 1 order.

2 [(6) As used in this section, "danger or threat to the health, safety or welfare of the public" does 3 not include an economic or financial inconvenience to the public or to the public employer that is

4 normally incident to a strike by public employees.]

5 **SECTION 5.** ORS 243.742 is amended to read:

6 243.742. (1) It is the public policy of the State of Oregon that [where the right of employees to 7 strike] because striking by public employees is by law prohibited, it is requisite to the high morale 8 of such employees and the efficient operation of such departments to afford an alternate, expe-9 ditious, effective and binding procedure for the resolution of labor disputes and to that end the 10 provisions of ORS 240.060, 240.065, 240.080, 240.123, 243.650 to 243.809 and 341.290, providing for 11 compulsory arbitration, shall be liberally construed.

(y) District attorneys and deputy district attorneys.

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8 (20) "Prior service credit" means credit provided under ORS 238.442 or under ORS 238.225 (2)
9 to (6) (1999 Edition).

10 (21) "Public employer" means the state, one of its agencies or any city, county, municipal or 11 public corporation, political subdivision of the state or instrumentality thereof, or an agency created 12 by one or more such governmental organizations to provide governmental services. For purposes of 13 this chapter, such agency created by one or more governmental organizations is a governmental 14 instrumentality and a legal entity with power to enter into contracts, hold property and sue and be 15 sued.

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(ii) Any equipment specifically designed for use directly in connection with the employment of handheld munitions and devices as described in sub-subparagraph (i) of this subparagraph. 39

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(B) "Handheld chemical incapacitant" does not include tear gas.

(c) "Key component of a binary or multicomponent chemical system" means the precursor that 41 plays the most important role in determining the toxic properties of the final product and that reacts 42 rapidly with other chemicals in a binary or multicomponent system. 43

(d) "Kinetic impact projectile" means all nonlethal, less-lethal or semilethal projectiles, includ-44 ing but not limited to rubber and plastic bullets, beanbag rounds, sponge rounds and pellet rounds. 45

(e) "Law enforcement agency" means the Department of State Police, the Department of Justice, 1 2 a district attorney, a political subdivision of the State of Oregon, a municipal corporation of the State of Oregon and a university, that maintains a law enforcement unit as defined in ORS 181A.355 3 [(12)(a)(A)] (13)(a)(A). 4 $\mathbf{5}$ (f) "Precursor" means any chemical reactant that takes part at any stage in the production by whatever method of a toxic chemical, including any key component of a binary or multicomponent 6 7 chemical system. (g) "Tear gas" means oleoresin capsicum or orthochlorobenzalmalononitrile, or other similar 8 9 chemicals meant to accomplish the same effect, administered by any shell, cartridge or bomb capable of being discharged or exploded, when the discharge or explosion will cause or permit the release 10 or emission of the chemicals. 11 12 (h) "Toxic chemical" means any chemical that through its chemical action on biological pro-13 cesses can cause death, temporary pain, temporary irritation, temporary disruption of vital processes, temporary incapacitation, temporary disability or permanent harm to humans or animals. 14 15 (2) A law enforcement agency may not use a handheld chemical incapacitant for crowd man-16agement. 17 (3) A law enforcement agency may not use tear gas for crowd management except when: 18 (a) The use is objectively reasonable by law enforcement to: 19 (A) Defend against a threat to life or serious bodily injury to any individual, including any peace officer; or 20(B) Bring an objectively dangerous and unlawful situation safely and effectively under control; 2122(b) A commanding officer authorizes the use of tear gas; 23(c) De-escalation techniques or other alternatives to force have been attempted, when reasonable, and failed; and 2425(d) The law enforcement agency has done the following, in the following order: 26(A) Announced the agency's intent to use tear gas; 27(B) Allowed sufficient time for individuals to evacuate the area; and (C) Announced a second time, immediately before using the tear gas, the agency's intent to use 2829tear gas. 30 (4)(a) A law enforcement agency may not use a kinetic impact projectile for crowd management. 31 (b) A law enforcement agency may not discharge a kinetic impact projectile in a manner that intentionally targets the head of a person, except against an individual engaged in conduct other-32wise justifying the use of deadly physical force by a peace officer under ORS 161.242. 33 34 (5) This section does not prohibit a law enforcement agency or a peace officer from using a 35 handheld chemical incapacitant or kinetic impact projectile against an individual engaged in conduct otherwise justifying the use of physical force under ORS 161.195 to 161.275. 36 37 (6) A law enforcement agency, when it is safe and possible to do so, shall minimize the incidental 38 impact of the agency's use of handheld chemical incapacitants, tear gas and kinetic impact projectiles on bystanders, medical personnel, journalists and other unintended targets. 39 40 (7) When handheld chemical incapacitants, tear gas or kinetic impact projectiles are used in a crowd by a law enforcement agency, the agency shall make efforts to notify emergency rooms in the 41 vicinity of the type of handheld chemical incapacitants, tear gas or kinetic impact projectiles used. 42 (8) A law enforcement agency shall adopt policies requiring the cleanup of visible debris caused 43 by the use of tear gas and kinetic impact projectiles within a reasonable time of the use of tear gas 44 and kinetic impact projectiles. 45
