SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act says that schools have to teach computer science classes to students in all grades. (Flesch Readability Score: 84.8).

Requires school district boards to ensure all schools offer computer science education in all grades. Includes computer science in content areas that must be offered in schools. Declares an emergency, effective July 1, 2025.

A BILL FOR AN ACT 1 2 Relating to computer science education; creating new provisions; amending ORS 329.025 and 329.045; 3 and declaring an emergency. 4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon: 5 SECTION 1. Section 2 of this 2025 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 329. 6 SECTION 2. (1) Each school district board shall ensure that: 7 (a) All schools of the school district with any grade from kindergarten through grade 8 eight offer computer science education and computational thinking experiences at all grade 9 levels; and 10 (b) All schools of the school district with any grade from grade 9 through 12 offer at least 11 two computer science courses, at least one of which is a foundational computer science 12 course. 13(2) The Department of Education shall develop and maintain programming to: (a) Support current teachers in expanding their capacity to teach computer science 14 15courses, including integrating computational thinking and artificial intelligence into existing 16 classes and curricula; and 17 (b) Support and expand equitable access to culturally responsive and sustainable com-18 puter science education for all students. 19 (3) The department may hire permanent staff for the purpose of carrying out the 20department's duties specified in this section. (4) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules to carry out this section. 2122SECTION 3. ORS 329.025 is amended to read: 23329.025. It is the intent of the Legislative Assembly to maintain a system of public elementary 24 and secondary schools that allows students, parents, teachers, administrators, school district boards 25and the State Board of Education to be accountable for the development and improvement of the 26public school system. The public school system shall have the following characteristics: NOTE: Matter in **boldfaced** type in an amended section is new; matter [*italic and bracketed*] is existing law to be omitted.

SECTION 4. ORS 329.045 is amended to read: 35 329.045. (1)(a) In order to achieve the goals contained in ORS 329.025, the State Board of Edu-36 37 cation shall regularly and periodically review and revise its Common Curriculum Goals, performance 38 indicators and diploma requirements. 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(C) Encourage increased learning time. As used in this subparagraph, "increased learning 1 2 time" means a schedule that encompasses a longer school day, week or year for the purpose of increasing the total number of school hours available to provide: 3

(i) Students with instruction in core academic subjects, including mathematics, science, language 4 arts, history, geography, economics, civics, higher education and career path skills, personal finan-5 cial education, the arts [and], world languages and computer science; 6

(ii) Students with instruction in subjects other than the subjects identified in sub-subparagraph 7 (i) of this subparagraph, including health and physical education; 8

9 (iii) Students with the opportunity to participate in enrichment activities that contribute to a well-rounded education, including learning opportunities that may be based on service, experience 10 or work and that may be provided through partnerships with other organizations; and 11

12 (iv) Teachers with the opportunity to collaborate, plan and engage in professional development 13 within and across grades and subjects.

(c) Nothing in this subsection prevents a school district or public charter school from main-14 15 taining control over course content, format, materials and teaching methods.

16 (2) The State Board of Education shall continually review and revise all adopted academic content standards necessary for students to successfully transition to the next phase of their education. 17

18 (3)(a) School districts and public charter schools must offer students instruction in mathematics, science, language arts, history, geography, economics, civics, higher education and career path 19 20skills, personal financial education, physical education, health, the arts [and], world languages and computer science. 21

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(b) Instruction required under paragraph (a) of this subsection must:

23(A) Meet the academic content standards adopted by the State Board of Education; and

329.045. (1)(a) In order to achieve the goals contained in ORS 329.025, the State Board of Edu-2930 cation shall regularly and periodically review and revise its Common Curriculum Goals, performance 31 indicators and diploma requirements.

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(b) The review and revision conducted under this section shall:

(A) Include Essential Learning Skills and rigorous academic content standards in mathematics, 33 34 science, language arts, history, geography, economics, civics, higher education and career path 35 skills, personal financial education, physical education, health, the arts [and], world languages and 36 computer science.

37 (B) Ensure that the academic content standards for history, geography, economics and civics 38 include sufficient instruction on the histories, contributions and perspectives of individuals who:

23(b) Instruction required under paragraph (a) of this subsection must:

(A) Meet the academic content standards adopted by the State Board of Education; and 24

(B) Meet the requirements adopted by the State Board of Education and the board of the school 25district or public charter school. 26

27SECTION 6. Notwithstanding section 2 (1) of this 2025 Act and the amendments to ORS 329.025 and 329.045 by sections 3 to 5 of this 2025 Act, a school district is not required to first 28offer computer science courses until the 2028-2029 school year. 29

SECTION 7. In addition to and not in lieu of any other appropriation, there is appropri-30 31 ated to the Department of Education, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, out of the General Fund, the amount of \$5,000,000, for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of 32section 2 of this 2025 Act. 33

34 SECTION 8. This 2025 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2025 Act takes effect 35 July 1, 2025. 36

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
