

SENATE AMENDMENTS TO SENATE BILL 83

By COMMITTEE ON NATURAL RESOURCES AND WILDFIRE

April 18

On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “ORS” delete the rest of the line and lines 3 through 6 and insert “105.464, 197.716, 215.291, 215.495, 476.392, 476.398, 476.687, 476.690, 476.696, 477.015, 477.503, 477.748 and 526.272; repealing ORS 455.612, 455.614, 476.390, 476.394, 477.027, 477.161 and 477.490 and sections 12a, 12b, 12d and 29, chapter 592, Oregon Laws 2021; and declaring an emergency.”.

Delete lines 8 through 25 and delete pages 2 through 5 and insert:

“REPEALS

“**SECTION 1.** (1) **ORS 455.612, 455.614, 476.390, 476.394, 477.027, 477.161 and 477.490 and sections 12a, 12b and 29, chapter 592, Oregon Laws 2021, are repealed.**

“(2) **Section 12d, chapter 592, Oregon Laws 2021, as amended by section 10, chapter 611, Oregon Laws 2023, is repealed.**

“DEFENSIBLE SPACE

“**SECTION 2.** ORS 476.392 is amended to read:

“476.392. [(1) *The State Fire Marshal shall establish minimum defensible space requirements for wildfire risk reduction on lands in areas identified on the statewide wildfire hazard map described in ORS 477.490 as within the wildland-urban interface.*]

“[(2) *The State Fire Marshal:*]

“[(a) *Shall consult with the Oregon Fire Code Advisory Board to establish the requirements.*]

“[(b) *Shall establish requirements that are consistent with and do not exceed the standards pertaining only to defensible space that are set forth in the International Wildland-Urban Interface Code published by the International Code Council, including the standards pertaining only to defensible space that are set forth in sections 603 and 604 of the code.*]

“[(c) *May consider best practices specific to Oregon in order to establish the requirements.*]

“[(d) *Shall periodically reexamine the standards set forth in the International Wildland-Urban Interface Code and update the requirements to reflect current best practices, in consultation with the Oregon Fire Code Advisory Board.*]

“[(e) *Shall enforce the requirements that are applicable to lands within the jurisdiction of a local government.*]

“[(f) *Shall adopt rules governing administration of the requirements.*]

“[(g) *May develop and apply a graduated fee structure for use in assessing penalties on property owners for noncompliance with the requirements.*]

1 “(h) Shall consult on implementation of the requirements.]

2 “(i) May adopt rules concerning reports by local governments described in subsection (4)(a) of this
3 section.]

4 “(3) Subject to additional local requirements, the requirements shall apply statewide for all lands
5 in the wildland-urban interface that are designated as being in the high wildfire hazard zone, as
6 identified on the map.]

7 “(4) Notwithstanding subsection (2) of this section, a local government may:]

8 “(a) Administer, consult on and enforce the requirements established by the State Fire Marshal,
9 within the jurisdiction of the local government. A local government that administers or enforces the
10 requirements established by the State Fire Marshal shall periodically report to the State Fire Marshal
11 regarding compliance with the requirements, including the extent of compliance for each property
12 within the jurisdiction of the local government, any change in the degree of compliance since the last
13 report and any other information required by the State Fire Marshal by rule.]

14 “(b) Adopt and enforce local requirements for defensible space that are greater than the require-
15 ments established by the State Fire Marshal. Any local requirements that a local government adopts
16 for defensible space must be defensible space standards selected from the framework set forth in the
17 International Wildland-Urban Interface Code or other best practices specific to Oregon.]

18 “(c) Designate local fire districts, fire departments or fire agencies to enforce the requirements es-
19 tablished by the State Fire Marshal or the local government pursuant to paragraph (b) of this sub-
20 section. A local government that designates enforcement must comply with the reporting requirements
21 in paragraph (a) of this subsection.]

22 **“(1) As used in this section, ‘defensible space’ means a natural or human-made area in**
23 **which material capable of supporting the spread of fire has been treated, cleared or modified**
24 **to slow the rate and intensity of advancing wildfire and allow space for fire suppression op-**
25 **erations to occur.**

26 “[(5)] (2) The State Fire Marshal shall administer a community risk reduction program that
27 emphasizes education and methods of prevention with respect to:

28 “(a) Wildfire risk[, enforcement of];

29 “(b) **The creation of a model code for** defensible space [requirements,];

30 “(c) Response planning; and

31 “(d) Community preparedness for wildfires.

32 **“(3) As part of the program, in consultation with the Oregon Fire Code Advisory Board,**
33 **the State Fire Marshal shall create and make available to local governments a model code**
34 **for defensible space that:**

35 **“(a) Includes standards that are consistent with, and do not exceed, the standards in the**
36 **2024 International Wildland-Urban Interface Code (October 2024), published by the Interna-**
37 **tional Code Council, that pertain to defensible space, including the standards in sections 603**
38 **and 604 of the code; and**

39 **“(b) To the extent consistent with the standards in the code described in paragraph (a)**
40 **of this subsection, results from a consideration of best practices specific to this state.**

41 **“(4) The State Fire Marshal may not require a local government to adopt the model code**
42 **described in subsection (3) of this section.**

43 “[(6)] (5) **As part of the program,** the State Fire Marshal may provide financial, administrative,
44 technical or other assistance to a local government to facilitate the [administration and enforcement
45 of requirements within the jurisdiction of the local government] **creation of defensible space.**

1 “(6) A local government shall expend financial assistance provided by the State Fire Marshal
2 under [this] subsection (5) of this section to give priority to the creation of defensible space:

3 “(a) On lands on which members of socially and economically vulnerable communities, persons
4 with limited proficiency in English and persons of lower income, as defined in ORS 456.055, reside.

5 “(b) For critical or emergency infrastructure.

6 “(c) For schools, hospitals and facilities that serve seniors.

7
8 “WILDLAND-URBAN INTERFACE
9

10 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 477.015 is amended to read:

11 “477.015. As used in this section and ORS 477.025 [and 477.027,]:

12 “(1) ‘Wildland’ means:

13 “(a) Forestland, as defined in ORS 477.001; or

14 “(b) An unimproved area that contains enough unmanaged vegetation, at any time of the
15 year, to constitute a fire hazard, in the judgment of the forester, regardless of how the area
16 is zoned or taxed.

17 “(2) ‘Wildland-urban interface’ [has the meaning given that term in rule by the State Board of
18 Forestry] means a geographic area in which there is a concentration of dwellings in an urban
19 or suburban setting near wildland.

20 “**SECTION 4.** ORS 477.503 is amended to read:

21 “477.503. (1) As used in this section, ‘wildland-urban interface’ has the meaning given that
22 term in ORS 477.015.

23 “[1](a)] (2)(a) The State Forestry Department shall design and implement a program to reduce
24 wildfire risk through the restoration of landscape resiliency and the reduction of hazardous fuel on
25 public or private forestlands and rangelands and in communities near homes and critical
26 infrastructure.

27 “(b) The department shall ensure that the program is consistent with the objectives described
28 in this section and biennially select, administer and evaluate projects consistent with the objectives
29 described in this subsection.

30 “(c) When developing program and project selection criteria, the department shall, to the extent
31 practicable, consult and cooperate with state and federal agencies, counties, cities and other units
32 of local government, federally recognized Indian tribes in this state, public and private forestland
33 and rangeland owners, forest and rangeland collaboratives and other relevant community organiza-
34 tions and ensure consistency with the priorities described in subsection [(3)] (4) of this section.

35 “[2)] (3) The department shall develop a 20-year strategic plan, as described in the Shared
36 Stewardship Agreement signed on August 13, 2019, that prioritizes restoration actions and ge-
37 ographies for wildfire risk reduction. The plan must be able to be used to direct federal, state and
38 private investments in a tangible way.

39 “[3)] (4) In selecting and administering projects, the department shall:

40 “(a) In collaboration with the Oregon State University Extension Service and other entities,
41 identify strategic landscapes that are ready for treatment, giving priority to projects within the
42 landscapes that are:

43 “(A) On lands in the four [highest] eNVC [risk] classes with greatest risk or on lands with a
44 relatively high probability of transmitting wildfire into communities as identified [in the United
45 States Forest Service report titled ‘Pacific Northwest Quantitative Wildfire Risk Assessment: Methods

1 *and Results' and dated April 9, 2018]* **with data from the Pacific Northwest Quantitative**
2 **Wildfire Risk Assessment;**

3 “(B) Inclusive of federal lands with treatment projects currently approved under the National
4 Environmental Policy Act (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.);

5 “(C) Focusing on treatments protective of human life, property **surrounding the wildland-**
6 **urban interface**, critical infrastructure, watershed health and forest or rangeland habitat restora-
7 tion; and

8 “(D) Part of a collaborative partnership with agreements across diverse forestland or rangeland
9 stakeholders that use an expansive, landscape-scale approach to address underlying causes of poor
10 wildfire resilience and elevated risk of wildfire or that establish innovative approaches to addressing
11 the underlying causes that could be implemented on a larger scale.

12 “(b) To the extent practicable, identify and support projects that are designed to:

13 “(A) Evaluate varying types of fuel treatment methods;

14 “(B) Leverage the collective power of public-private partnerships and federal and state funding,
15 including leverage of the coordination of funding to support collaborative initiatives that address the
16 underlying causes of elevated forestland and rangeland wildfire risk across ownerships; and

17 “(C) Optimize the receipt of federal government investments that equal or exceed department
18 investments.

19 “(c) Design the projects to involve existing forest-based and range-based contracting entities.

20 “(d) Design the projects to complement programs and projects of the Oregon Watershed En-
21 hancement Board or other state agencies as needed.

22 “(e) Design the projects to involve the Oregon Conservation Corps Program established by ORS
23 476.694, to the maximum extent possible, for community protection projects located in the
24 wildland-urban interface, subject to funding available in the Oregon Conservation Corps Fund es-
25 tablished by ORS 476.698.

26 “(f) Affirmatively seek, and enhance opportunities for, collaboration from stakeholders holding
27 a wide variety of perspectives regarding forest and rangeland management and opportunities for
28 significant involvement by communities in proximity to project sites.

29 “(g) Engage in monitoring of the projects to produce useful information on which to base rec-
30 ommendations to the Legislative Assembly.

31 “[4)] (5) A project under this section may not include commercial thinning on:

32 “(a) Inventoried roadless areas;

33 “(b) Riparian reserves identified in the Northwest Forest Plan or in federal Bureau of Land
34 Management resource management plans;

35 “(c) Late successional reserves, except to the extent consistent with the 2011 United States Fish
36 and Wildlife Service Revised Recovery Plan for the Northern Spotted Owl (*Strix occidentalis*
37 *caurina*);

38 “(d) Areas protected under the federal Wild and Scenic Rivers Act (P.L. 90-542), national recre-
39 ation areas, national monuments or areas protected under ORS 390.805 to 390.925;

40 “(e) Designated critical habitat for species listed as threatened or endangered under the En-
41 dangered Species Act of 1973 (P.L. 93-205) or by the State Fish and Wildlife Commission under ORS
42 496.172, unless commercial thinning is already allowed under an existing environmental review or
43 recognized habitat recovery plan; or

44 “(f) Federally designated areas of critical environmental concern or federally designated
45 wilderness study areas.

1 “(5) (6) The department shall give public notice, and allow reasonable opportunity for public
2 input, when identifying and selecting landscapes under this section.

3
4 **“WILDFIRE PROGRAMS ADVISORY COUNCIL**

5
6 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 476.690 is amended to read:

7 “476.690. (1) As used in this section[,]:

8 **“(a) ‘Defensible space’ [has the meaning given that term in ORS 476.390.] means a natural or**
9 **human-made area in which material capable of supporting the spread of fire has been**
10 **treated, cleared or modified to slow the rate and intensity of advancing wildfire and allow**
11 **space for fire suppression operations to occur.**

12 **“(b) ‘Wildland-urban interface’ has the meaning given that term in ORS 477.015.**

13 “(2) There is established a Wildfire Programs Advisory Council to advise and assist the State
14 Wildfire Programs Director by:

15 “(a) Closely monitoring implementation of activities related to wildfire prevention and response,
16 including receiving and evaluating agency reports related to wildfire prevention and response.

17 “(b) Providing advice on potential changes to the activities in order to fulfill the goal of dra-
18 matically reducing wildfire risk in this state and ensuring that regional defensible space, building
19 codes and land use applications are appropriate.

20 “(c) Strengthening intergovernmental and multiparty collaboration and enhancing collaboration
21 between governments and stakeholders on an ongoing basis.

22 “(d) Developing strategies to enhance collaboration among governmental bodies and the general
23 public.

24 “[(e) Assessing ways the statewide wildfire hazard map described in ORS 477.490 may inform de-
25 velopment of building codes and land use laws, rules and decisions, in a regionally appropriate man-
26 ner.]

27 “[(f) Assessing the application of defensible space requirements to vineyards, crops and other cul-
28 tivated vegetation.]

29 “[(g)] (e) Reviewing Department of Land Conservation and Development findings and recom-
30 mendations in the report required by section 11, chapter 592, Oregon Laws 2021, and making addi-
31 tional recommendations related to potential updates to the statewide land use planning program,
32 local comprehensive plans and zoning codes to incorporate wildfire hazard maps and minimize
33 wildfire hazards to people, public and private property, businesses, infrastructure and natural re-
34 sources.

35 “(3) The council is not a decision-making body but instead is established to provide advice, as-
36 sistance, perspective, ideas and recommendations to the State Wildfire Programs Director.

37 “(4) The President of the Senate and Speaker of the House of Representatives shall jointly ap-
38 point [19] **21** members to the council as follows:

39 “(a) One member who represents county government.

40 “(b) One member who is a land use planning director of a county that is wholly or partially
41 within the wildland-urban interface.

42 “(c) One member who represents city government.

43 “(d) One member who is a land use planning director of a city that is wholly or partially within
44 the wildland-urban interface.

45 “(e) One member who represents fire chiefs and has experience with managing, fighting or pre-

venting fire within the wildland-urban interface.

“(f) One member who represents fire marshals and has experience with [*managing, fighting or preventing*] **community risk reduction and prevention of structural** fire within the wildland-urban interface.

“(g) One member who represents firefighters and has experience with managing, fighting or preventing fire within the wildland-urban interface.

“(h) One member who represents rural residential property owners whose property is wholly or partially within the wildland-urban interface.

“(i) One member who represents farming property owners whose property is wholly or partially within the wildland-urban interface.

“(j) One member who represents ranching property owners whose property is wholly or partially within the wildland-urban interface.

“(k) One member who represents forestland owners whose property is wholly or partially within the wildland-urban interface.

“(L) One member who represents federally recognized Indian tribes with land wholly or partially within the wildland-urban interface.

“(m) One member who represents a utility company.

“(n) One member who represents environmental interests.

“(o) One member who represents forest resiliency interests.

“(p) One member who represents state or regional land use planning organizations.

“(q) One member who represents land and housing development interests or real estate industry interests.

“(r) One member who represents public health professionals.

“(s) One member who represents the environmental justice community.

“(t) **One member who represents the structural fire service and who has experience with managing, fighting or preventing wildfire within the wildland-urban interface.**

“(u) **One member who represents the insurance industry.**

“(5) **The council shall be geographically diverse, with representatives from across this state.**

“[(5)] (6) The presiding officers shall provide public notice of an opportunity for interested parties to submit names of interest for appointment to the council.

“[(6)] (7) At least seven days before appointing a member, the presiding officers shall consult in good faith with the minority leaders of the Senate and House of Representatives on the appointment.

“[(7)] (8) The term of service for each member is four years.

“[(8)] (9) The members are eligible for reappointment.

“[(9)] (10) The council shall elect a chairperson and vice chairperson to serve for one-year terms.

“[(10)] (11) The members shall serve on the council as volunteers and are not entitled to reimbursement for expenses.

“[(11)] (12) The Department of Consumer and Business Services, Department of Land Conservation and Development, Department of the State Fire Marshal and State Forestry Department shall each provide 15 percent of the time of a full-time equivalent employee to:

“(a) Cooperatively staff the council.

“(b) Attend council meetings as informational resources.

“(c) Assist with drafting reports at the request of the council.

1 “(d) Support the work of the State Wildfire Programs Director.

2 “[~~(12)~~] (13) The Oregon State University Extension Service shall designate a person to serve as
3 staff for the council.

4 “[~~(13)~~] (14) Each October the council shall submit a report to the Governor and appropriate
5 committees or interim committees of the Legislative Assembly that describes progress on imple-
6 menting program activities related to defensible space, building codes, land use and community
7 emergency preparedness and that recommends improvements.

9 “BUILDING CODE STANDARDS

10
11 “**SECTION 6.** Section 7 of this 2025 Act is added to and made a part of ORS chapter 455.

12 “**SECTION 7.** (1) The Department of Consumer and Business Services shall adopt the
13 wildfire hazard mitigation code standards of section R327 of the 2023 Oregon Residential
14 Specialty Code.

15 “(2) The department shall by rule create a process for municipalities to adopt the wildfire
16 hazard mitigation code standards referenced in subsection (1) of this section. The process
17 must include a requirement that a municipality notify the department when the municipality
18 has adopted these standards.

19 “(3) The wildfire hazard mitigation code standards referenced in subsection (1) of this
20 section may only be applied to new construction of new buildings.

21 “(4) The department may not require a local government to adopt code standards that
22 are described in this section.

23 24 “VOIDING ASSIGNMENTS OF PROPERTY TO WILDFIRE HAZARD ZONES

25
26 “**SECTION 8.** (1) As used in this section, ‘order’ has the meaning given that term in ORS
27 183.310.

28 “(2) An order issued by the State Forestry Department under ORS 477.490 (2023 Edition)
29 that assigns property to a wildfire hazard zone is null and void.

30 31 “REPORTING AND ADMINISTRATION

32
33 “**SECTION 9.** ORS 476.687 is amended to read:

34 “476.687. (1) The Governor shall appoint a State Wildfire Programs Director to serve at the
35 pleasure of the Governor.

36 “(2) The duties of the director shall include:

37 “(a) Overseeing implementation of requirements and authorization provided by chapter 592,
38 Oregon Laws 2021.

39 “(b) Coordinating and integrating activities of state agencies and other entities that are required
40 or authorized by chapter 592, Oregon Laws 2021, in order to optimize the efficiency and effective-
41 ness of the activities.

42 “(c) Ensuring compliance with deadlines set out in chapter 592, Oregon Laws 2021.

43 “(d) Monitoring and assessing any financial impacts of the activities on local jurisdictions and
44 the equity of those financial impacts among the jurisdictions.

45 “(e) Supervising staffing of the Wildfire Programs Advisory Council.

1 “(f) Reporting at least every [60] **90** days to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the
2 Speaker of the House of Representatives and the chairs of relevant committees and interim com-
3 mittees of the Legislative Assembly to summarize progress on implementing the activities, note ob-
4 stacles and opportunities and catalog possibilities for future improvements to further reduce wildfire
5 risk in this state.

6 “(g) Exploring additional opportunities to reduce wildfire risk, including but not limited to en-
7 gaging with:

8 “(A) Insurance companies regarding insurance policy coverage provisions, underwriting stan-
9 dards, insurance rates and any other topics relevant to enhancing the protection of property from
10 wildfire at a reasonable cost.

11 “(B) Electric utilities regarding further actions to protect public safety, reduce risk to electric
12 company customers and promote electrical system resilience to wildfire damage.

13 “(C) Congressional delegations and federal agencies to expand opportunities for cost-share
14 partnerships for wildfire mitigation and develop strategies for improvements to federal fire manage-
15 ment policies.

16 “(h) Collaborating with the State Resilience Officer and participating in any relevant emergency
17 preparedness advisory councils.

18 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 476.696 is amended to read:

19 “476.696. (1) As used in this section:

20 “(a) ‘Eligible organization’ includes Oregon-based nonprofit youth development organizations,
21 federally recognized Indian tribes in this state, nonprofit associations engaged in workforce devel-
22 opment and public entities that provide programs of job training, skill development and forest-
23 related or rangeland-related career path training.

24 “(b) ‘Tribe’ means a federally recognized Indian tribe in Oregon.

25 “(2) The Oregon Youth Works Advisory Board created under ORS 660.320 shall, in collaboration
26 with a qualified nonprofit foundation, actively seek and source private donations to support the
27 Oregon Conservation Corps Program.

28 “(3) The advisory board may direct the expenditure of moneys from the Oregon Conservation
29 Corps Fund for a promotional website and materials to solicit private funds.

30 “(4) The advisory board shall advise the Higher Education Coordinating Commission on the im-
31 plementation of a grant process that:

32 “(a) Provides funding to support the work conducted by the Oregon Conservation Corps Pro-
33 gram.

34 “(b) Defines and uses an equity lens in awarding grants by identifying and supporting popu-
35 lations with greater vulnerability, including communities of color, indigenous communities, commu-
36 nities with members who have limited proficiency in English and communities with lower-income
37 members.

38 “(c) Awards grants to eligible organizations.

39 “(d) Ensures that grant awards support activities described in ORS 476.694 (1) and subsection
40 (5) of this section.

41 “(e) Establishes guidelines for prioritizing grant-supported projects to reduce community fire
42 risks, promote youth and young adult workforce development and educational experiences and re-
43 duce hazardous fuels.

44 “(5) The commission shall consult with the State Forestry Department to ensure that the grant
45 process awards funds to proposals that:

1 “(a) Protect at-risk communities and infrastructure within the wildland-urban interface, as de-
2 scribed in ORS 477.503.

3 “(b) Meet standards for fuel treatment established by the department.

4 “(6) The advisory board shall *[biennially]* **annually** submit a report~~], on the timeline described in~~
5 *ORS 293.640,*] to an appropriate committee or interim committee of the Legislative Assembly, as
6 described in ORS 192.245, and to the State Wildfire Programs Director and Wildfire Programs Ad-
7 visory Council, regarding the expenditure of moneys deposited in the Oregon Conservation Corps
8 Fund.

9 “**SECTION 11.** ORS 476.398 is amended to read:

10 “476.398. (1) The State Fire Marshal shall *[biannually]* **annually** report regarding the status of
11 State Fire Marshal and local government activities for carrying out ORS 476.392 to a committee or
12 interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to wildfire, in the manner provided in ORS
13 192.245, to the State Wildfire Programs Director and to the Wildfire Programs Advisory Council[:].

14 “[*(a) On or before the date of convening of the regular session of the Legislative Assembly as*
15 *specified in ORS 171.010.*]

16 “[*(b) Approximately six months after the date described in paragraph (a) of this subsection.*]

17 “(2) The report shall include, but need not be limited to:

18 “(a) A status report regarding **the** community risk reduction **program** *[and the establishment,*
19 *administration and enforcement of defensible space requirements];*

20 “(b) The amount of moneys expended during the year for **the** community risk reduction **program**
21 *[and the establishment, administration or enforcement of defensible space requirements];*

22 “(c) The amount of moneys expended during the year for the suppression of fires on wildland-
23 urban interface lands; and

24 “(d) Any recommendations of the State Fire Marshal for legislative action, including, but not
25 limited to, current or future resource and funding needs for **the** community risk reduction **program**
26 *[and establishing, administering or enforcing defensible space requirements].*

27 “**SECTION 12.** (1) **The State Forestry Department shall annually report regarding the**
28 **wildfire risk reduction program and the implementation of a 20-year landscape resiliency plan**
29 **to a committee or interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to wildfire issues,**
30 **in the manner provided in ORS 192.245, to the State Wildfire Programs Director and to the**
31 **Wildfire Programs Advisory Council.**

32 “(2) The report shall include, but need not be limited to:

33 “(a) A status report on the implementation of the 20-year landscape resiliency plan and
34 wildfire risk reduction efforts, including prescribed fire activities;

35 “(b) The amount of moneys expended during the prior 12 months for implementation of
36 the 20-year landscape resiliency plan and the department’s wildfire risk reduction efforts;
37 and

38 “(c) Any department recommendations for legislative action, including but not limited to
39 current or future resource and funding needs for the wildfire risk reduction program.

40 “(3) As used in this section:

41 “(a) ‘20-year landscape resiliency plan’ means the strategic plan described in ORS 477.503
42 (2).

43 “(b) ‘Wildfire risk reduction program’ means the program the department designed and
44 is implementing under ORS 477.503.

45 “**SECTION 13.** (1) **The Department of Environmental Quality shall annually report re-**

1 garding community smoke response plans and the wildfire smoke monitoring program to a
2 committee or interim committee of the Legislative Assembly related to wildfire issues, in the
3 manner provided in ORS 192.245, to the State Wildfire Programs Director and to the Wildfire
4 Programs Advisory Council.

4 “(c) If any portion of the proposed site is for lands designated for forest use, unless the county:
5 “(A) Notifies the State Forester in writing not less than 21 days before designating the site; and
6 “(B) Cooperates with the State Forester in:
7 “(i) Updating and classifying wildland-urban interface lands in and around the site;
8 “(ii) Taking necessary steps to implement or update the wildland-urban interface fire protection
9 system in and around the site *[as described in ORS 477.027]*; and
10 “(iii) Implementing other fire protection measures authorized by the State Forester.
11 “(4) A county may not amend its comprehensive plan, land use regulations or zoning map under
12 this section to allow a use that would conflict with an administrative rule adopted for the purpose
13 of implementing the Oregon Sage-Grouse Action Plan and Executive Order 15-18.
14 “**SECTION 17.** ORS 215.291 is amended to read:
15 “215.291. (1) A lawfully established dwelling may be altered, restored or replaced under ORS
16 215.213 (1)(q), 215.283 (1)(p) or 215.755 (1) if the county determines that the dwelling to be altered,
17 restored or replaced:
18 “(a) Has, or formerly had:
19 “(A) Intact exterior walls and roof structure;
20 “(B) Indoor plumbing consisting of a kitchen sink, toilet and bathing facilities connected to a
21 sanitary waste disposal system;

23 “(D) A heating system; and
24 “(b)(A) Unless the value of the dwelling was eliminated as a result of destruction or demolition,

17 “[*(B) No statewide wildfire hazard map has been adopted; and]*

18 “[*(m)*] **(k)** The county has adopted land use regulations that ensure that:

19 “(A) The accessory dwelling unit has adequate setbacks from adjacent lands zoned for resource

21 “(B) The accessory dwelling unit has adequate access for firefighting equipment, safe evacuation
22 and staged evacuation areas; *and*].

26 “526.272. (1) The State Forestry Department shall:

27 “(a) In collaboration with any forest protective association or agency that is under contract or
28 agreement with the State Board of Forestry for the protection of forestland against fire, and whose
29 protection area is or may be affected by a fire on nearby federal lands, and with a focus on pro-
30 tecting lands and rural communities within the wildland-urban interface, as defined [*pursuant to*
31 *ORS 477.027*] **in ORS 477.015**, from fire on federal lands, endeavor to further shared stewardship to
32 decrease wildfire risk across Oregon through increased partnership with federal agencies to expand
33 activities under the Good Neighbor Authority Agreement described in ORS 526.275 in federal forests

36 “(B) Reducing ladder fuels and other hazardous fuel loading.

37 “(C) Restoring meadowland.
