# Senate Bill 912

Sponsored by Senator GELSER BLOUIN

#### SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure as introduced. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act sets out certain duties owed to children and clarifies when failure to meet those duties is abuse. (Flesch Readability Score: 67.3).

Prescribes duties to protect children and provide for children's basic needs. Describes when chronic or extreme neglect constitutes abuse of a child.

### A BILL FOR AN ACT

Relating to child abuse; creating new provisions; and amending ORS 419B.005. 2

3 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

- SECTION 1. (1) A child's parent or guardian has a duty to protect the child from abuse 4 by another person, including a duty to: 5
- (a) Take reasonable action to remedy or prevent the abuse of the child by another per-6 7 son;

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(b) Take reasonable action to end the abuse of the child by another person;

9 (c) Report to the Department of Human Services or a law enforcement agency when the 10 parent or guardian reasonably suspects the child is being abused by another person; and

(d) Cooperate in an investigation of abuse of the child by another person, including by 11 disclosing the other person's identity, if known. 12

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(2) A child's parent or guardian has a duty to:

(a) Provide for the child's basic needs to the extent that the parent or guardian is fi-14 nancially able to do so or, if the parent or guardian is not financially able to do so, to the 15 extent that community services or resources are available and have been offered to the 16 parent or guardian; and 17

(b) Accept public or community services or resources to provide for the child's basic 18 needs if the parent or guardian is not financially able to do so. 19

(3) A person's actions constitute chronic or extreme neglect of a child if the person is 2021the child's parent, guardian, custodian or caregiver and:

22(a) The person's persistent pattern of deprivation of or failure to provide for or facilitate the provision of the child's basic needs results in serious harm to the child, including but 2324 not limited to malnutrition, failure to thrive, serious illness or death;

(b) The person's collective pattern of deprivation of or failure to provide for the child's 2526basic needs:

- 27(A) Leads or is likely to lead to significant harm to the child's health, safety or welfare;
- (B) Substantially impedes or is likely to substantially impede the child's appropriate 28 29physical, mental, educational or emotional development; or
- (C) Imposes or is likely to impose significant long term impairment of the mental or 30

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- 1 physical health, behavior or function of the child; or

2 (c) The person's conduct, behavior or inaction:

3 (A) Is a contributing factor in the sexual abuse, as described in ORS chapter 163, sexual
4 exploitation, as described in ORS 419B.005, death, near death or serious physical or emotional
5 harm of the child or a sibling of the child;

6 (B) Presents an imminent risk of serious harm to the child, even if the harm is not re-7 alized; or

8 (C) Evidences a disregard of the consequences of the person's conduct, behavior or in-9 action such that the person constitutes an unequivocal danger to the child's health, welfare 10 or safety.

11 (4) As used in this section:

12 (a) "Abuse" has the meaning given that term in ORS 419B.005.

(b) "Basic needs" includes adequate food, clothing, shelter, supervision, protection, edu cation, guidance and medical care.
