SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: The Act adds new circuit court judges. (Flesch Readability Score: 89.8). Creates new circuit court judge positions in certain judicial districts. Declares an emergency, effective on passage.

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4 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. ORS 3.012, as amended by section 1, chapter 57, Oregon Laws 2024, is amended 5 6 to read:

7 3.012. (1) The judicial districts, the counties constituting the judicial districts and the number 8 of circuit court judges for each judicial district are as follows:

9 (a) The first judicial district consists of Jackson County and has 11 judges.

10 (b) The second judicial district consists of Lane County and has [15] 17 judges.

11 (c) The third judicial district consists of Marion County and has 15 judges.

12 (d) The fourth judicial district consists of Multnomah County and has 38 judges.

13(e) The fifth judicial district consists of Clackamas County and has [11] 13 judges.

(f) The sixth judicial district consists of the counties of Morrow and Umatilla and has five 14 15judges.

(aa) The twenty-seventh judicial district consists of Tillamook County and has two judges. 6

(2) The Secretary of State shall designate position numbers equal to the number of judges in 7 each of the judicial districts established by this section. The positions shall reflect any qualifications 8 9 established by ORS 3.041.

SECTION 3. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation 10 made to the Judicial Department by section 1 (1), chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2025 (Enrolled 11 12 House Bill 5012), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, for judicial compensation, is increased by \$1,835,445, for implementation of the amendments to ORS 3.012 by sections 1 and 13 2 of this 2025 Act. 14

15 SECTION 4. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Judicial Department by section 1 (1), chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2025 (Enrolled 16 House Bill 5012), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, for judicial compensation, is in-17 creased by \$166,256, for implementation of the amendments to ORS 3.012 by sections 1 and 18 2 of this 2025 Act. 19

SECTION 5. Section 4 of this 2025 Act does not become operative unless House Bill 2712 20becomes law. 21

22SECTION 6. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Fund appropriation made to the Judicial Department by section 1 (2), chapter ___, Oregon Laws 2025 (Enrolled 23House Bill 5012), for the biennium beginning July 1, 2025, for operations, is increased by 24 \$3,595,975, for implementation of the amendments to ORS 3.012 by sections 1 and 2 of this 252025 Act. 26

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SECTION 7. (1) The amendments to ORS 3.012 by sections 1 and 2 of this 2025 Act become operative on January 1, 2026. 28

(2) The Governor and the Judicial Department may take any action before the operative 2930 date specified in subsection (1) of this section that is necessary to enable the Governor and 31 the department to exercise, on and after the operative date specified in subsection (1) of this section, all of the duties, functions and powers conferred on the Governor and the depart-32ment by the amendments to ORS 3.012 by sections 1 and 2 of this 2025 Act. 33

34 SECTION 8. This 2025 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2025 Act takes effect 3536 on its passage.

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
