

Senate Concurrent Resolution 2

Sponsored by Senator GIROD (Pre-session filed.)

SUMMARY

The following summary is not prepared by the sponsors of the measure and is not a part of the body thereof subject to consideration by the Legislative Assembly. It is an editor's brief statement of the essential features of the measure **as introduced**. The statement includes a measure digest written in compliance with applicable readability standards.

Digest: Notes role of Aurora State Airport in disasters. (Flesch Readability Score: 61.2).

Recognizes the important role of Aurora State Airport in the State of Oregon's emergency preparedness and response efforts.

CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2 Whereas during World War II, Aurora Flight Strip was built in northern Marion County,
3 Oregon, by the United States Army Air Forces; and

4 Whereas the new facility was completed in 1943 and was used as a base for patrolling the coast
5 for enemy ships and aircraft, for pilot training and as a supporting airfield to Portland Army Air
6 Base; and

7 Whereas following the war, the airfield was eventually turned over to the control of the State
8 of Oregon by the federal government; and

9 Whereas Aurora State Airport is today a general aviation airport owned and operated by the
10 Oregon Department of Aviation, and it is one of the busiest airports in the state; and

11 Whereas Aurora State Airport covers an area of 144 acres, making it the largest of Oregon's
12 state-owned airports; and

13 Whereas in 2009, the Legislative Assembly passed a resolution naming the airstrip Wes Lematta
14 Field at Aurora State Airport in honor of the late founder of Columbia Helicopters, Inc., which is
15 based at the airport; and

16 Whereas Aurora State Airport is uniquely positioned to provide enormous assets to the
17 Willamette Valley, the State of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest region following a major seismic
18 event or other cataclysmic natural disaster; and

19 Whereas soil studies at the airport predict a negligible soil settlement following a major seismic
20 event, which indicates that the runway, taxiways and parking aprons will likely remain fully oper-
21 ational with very little needed repair; and

22 Whereas the airport is a major headquarters and base of operations for two of the largest
23 heavy-lift helicopter companies in the United States, Columbia Helicopters, Inc., and Helicopter
24 Transport Services, which will provide essential supply transportation services following a major
25 disaster; and

26 Whereas the airport is the regional headquarters for Life Flight Network, the principal emer-
27 gency air medical service for the northwestern United States, and whose services will be critical to
28 the people of the region following a disaster; and

29 Whereas the airport is the base of operations for two companies that specialize in repair and
30 adjustment of major electrical grid power lines: Wilson Construction Company and Winco Powerline

2 Whereas these resiliency-critical businesses all have major aircraft maintenance facilities at the
3 airport for their specialized aircraft, with ready-to-use test equipment, rebuild machines, spare parts
4 inventory, tools, skilled aircraft maintenance workforce, specialty aviation accessories and aero-
5 medical equipment in fully functional condition for use during an emergency; and

6 Whereas the airport is a base for the Oregon Disaster Airlift Response Team, which is an all-
7 volunteer airlift resource whose mission is to help communities and emergency responders cope with
8 a local disaster; and

9 Whereas the airport is home to the Aurora Composite Squadron, Oregon Wing, of the United
10 States Air Force Auxiliary's Civil Air Patrol, which provides essential search and rescue and
11 emergency response operations; and

12 Whereas the airport is surrounded by agricultural lands that during an emergency can be re-
13 purposed as staging areas for use in emergency management operations; and

14 Whereas the airport was constructed as a military airport and its runway was designed to be
15 capable of landing heavy military-type aircraft; and

16 Whereas the airport has more than 1 million square feet of aviation hangar, office and shop
17 space that can be quickly transitioned for emergency management operations; and

18 Whereas numerous federal, state and local emergency management plans document the impor-
19 tance of the airport as an essential resiliency facility; and

20 Whereas the Aurora Airport Improvement Association continues to further develop plans and
21 infrastructure so that Aurora State Airport can better serve its vital role as a resiliency facility to
22 resupply and support the people of the State of Oregon following a major seismic event or other
23 cataclysmic natural disaster; now, therefore,

24 **Be It Resolved by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:**

25 That we, the members of the Eighty-third Legislative Assembly, recognize the important role of
26 Aurora State Airport in the State of Oregon's emergency preparedness and response efforts, and
27 we salute the work of the Aurora Airport Improvement Association in ensuring that the airport
28 fulfills its vital role.

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
