**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 3321**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 4 through 29 and delete page
2 2 and insert:

3 **“SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:**

4 **“(a) ‘Indicated prevention’ means prevention strategies that focus**
5 **on individuals who exhibit early signs of substance use or other risk**
6 **factors but who do not have a diagnosable substance use disorder.**

7 **“(b) ‘Primary prevention’ means a public health strategy of inter-**
8 **vening before negative health effects have occurred to delay or prevent**
9 **young persons’ use of harmful substances.**

10 **“(c) ‘Selective prevention’ means prevention strategies that target**
11 **individuals, or groups of individuals, whose risk of developing a sub-**
12 **stance use disorder is significantly higher than average.**

13 **“(d) ‘Universal prevention’ means prevention strategies that are**
14 **aimed at the general public or a whole population group, without**
15 **identifying individuals who are at particular risk of developing a sub-**
16 **stance use disorder.**

17 **“(2) The Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission shall develop and**
18 **implement a primary prevention state strategy to prevent the onset**
19 **of substance use by:**

20 **“(a) Promoting health and well-being among individuals who have**
21 **not begun using alcohol, tobacco or controlled substances; and**

1 “(b) Utilizing universal prevention, selective prevention and indi-
2 cated prevention strategies.

3 “(3) In developing a primary prevention state strategy, the com-
4 mission shall:

5 “(a) Conduct a comprehensive inventory and assessment of existing
6 primary prevention programs in this state, including the current
7 workforce, types of entities supporting or administering the programs,
8 types of interventions being utilized, effectiveness of the programs,
9 funding streams and areas of unmet need.

10 “(b) Conduct a comprehensive inventory and assessment of existing
11 substance use screening, intervention and referral programs in this
12 state that are school-based or provided by youth-serving agencies or
13 organizations, including an assessment of the feasibility of increasing
14 the services of the programs.

15 “(c) Conduct an assessment of existing gaps in the provider
16 workforce and service delivery system for youth in need of all levels
17 of substance use disorder treatment, including intensive outpatient
18 treatment, residential treatment, withdrawal management and treat-
19 ment for co-occurring disorders.

20 “(d) Conduct, or contract with a third party to conduct, a financial
21 accounting of current primary prevention expenses in this state, in-
22 cluding services funded and the funding sources and amounts for those
23 services.

24 “(e) Define state agency responsibilities, outline funding models and
25 identify implementation strategies and expected outcomes.

26 “(4) No later than September 15, 2026, the commission shall report
27 to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to
28 health, in the manner provided in ORS 192.245, on the commission’s
29 findings and recommendations under this section.

30 “SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2025 Act is repealed on January 2,

1 **2027.”.**

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
