**PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO
HOUSE BILL 3321**

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, delete lines 4 through 29 and delete page
2 2 and insert:

3 **“SECTION 1. (1) As used in this section:**

4 **“(a) ‘Indicated prevention’ means prevention strategies that focus**
5 **on individuals who exhibit early signs of substance use or other risk**
6 **factors but who do not have a diagnosable substance use disorder.**

7 **“(b) ‘Primary prevention’ means practices, programs and policies**
8 **designed to prevent, delay and reduce the incidence and prevalence of**
9 **youth substance use.**

10 **“(c) ‘Selective prevention’ means prevention strategies that target**
11 **individuals, or groups of individuals, whose risk of developing a sub-**
12 **stance use disorder is significantly higher than average.**

13 **“(d) ‘Universal prevention’ means prevention strategies that are**
14 **aimed at the general public or a whole population group, without**
15 **identifying individuals who are at particular risk of developing a sub-**
16 **stance use disorder.**

17 **“(2) The Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission shall develop and**
18 **implement plans, including a statewide primary prevention strategy,**
19 **that address the entire youth continuum of care and are designed to**
20 **prevent the onset of substance use by:**

21 **“(a) Promoting health and well-being among individuals who have**

1 not begun using alcohol, tobacco or controlled substances; and

2 “(b) Utilizing universal prevention, selective prevention and indi-
3 cated prevention strategies.

4 “(3) In developing the plans described in subsection (2) of this sec-
5 tion, the commission shall:

6 “(a) Conduct a comprehensive inventory and assessment of existing
7 primary prevention programs in this state, including programs that
8 are school-based or provided by youth-serving agencies or organiza-
9 tions. The comprehensive inventory and assessment must include an
10 assessment of the current workforce, types of entities supporting or
11 administering the programs, types of interventions being utilized, ef-
12 fectiveness of the programs, feasibility of increasing the services of the
13 programs, funding streams and areas of unmet need.

14 “(b) Conduct an assessment of existing gaps in the provider
15 workforce and service delivery system for youth in need of all levels
16 of substance use disorder treatment, including intensive outpatient
17 treatment, residential treatment, withdrawal management and treat-
18 ment for co-occurring disorders.

19 “(c) Conduct, or contract with a third party to conduct, a financial
20 accounting of current primary prevention expenses in this state, in-
21 cluding services funded and the funding sources and amounts for those
22 services.

23 “(d) Define state agency responsibilities, outline funding models and
24 identify implementation strategies and expected outcomes.

25 “(4) No later than September 15, 2026, the commission shall report
26 to the interim committees of the Legislative Assembly related to
27 health, in the manner provided in ORS 192.245, on the commission’s
28 findings and recommendations under this section.

29 “SECTION 2. The Alcohol and Drug Policy Commission, in collab-
30 oration with the Oregon Health and Science University, shall provide
