The Food Bank our Community Needs

Marion Polk Food Share urges support for SB 452 to provide \$6 million for a new, expanded facility. This will join over \$18 million in matching funds.

Our community has experienced a surge in need for food assistance in recent years. Since the pandemic, food pantry visits are up 60%, and need for Meals on Wheels has increased by 55%. Yet our services are constrained by outdated facilities.

Since we moved into our current building 20 years ago, our food distribution has doubled from 4.5 million pounds to more than 9 million pounds of food per year. Our food supply has shifted from almost all shelf-stable to more than 50% fresh or frozen.

This project will construct a **new**, highly efficient warehouse and kitchen, which will be the hub of our food banking and Meals on Wheels programs and serve our community for the next 30+ years.

Communities can only thrive when individuals and families have access to the healthy food they need. For more than 62,000 people each month in Marion and Polk counties, that food is out of reach without food supplied by Marion Polk Food Share.

Food assistance prevents homelessness and helps people stay in their homes.



When people visit a food pantry and receive groceries worth \$200-\$300, they can put that money toward rent, utilities, and other expenses. The Food Share provides food to every major organization in our community which serves our unhoused neighbors, including Union Gospel Mission, The Salvation Army, ARCHES, Church at the Park, and Northwest Human Services. The food we distribute, free of charge, allows these partner organizations to use their funds towards other services, such as providing housing and rehabilitation.
