Now, as a counselor, I have the privilege of guiding the next generation of campers and witnessing the same life-changing impact OSS has on others.

Without the funding provided by SB 466, this vital program risks being torn away from the youth who have built an Oregon Summer Star family. This camp is more than just a summer activity—it is a source of connection, healing, and leadership development for military-affiliated youth who are often overlooked and underserved. It empowers campers to develop a sense of identity, foster emotional resilience, and build lifelong friendships.

Supporting this bill is not just an investment in a summer camp; it is an investment in the mental health, well-being, and future leadership of Oregon's military youth. These children face disproportionate mental health challenges compared to their peers, and programs like OSS provide a critical safety net.
