Chair Nathanson, Vice Chairs Reschke and Walters, and Members of the Committee:

Thank you for taking the time to hear this bill and to hear it so early in the session.

I am writing today as an arts advocate, and your colleague, to express my strong support for HB 3190 and restarting this important property tax assessment. This is also one of the arts and culture caucus priority bills which many of you know I co-chair along with State Senator Dick Anderson.

This legislation represents an essential step toward preserving Oregon's unique heritage, protecting our historic sites, and investing in the communities that steward these irreplaceable cultural assets.

Historic preservation is not just about safeguarding the past; it is about creating a future where our shared history informs and enriches the lives of all Oregonians. Across the state, historic sites and structures tell the stories of those who came before us and the struggles and triumphs that define our communities. Whether it is the architecture of early Oregon settlers, the sites of significant social movements, or Indigenous landmarks that connect us to Oregon's first stewards, these places have shaped who we are. As we face ongoing challenges in housing, economic recovery, and cultural preservation, this bill includes provisions that align with broader state goals. Projects like these we are supporting remind us of the resilience and ingenuity that have long defined Oregon.

I urge the committee to pass this bill and re-start this program and join me in affirming that preserving our history is an investment in our future. Together, we can ensure that the stories embedded in Oregon's landscapes and architecture remain vibrant for generations to come.
