Dear Co-Chairs Campos and Valderrama, Members of the Subcommittee,

I am writing on behalf of SO Health-E, the Regional Health Equity Coalition of Southern Oregon, to share how the Healthier Oregon Program has positively impacted the lives of the people we serve in Jackson and Josephine Counties.

We work directly with many families who struggle to access necessary medical care due to a lack of health coverage through our community outreach and our monthly parent meet ups. Although this has been the case for years, the collective impacts of the Almeda and Obenchain fires in 2020, Covid-19 pandemic disruptions to the economy and to community health, and recent inflation in grocery and housing prices have combined to make the struggle to afford healthcare nearly impossible for many families. The fact that immigration status is one less barrier to navigate is critical for many families and for the partners who support them.

We urge the Legislature to fully fund the Healthier Oregon Program and all the navigators who work tirelessly to connect people to these life-saving and costsaving resources.

We believe that the HOP is in line with Oregon's values and with a commitment to fiscally responsibility to fund healthcare access instead of costly emergency room utilization as the only option for care.
