As a field botanist and educator, I support the sustained funding of Oregon Flora Project as an invaluable educational resource within our state. I am also a volunteer editor for a chapter in the upcoming Flora or Oregon volume 3 highlighting the long history of Indigenous connection to the plants and lands of Oregon. The work Oregon Flora is doing is unique in several ways. It is a historic move to uplift Indigenous history and highlight Indigenous Knowledge in a western scientific volume, which brings a broader perspective to human-plant relationships into the public eye and long-awaited respect for the knowledge of the first people of the land from western scientists. This is part of a growing understanding of the need for western science to learn from Indigenous Knowledge and incorporate methodology and perspectives from it in order to be better stewards of our environment.
