## RE: SB 916, Relating to unemployment insurance benefits for employees unemployed due to a labor dispute; declaring an emergency

Chair Taylor and Members of the Committee:

The Hospital Association of Oregon is a mission-driven nonprofit association representing Oregon's 61 community hospitals. HAO provides services to Oregon's community hospitals to support their work delivering dependable, comprehensive health care to their communities.

The hospital association is opposed to SB 916, which would make unemployment insurance benefits available to striking workers.

Collective bargaining is a negotiation process, and strikes are a way for workers to gain leverage in these negotiations. This bill is irreconcilable with the very purpose of unemployment insurance—to be a resource for people who find themselves out of work through no fault of their own. That is a core principle that has existed under both federal and state law for decades. With workers financially supported through unemployment insurance benefits while on strike, there is less urgency to sit at the bargaining table and do the hard work. This will lead to longer strikes and make strikes a more frequent tool of negotiation.

In the case of hospitals, our members must stay open and staffed, even during a strike.

Strained by mounting costs and a morass of regulations, the health care system is at a breaking point. Allowing striking workers to receive unemployment insurance benefits increases the financial strain on hospitals that are already on the brink, putting access to care at risk.



For these reasons, we oppose SB 916.
