Dear Oregon Lawmakers and Members of the Committee:

My name is Peter Salant. I'm a cattle rancher just south of Jacksonville, in Southern Oregon's Jackson County. I own and run a cow/calf and stocker operation, raising beef to sell locally here at Farmer's Markets, school districts and restaurants.

Oregon's small farms and ranches, and the outlets where we market our products, are increasingly threatened by extreme weather events and wildfires. Supporting the Food Systems Resilience Programs in HB 2979 means investing in climate resilience, disaster preparedness, conservation and stewardship, rural economic development, and thriving small businesses all over our state. These investments benefit not just farmers and local food outlets but entire communities by fostering access to healthy, local food, creating hubs for community engagement and expanding nutrition incentive programs.

Our local Rogue Valley Growers and Crafters Market has benefitted from a previous Growth Grant provided by OFMA, for which we thank you for funding! It is very much appreciated by our organization, whose Board I also sit on. As you know, Farmers' Markets play a crucial role within our local economies, providing a platform for small-scale vendors like myself to sell our products while fostering community connections.
