Oregon's Prioritized List is the main tool used to manage Medicaid resources, ranking treatments based on cost-effectiveness and health benefits.

1989 Concept Emerges

Oregon introduces the concept of a Prioritized List to manage Medicaid resources effectively.



1994 List Established

The Oregon Health Services Commission (now known as the Health Evidence Review Commission or HERC) publishes the first Prioritized List, ranking treatments based on cost-effectiveness and health benefit.



1997 Medicaid Expansion

Oregon expands Medicaid coverage, using the Prioritized List to guide coverage decisions and prioritize high-need treatments.



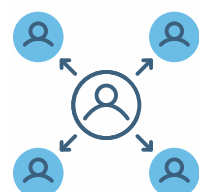
2000s Adjustments & Updates

The Prioritized List is updated annually to incorporate new treatments and reflect advancements in medical knowledge.



2012 Medicaid Redesign

Oregon introduces Coordinated Care Organizations (CCOs), using the Prioritized List to guide care coordination within the Medicaid system.



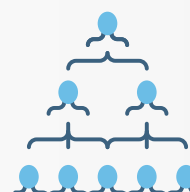
2013 Affordable Care Act

Oregon expands Medicaid under the Affordable Care Act, using the Prioritized List to ensure new enrollees receive cost-effective treatments.



2015 New Metrics

The Prioritized List incorporates social determinants of health (e.g., housing stability) to make coverage decisions more holistic.



2017 Outcomes & Equity

Adjustments to the Prioritized List ensure vulnerable populations, such as those with chronic conditions or mental health issues, receive adequate care.



2020 Medicare Reforms

Oregon focuses on value-based care, refining the Prioritized List to ensure Medicaid dollars are spent on effective treatments.



Today & Forward Ongoing Use & Refinement

The Prioritized List is continually updated using real time data, prioritizing improved health outcomes and efficiency in Medicaid services.

The Prioritized List has allowed 97% of Oregonians to have health coverage.
