Testimony in Support of SB 769 – Allowing County-Level Decisions on Cougar Hunting with Dogs

I am writing to express my strong support for SB 769, which proposes to grant individual counties in Oregon the authority to decide on the use of hounds for cougar management. The people who live with these challenges every day should be the ones to determine the best course of action for their communities.

Hunting with hounds is a time-tested, effective, and humane method for managing cougar populations. It allows for selective targeting, ensuring that specific problem animals can be removed without negatively impacting the overall population. Additionally, hound hunting significantly reduces the likelihood of wounding, as hunters can make more accurate, ethical shots. This approach aligns with responsible wildlife management principles and respects the balance of our natural ecosystems.

SB 769 is not about imposing a mandate but about restoring the right of local communities to make informed decisions based on their unique circumstances. By supporting this bill, you are advocating for a balanced approach that considers the

voices of all Oregonians, not just those in metropolitan areas.

I urge you to pass SB 769 and allow each county to determine the best management practices for their local cougar populations. Let us respect the diversity of our state by empowering local voters to decide what is best for their communities.
